## THE HOTEL

Because the World Fantasy Convention has grown into such a prestigious event, we decided the 1988 venue had to meet the high standards that WFC attendees have come to expect...

The Ramada Inn London West Hotel is ideally situated right in the heart of central London, only a few minutes' walk from Harrods department store and the fashionable Knightsbridge shopping area. The hotel is conveniently located close to several bus routes and West Brompton and Earls Court Underground stations, allowing easy access to all parts of the city. There are plenty of restaurants and shops nearby, with Chelsea and Earls Court just short walks away.

This modern 510-room hotel has been recently taken over by the Ramada Inn chain, which is busily upgrading all the rooms to the standard of their American hotels (don't worry – the work will be

completed by October 1) Although the hotel rooms are small by American standards, each includes private bath and shower, colour television, and a direct dial telephone system. They are also double glazed to keep out the often inclement British autumn!

The 1988 World Fantasy Convention will incorporate the 13th Annual British Fantasy Convention, sponsored by the British Fantasy Society, and between us we hope to host a conference you will never forget . . . .
