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

I am happy to inform you that the 1990 NASFiC will be held in beautiful San Diego, California. As you probably know, the North American Science Fiction Convention is held when the WorldCon is held overseas. In this case, it is being held in The Hague, so all of us fans who can't go to Europe for a convention have a rather fine alternative choice.

Our professional guest of honor is Samuel R. Delaney, the Nebula and Hugo award winner who has written such works as *Babel-17*, *Dhalgren*, and *Triton* to name only a few. Delaney is known best for his bright, sparkling images and his many faceted characters. He has been likened to a conjurer who tosses his words and ideas with consummate skill to make them tumble into wonderfully controlled patterns.

Our fan guest of honor is Ben Yalow. Ben is a well-known convention organizer, having been on the WorldCon committee, as well as regional and local conventions in Massachusetts. If you've longed to make that step from convention attendee to convention organizer, here's the man to talk to.

There will also be the Masquerade, a dealer's room with approximately 200 tables, a video room, Art Show, speakers and panels, and a film room.

All this in a bay side venue, including the brand new Convention Center. When you're seeking a break from frenzied conventioneering, you can walk down the street to a waterside park, where you can loll on the grass as you watch the sailboats glide by. Then if you have an urge to be on the water yourself, you can visit the Maritime Museum and go aboard a real clipper ship or a reproduction of "The Golden Hind".

If you wish to travel back in time to Spanish California, Old Town can satisfy you, or if you wish to travel to modern Mexico, a regular trolley travels down to the border where you can take a short walk to Tia Juana.

There is also a regular bus to Sea World, a marine park where you can watch killer whales play. And about fifteen minutes away is the world famous San Diego Zoo, where there are koalas on exhibit, one of the few places outside of Australia where they flourish.

So set aside Labor Day weekend, August 28 - September 1, 1990 to come play by the bay in San Diego.


LOCAL NEWS

DAW Books has recently purchased from Jennifer Roberson the fourth, and sadly the last, volume in her "Sword-Dancer" series, titled SWORD-BREAKER. This purchase is in part due to the heavy sales of the recently release SWORD-MAKER (in October) and the reissued SWORD-DANCER and SWORD-SINGER (SWORD-MAKER in the first two weeks went to #16 on the general mass market list at B. Dalton's) and so inspired DAW to negotiate a deal for SWORD-BREAKER immediately. SWORD-BREAKER should appear on local bookshelves around March of 1991. Jennifer is such a well liked and respected author that this recent deal resulted in making her the third highest-paid author in DAW history. This sale marks the twelfth book sold to DAW and her fifteenth overall. That is some great work.

Jennifer is currently completing FLIGHT OF THE RAVEN, the seventh novel in the Cheysuli series, which has been scheduled to appear in local bookstores around June 1990.

Rick Cook has recently sold the sequel to Wizard's Bane, due to be released in April, 1990. Also we are pleased to have Rick back with us, he was in SF presenting at a convention during the minor shake-up they had last month. He tells a wonderful story of how the hotel bar held up during the aftershocks.

Local fans Doreen Webbert and Bruce Farr have been chosen to go to the upcoming SMOFCon, to be held in Toronto, Canada. SMOF (Secret Masters of Fhandom (not very secret, ed.))Con is a convention held for the people who conduct conventions so that they can get together with other people from around the world and share ideas on how to provide a better convention. Have fun up there in the Great White North, guys.



CONTACT 1990.

And now for something completely different.

Contact is *THE* convention/conference which merges anthropology and science fiction? And well might you say, "what 'cha mean?" For example, imagine yourself conducting the Solar System Council, when you get word that what appears to be an alien ship is coming in-system and will arrive in three months. This is the sort of scenario that's handled by CONTACT. The dates for CONTACT VII Conference are March 2-4, 1990 with light hospitality and registration on March 1.

CONTACT conferences in the past have been attended by science fiction authors (such as Poul and Karen Anderson, Alan Dean Foster, and Jerry Pournelle), artists (such as Joel Hagen), and professionals in anthropology and sociology as well as sf fans. It's a small, intimate convention (we anticipate 300 as the maximum attendence) in which many, and perhaps most, of the people attending will be able to become involved in the events. The CONTACT for 1989 was held in Phoenix at the (formerly) Ramada Hotel near 40th Street. Prior CONTACTS were held in California.

The hotel for CONTACT (shades of another article in this MAW, Batman) is the Caravan Inn at 3333 E. Van Buren in Phoenix. This is a facility we have worked with many times over the years...and is quite reasonable at \$40.00 per night single/double. They can be CONTACTed at (602) 244-8244 hotel room reservations. The rate includes a complimentary continental breakfast each morning.

What happens at CONTACT? We'll have hospitality open during most of the convention (held at an actual hotel dining room, with the hotel kitchen facilities available for our use), starting with early evening on March 1 (Thursday) and through March 4 (Sunday). We expect that this will, like many events, become the setting for many of the informal program-oriented discussions. The major purpose the CONTACT, of course, is the Program.

Ah, yes...the Program. The CONTACT Conference is organized into four basic elements: the Cultures of the Imagination (COTI) Project, Bateson Projects, the Symposia, and the workshops.

...AND HERE BEGINS A REPRINT OF CONTACT, INC.'S OWN NEWSLETTER INFO ON CONTACT VII...DRY READING MATERIAL, BUT WORTHWHILE PERUSING...

Cultures of the Imagination (COTI) begins before the conference with invited participants creating future worlds populated by human and alien cultures. Following each new year's guidelines, conference participants detail and evolve two specific cultures which gradually learn about each other through progressive revelations and finally meet face-to-face for the climactic presentation of the three-day CONTACT Conference.

The Bateson Projects are exercises in future projections centered around themes ranging from "Colonies of the Imagination" to "Southwest: 2039" to "The Solar System Council". Invited participants work in both closed and open sessions to explore issues relating to the project theme and place them in a context which will benefit further academic investigations.

CONTACT Symposia run throughout the Conference and consist of open sessions during which up to four guests will present formal papers which will be published in subsequent CONTACT Conference Proceedings. The level of discussion is college upper-division. The audience is assumed to consist of serious students of the subjects presented yet is not expected to be expert in those fields. Many thoughtful questions have both confirmed and challenged the assumptions made in many of our past presentations.

Workshops vary in number and in subject from year-to-year with past topics including "World Building", "Xenobiology For Those Who Can't Spell It", "How to Cook A Culture", and "Linguistics". The workshops are aimed at supporting the subject matter of COTI and the Bateson Projects. The workshops are open to conference attendees who can expect to have their world-building, culture-creating skills stimulated. Participants can expect hands-on experience in exploring the ramifications of contact between alien cultures or subcultures.

CONTACT, Inc. is an organization which promotes interaction between the arts and sciences and which demonstrates the value of using scientific principles as guides to the imagination. Creative speculation is a tool for research and CONTACT activities encourage the development of approaches which emphasize ethical considerations in cross-cultural contact,

whenever and wherever it occurs. CASFS, Inc. is assisting CONTACT, Inc. in putting on the 1990 CONTACT VII Conference in the CASFS is actually conducting the events and CONTACT, Inc. is planning the Program.

Following are forms for memberships, etc. Please don't have too much culture shock when you find that the rate to non-students is \$40.00 through January 1, 1990. This is a conference with relatively few attending, so costs are naturally much higher per person. It's also darned well worth it if it's in your area of interest. On joining we'll also send you much more information on CONTACT VII. By the way, a student is defined as someone with a current student ID - send a copy of your own with your own application, please.
