Welcome to new member Pam Allan, an avid Dr. Who fan.



DEADLY FRIEND- A teen genius (Matthew Laborteaux) revives his recently deceased girlfriend with a microchip in this intriguing, but implausible film from director Wes Craven. The acting is good, but the premise never quite clicks. A weak follow-up to Craven's immensely popular Nightmare On Elm Street.

LINK- Animal specialist Terence Stamp has been making great strides in the study of chimps, but his main pupil, named Link, takes over the laboratory. Starts out well, but soon becomes just another animals-on-the-loose film. Directed by Richard Franklin(Psycho 3).

SHADOWPLAY- Dee Wallace stars as a writer being haunted by a deceased lover. Or is it just her imagination? Who cares? A mild thriller that isn't very thrilling

PEGGY SUE GOT MARRIED- Francis Ford Coppola has briefly left behind more intense subjects to direct this touching, humorous time-travel fantasy about a housewife (Kathleen Turner) who faints at her 25th high school re-union and winds up back in her high school days with the chance to change her life. Perhaps closer to It's A Wonderful Life in tone than Back to the Future. Quite entertaining, with fine performances by all, but I found the ending a bit of a letdown.

DEAD END DRIVE-IN- This unusual Australian film has an interesting premise; a young couple goes to the drive-in, but find they can't leave once there, it's a prison camp for rebellious youth. Unfortunately, they don't do much with the premise. It mainly has the couple arguing,

he wants to escape, she wants to stay. A few laughs, but not likely cult material.

THE 19TH INTERNATIONAL TOURNEE OF

ANIMATION This is the latest compilation of top animation from around the world from the last 2 or 3 years. A pretty good batch this time featuring all types of animation with the emphasis on some pretty weird stories. My favorites, Vincent, narrated by Vincent Price and The Big Snit.
