**Star Trek Stamp Committee, at Box 452, Strasburg, North Dakota 58573 (701)-336-2655 is asking for help to pass a Congressional Resolution in favor of a stamp, honoring the space shuttle Enterprise and the starship Enterprise of "Star Trek". They ask everyone to write their respective U. S. Senators and U. S. Representatives in support of such a resolution being introduced.

We don't have sufficient space here to reproduce the full text of the format they are suggesting, but here are the essentials:

For nearly two years an effort has been underway to urge the U. S. Postal Service to issue a stamp, bearing the likenesses of the Starship Enterprise of Star Trek and the space shuttle Enterprise as an expression of the peoples' support for America's space program. It's been endorsed by Isaac Asimov, Ray Bradbuy, Arthur C. Clarke, Ann Landers, Members of Congress, and several governors. Due to the Postal Service's intransigence in this matter, it has been suggested that a congressional resolution be proposed in favor of the stamp.

- **As most of you know, Robert A. Heinlein passed away a couple of weeks ago. He apparently died in his sleep after telling his wife, Virginia, that he felt too tired to go with her on their morning walk. Like many fans, I felt like part of my childhood had died when I heard the news...many of us discovered SF from our school libraries where we found many of Robert Heinlein's juvenile SF novels.
- **Phoenix fan and author Rick Cook won on Jeopardyl! Look for the episodes he was on this June 29 and 30. Rick's first book is coming out in February, 1989 and has a cover by Alan Gutierrez, an Arizona artist who was LepreCon 14's Artist Guest of Honour.
- **The Southwest Costumers Guild is bidding for the 1992 CostumeCon for Phoenix, Arizona. The result will be voted on and announced in 1990.
- **There is now a bid for Phoenix for the 1993 World Science Fiction Convention. The bid committee includes Eric Hansen, Bruce Farr, Terry Gish, Doreen Webbert, and Margaret Grady. ...it's a convention. And it SHOULD be fund Working conventions, that is. As a matter of fact, it REALLY should be and I'm afraid that it does look a lot like work at times. Unfortunately, as conventions get larger that's what happens - there's more and more work involved. Some years I've put in over 10 hours every week, myself, on doing various conventions.

Why? For me that IS fun. I enjoy working with the people (I know, that's what some morticians say, too). There are a lot of negroup working on conventions, many of whom I now consider my friends. Working cons is a good way to meet future friends.

It's also fun when I do different jobs I haven't done before. Perhaps helping in Registration for one con, Programming at another, and Art Show at a third. Mixing things up gives you variety that stops things from being boring.

If your experience has been of heading a department, try being a volunteer or staff member for a convention or two. You can be valuable assisting every bit as much as leading. You can especially be of assistance helping train someone who hasn't headed a department before. And this might give you a needed break from the time and responsibity you've been bearing.

But if you've mostly been assisting as a volunteer or staff member at a convention, try asking to head an area. There is an amount of experience that's needed to head a department, but it's less than you may think. What's needed is enthusiasm, the willingness to learn from others who've done the job, and the time to do the job as it's required.

Finally, doing a job at a con is a lot easier and less stressing if you have the time available to "do it right". Not letting things get behind by keeping things up to date helps the convention and the attendees. Every bit as important is letting the chairperson know if you need help if you're falling behind. That way things can be fixed before it becomes a real problem.
