
MAW, 3st Quarter 1990

FROM THE CHAIR

Here again is some information about our quests:

Keith Laumer — Author of the Lafavette O'Leary books, the James Retief (galactic diplomat) series, and many individual novels of note including Bolo, Plague of Demons, and Worlds of Imperium. Keith is probably best known for his use of humor and satire in his books.

David Gerrold — Author of the War Against The Chtorr series, Yesterday's Children. When Harlie Was One, and many other novels. David is also the author of multiple Star Trek, Logan's Run, and Land Of The Lost television episodes and was story editor for Land Of The Lost and Buck Rogers.

Julie Guthrie — Our artist quest of honor, Julie is an incredibly talented sculptor. She has specialized in miniatures for gaming and has created many figures for companies such as Ral Partha and Grenadier.

Wilson "Bob" Tucker — Our fan guest of honor, Wilson has been active in fandom since the 30's. He has published several fanzines and began writing science fiction and mysteries in the 40's. The most common theme in his science fiction is time travel. He also wrote one of the finest novels of the cold-war era. The Long. Loud Silence.

Autograph sessions will be scheduled for convention guests in the dealers room.

A word about price: we are working to avoid raising prices but your support is essential to holding our costs down. CASFS is a non-profit organization — all the people working on the convention are volunteers. See the back page of this Progress Report for more information on volunteering.

We hope to attract about 200 more members than we had last year — looking forward to seeing you there!

HOTEL

There have been some questions raised about the hotel in recent weeks and I would like to set the record straight for all of us. The hotel has come up with a short list of rules for all convention attendees who are renting rooms. The list is not intended to "crack down" on any group of people; rather it was designed to help provide for a more pleasant and enjoyable time at the convention. The list is:

1. All CopperCon attendees renting a resort sleeping room must be 21 years old or older and must show proper I.D.

2. No underage drinking will be allowed in any private sleeping room or in public hotel space.

3. All registered attendees must display the conference name badge

at all times while on hotel property.

4. Quad occupancy is the maximum allowed in a two-bed room, double occupancy in a one-bed room.

5. No more than 4 people are allowed to congregate in a sleeping

room unless it is a registered party room.

Most of this list is not new, we have been going to conventions and staying at hotels with the same rules for many years. This is just the first time that many of them have been printed as we thought most of them were just common sense.

Yes, the hotel wants the person who rents the room to be at least 21 years old. Not really a hardship as the vast majority of our attendees are over that anyway. If there isn't anybody in your group who is over 21, please come talk to me. As far as the underage drinking, that is

just stating the law.

The hotel has requested that all convention attendees wear their con badges at all times. In the past we have just requested that you wear them in convention areas. The hotel is considering the entire hotel, with the exception of the lobby, restaurants, and bar, to be convention areas and as such they request that you wear your badges at all times. Once again not really a hardship as most of us wear them all the time anyway.

Quad occupancy in a two-bed room, double occupancy in a single-bed room is standard hotel practice. Just a word of advice: when you make your hotel reservation, be sure to tell them how many beds you will require. If you don't they may not have the correct room type for

your group.

The bit about no more than four people congregating in a sleeping room is probably the most misunderstood part of this all. All the hotel is trying to say is that if you are planning on throwing a party, of if you are planning on large discussion groups or filking, or any other activity that causes noise, please register your room as a party room. The reason for this is that in the past we have had a lot of noise complaints in the quiet areas of the hotel. If the front desk knows in advance, they can place your room in the party area and then everybody is happy. But don't worry if at the con you decide at the drop of a hat to get together with a few of your friends in your room for a discussion. We will not be breaking down doors to count the number of heads in a given room. Just remember that the quiet area means

that you should be quiet over there as somebody may be trying to sleep.

Another bit of confusion with the hotel has been over room rates. Please rest assured that the convention rate for rooms is \$40 per night per room for single through quad occupancy, based on your room type (see #4 above). In addition to the room rate, please remember about the sales tax that is owed on anything you buy. The sales tax on the hotel rooms is approximately 10%.

The hotel this year is requiring a deposit of \$40 for each room rented. This is basically to help prevent damage to rooms. While very few of our attendees are causing any damages to their rooms, the vandalism they are causing is quite spectacular. As the rest of the world works, the actions of a few have infringed on the rest of us. The deposit is refundable when you check out after your sleeping room has been checked. One word of advice about the deposit: the hotel is not set up to hold checks for any period of time, so if your deposit is paid by check they will deposit it in their bank and your refund will need to be processed by the business office — a process that will take about three weeks before your receive your refund. Cash will be refunded when you check out, or I would suggest that you cover your room with a credit card (as the card imprint will only be used if needed).

Also, the hotel has requested we pass on a simple request with regards to the hotel restaurant and bar. These are common areas that are used by the local mundanes every weekend. The hotel would request that you use common sense when wearing costumes in these areas — while your costume may be street legal, if it borders on areas that are better left in manly magazines (and if you don't know what these are, you have never visited my house), it really should not be worn into the lobby or restaurant.

While a couple of these are new items, most of them are standard common sense rules that we have lived with for many years. The biggest difference is that this is the first time they have been in print together. I hope that this eases any confusion you have about the hotel. The Safari Resort is committed to our convention and will do everything in their power to assist in your having a good time.

We never received hotel reservation cards, so you should contact the hotel directly if you wish to reserve a room for the con. Inquiries can be sent to:
