

### NUTS'N'BOLTS: SERIES vs. STAND-ALONG BOOKS

Sequelitis is upon us, and has been for years. Nearly every highly successful movie spawns one, two, three or more sequels; the same can be said for SF books. A common belief these days among writers is that in order to break in, one must offer a trilogy or a series.

Trilogies and series <u>are</u> extremely popular, and they do sell better, thereby pleasing editors and authors by fattening bank accounts. The major advantage to writing multiple books in the same universe is the halflife syndrome--with the publication of each successive volume, preceding books are reissued and bookstores restock them. This results in additional sales of the early volumes, when otherwise you might only have one shot at establishing a readership. Most bookstores don't have the space to keep each title stocked year after year, but if it's a series chances are the author gets repeat time and space.

That being said, there <u>is</u> room in the industry for single books. Editors want them. Readers want them; many moan about having to keep up with multiple titles in various series. What this means is the new writer need not attempt to develop a trilogy when it's hard enough building a world for one book. Don't burden yourself by trying too much too fast. Concentrate on technique, plot mechanics, characterization, style, etc., and make it all strong enough for one very solid book. If you do it once, you can do it again, but it's asking too much of yourself right at the beginning to think about doing two or three or four. You don't need that pressure. Make that one book the very best it can be, then try to sell it. If it has the potential for sequels, the editor will see it. But at this point it's difficult to interest an editor in buying more than one at a time because you haven't proved yourself in the marketplace.

Certainly there are exceptions. Some new authors do make a first deal on the basis of a trilogy. But only if they've already turned in all three manuscripts and the editor knows the work is publishable. So if you're dying to write the penultimate trilogy or series before you have a deal, go ahead. You'll be a better writer by the time you're done, because practice does make perfect. But be prepared for a more difficult and lengthy break-in time. And be prepared to rewrite your first novel yet again, because by the time you've finished the others you'll see serious problems in

your first. You might even wish you hadn't sent it out quite so fast.

Right now, the sf/fantasy industry is experiencing a drip-off in profits. This means it will be harder than ever for a new writer to break in, because editors will become more selective in what they buy. Don't make it harder on yourself by anticipating a done deal for your trilogy or series. it's hard enough writing--and selling-one.

And if your dreams include Nebula and Hugo awards, keep in mind series books almost never, ever win.



1991 World Fantasy Convention

A group of Phoenix and Tucson Fans, chaired by our illustrious Randy Rau and Bruce Farr, will be conducting the 1991 World Fantasy Convention (WFC) at the Doubletree Hotel at Randolph Park in Tucson. This limited membership convention (paid memberships are not allowed to exceed 750) is traditionally held over the weekend closest to Halloween. Tucson also hosted the 1985 WFC.

This year's WFC was in London, England. Professional membership (editors, publishers, authors and artists) included almost half of those there. Pro GOH was James Herbert and Toastmaster was Clive Barker. The con's Program Book was a 260 page hardbound book of stories and articles.

Since the WFC is oriented to serious fans of dark and light fantasy,m the convention features an extensive program, presentation of the World Fantasy Awards during an awards banquet, and incredible art show and a heavily book-oriented dealers' room. There is little media emphasis, no masquerade, no gaming, little video or films, and hall costumes are highly discouraged (as are simple t-shirts).

Memberships will be available after the conclusion of the 1990 WFC in Chicago. Attendees of the 1989 & 1990 WFC along with those members of the 1985 WFC we can still locate will receive the first two progress reports. We're delighted and honored to be hosting this prestigious event!
