

Operations

Co-ordination and Communications

The Communcations & Coordination Department has a large responsibility in assisting all attendees of the convention in having a *good* time. And we are very serious when it comes to having a *good* time. If you are having any problems while at the convention, just look for one of us and we will see if we can help. We are very easy to spot, just look for somebody wearing a blue ribbon attached to their ID badge. If we cannot help you solve your problem, at least we can "tell you where to go" to get the assistance you need.

But due to the actions of a few people at a major East coast convention, we have found it necessary to implement a few common-sense rules for the convention. They are:

No real or realistic firearms are allowed in any of the hotels or the Civic Plaza. Arizona has a "check-em at the door" law on the books and every business that we are dealing with is enforcing this policy.

Bladed weapons may be carried but they must be in a hard, protective case. This case must be sufficient to protect anyone from both the point and the edge. Also, large costumes with lots of weapons or points sticking out should be avoided because of the possible danger to the people around you.

Spiked apparel may not be worn at the convention except for the costume events. In this case, permission must be granted by the person in charge of the event.

Weapons and toys that project any type of substance (i.e., water, rubber bullets, lasers (yes, light is a substance) may not be carred during the convention. Such weapons may be confiscated for the duration of the convention.

Running in the halls is not allowed.

Picture ID for proof of age will be required to obtain any alcohol from the Hospitality Suite. The drinking age in Arizona is 21.

Memberships in CactusCon are revokable for cause. The membership badge remains the property of the convention until after the close of the convention.

We hope that you enjoy your time with us in Phoenix, but we hope that you will respect the rights of others as they should respect your rights. Enjoy!

Help Yourself

Conventions are put on by people, just like you, who do it because it is fun. We enjoy meeting new people and the feeling when a convention is successful and everybody is happy. Granted, not every convention is a success, and seldom is everybody happy about everything, but we try.

At a major East coast convention this year, there was a small group of people, most of them not even members of the convention, who went wild and caused more trouble for the Committee than any convention should receive. This group of people were just having fun, I guess, but their idea of fun was not compatible with the general welfare. Even this year, at a local Phoenix convention we had an individual with a paint pellet gun in the hotel. This sort of activity puts a real strain on hotel relations.

We all want to continue to enjoy our conventions year after year, but unless we, and this means all of us, get together we may find that nobody wants to run our conventions any more. Security at a convention is the business of everybody there, not just the job of a small staff. We all have the responsibility to see that the facilities that host our events are taken care of so that we can come back every year to enjoy and make merry with our friends again.

Basically stated, have fun and enjoy yourselves at the convention, but remember to respect the rights of everybody and everything around you. If we all follow this, we can be assured that we will be enjoying our conventions for years to come.


Handicapped Access



Photographers who have signed up for the presentations will be seated a few minutes early and may **not** use flash of any kind.

All contestants in any of the costume events should:

3. Attend the Contestants' meeting (Friday 2pm, Hilton Ballroom; Saturday 2pm Civic Center Ballroom (South end)) Bring a 4x6 card for MC, tapes and \$1.00 or photo of you in the costume, as well as documentation of any kind to the contestant meeting. If you will be late to the meeting - talk to Pati Cook and make sure she writes it down.

There is great entertainment planned for both nights while the judges are making their decisions. Friday night we will have the Historical Costumes presented (our "Time Travel" segment), then a parade of anyone in hall costumes who would like to go across the stage and we will finish our time with musical entertainment by the BSL Band (Edwin Hirt and Garry Siler.)

Saturday night will feature an interpretation of Rotsler's Rules by the Daystar Holt and three sets of music - a blues act featuring Professor Paul; the BSL Band; and Joe Bethancourt, noted bluegrass and folk artist.

Come and enjoy both the costumes and entertainment, and still be ready (and able) to party. We anticipate being able to finish both nights by 10:00 or 10:30.

Photon Phaser Game


PHOTON, the exciting new environmental game played in a 12.000-square-foot maze with electronic phaser pistols, has a demo booth in the Exhibit Hall at the Civic Plaza where you can register for your discout PHOTON ID Badge (\$4 instead of \$6) and Game Coupons (\$2 instead of \$3). Show you NASFiC membership badge to qualify. Your PHOTON ID Badge will be good for a lifetime membership and can be used at any of the PHOTON facilities around the country. You must be four feet, six inches tall to play the game (safety regulations). There will be free shuttle busing on Saturday and Sunday from noon through 6:30pm (rides from the Plaza to PHOTON every hour on the hour from noon through 4pm, leaving PHOTON back to the Plaza every hour on the half hour from 12:30pm through 6:30pm). Pickup and return will be at the inset area on Plaza Center Road. There will be special after-hours play for NASFiC members only late Sunday night (actually Monday, from 1am in the morning) but you must arrange for your own transportation. Also, this will depend on how many people pre-register at the booth, so get a group together. PHOTON is open Sunday through Thursday from noon to midnight, and Friday and Saturday from 11am to lam. Convention members showing badges can get discount tickets at PHOTON anytime during the convention.

We will be providing professional babysitters for kids up to 3 years old. The sitters will take 4 and 5 year olds depending on the kid. Babysitting will have a refrigerator for formula. 

CHER BETHANCOURT is currently Baroness of the local SCA Barony of Sun Dragon. She is very active in arts of all kinds.

JOE BETHANCOURT is the ultimate entertainer. He plays a multitude of instruments, banters and jokes with his audience, and offers a little musical history from time to time on the tunes he plays.

BRUCE BETHKE has written nine stories for the pro market. Two have already seen print and two more will be showing up in *Amazing* and *Aboriginal SF*. His one claim to fame is a short story in 1980 entitled: *Cyberpunk*..

EDWARD BRYANT is a two time Nebula Award winner, and infamous shark lover. His latest book, *Night Visions IV*, is from Dark Harvest, with Dean R. ALAN M. CLARK is a painting instructor, designer of interpretive exhibits for a local history museum. He has just sold two cover paintings to **TOR Books**.

HAL CLEMENT is a long-time science fiction writer, artist and scientist. His newest novel is *Still River*. He also wrote *Mission of Gravity*, and *Needle*. See Program Book for more.

DARLENE P. COLTRAIN is an artist whose stenciled style has drawn favorable interest from buyers and critics alike.

JOHN DALMAS has lived a varied and enjoyable life, with jobs as diverse as teamster (horses) in the logging woods, coalpasser on a (long-since junked) merchant ships, smokejumper, research ecologist, and freelance editor. He has been writing sf full time since 1984 and enjoys playing with metaphysical ideas and cosmologies in sf contexts.

CATHERINE CROOK de CAMP in addition to being a freelance writer, has also collaborated with her husband, L. Sprague de Camp, on a number of books. She has written *The Money Tree* and *Creature of the Cosmos*. She is also the mother of two sons.

- **L. SPRAGUE de CAMP** has authored over 80 books, some 305 articles, and many short stories and poems. He gives us not only science fiction, fantasy and sword and sorcery (he has extended the *Conan the Barbarian* series), but also many books on such topics as Atlantis, magic and pseudo-scientific cults. Recent books include *The Purple Pterodactyls*, *Conan and the Spider God*, and *The Ragged Edge of Science*.
- **DEB C. DEDON** discovered you could make money selling pictures at the tender age of 12. From there she moved fast and furious to become ASFA Regional Director 1983-85. She is most known however for her one page cartoons and comics.
- BRADLEY DENTON is a relatively new writer whose first story appeared in 1984 in *The Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction*. More recently were *In the Fullness of Time* (May 1986) and *Killing Weeds* (November 1986). His first novel *Wrack & Roll* was published in 1986. His second is in progress and is called *Buddy Holly is Alive and Well on Ganymede*.
- **J. RAY DETTLING** is a freelance writer and technical consultant with numerous published sf stories and science fact articles. He has remained an active consultant to both the aerospace and the interactive video entertainment industries.
- RAY VAN DE WALKER claims that he writes SF with such bad dialog that he doesn't even subit it. In his spare time he is a Senior Sofware Engineer for Printronex, Inc. He also teaches and plays the flute.
- **FLINT DILLE** is well known among some circles as a world class writer. However, his books, *The Agent 13* series is just now becoming well known to th public. His best known works are scripts for *G. I. Joe* and the *Transformers* the good saturday morning cartoons. He is not only a writer for these shows but story editor for *G.I. Joe* as well.

MORRIS SCOTT DOLLENS long-time sf artist whose work has appeared in *Omni* and other sf magazines.

RONALD V. DORN, JR, MD, has been a science fiction addict since 1937. He became a doctor and spent two years as a Flight Surgeon for the Air Force. He is currently a member of L5 and the Space Studies Institute. He has had many papers published and is still a fan.

M. COLEMAN EASTON is a writer whose most recent novel is Swimmers Beneath the Brought (September 1987). His fantasy novels include Masters of Glass and The Fisherman's Curse.

LAURIE GOTTLIEB EDISON an artist working in metal jewelry and sculpture. She tends to blend science fiction, fantasy and feminist themes. She has been showing her work at conventions for the last 13 years.

PAUL EDWARDS was born an actor, director and playwright. He now divides his creative energies between writing fiction and professional engagements playing and signing "Blues". He is also a Knight and Bard of the SCA. His most recent work is in *Friends of the Horseclans*.

GEORGE ALEX EFFINGER has been called "the Franklin Pangborn of Science Fiction". His first novel What Entropy Means to Me was published in 1971. Since then fourteen novels, most recent novel, The Neck of Time, The Bird of Time, and When Gravity Fails. He also has written more than one hundred short stories.

MARJII ELLERS is the daughter of an artist and a scientist. She has been an incorrigible reader since *Skylark of Space* (1926 or '27). A flair for dramatic costuming on a pin-up figure caught Forrest J. Ackerman's eye at a Beaux Artes Ball; he invented her name and introduced her to fandom, where five Worldcon wins have qualified her as a Master Costumer.

RAYMOND E. FEIST has written the *Riftwar Saga*: *Magician*, *Silverthorn*, *and A Darkness at Sethanon*. He has co-authored *Daughter of the Empire* with Janny Wurts and he has a new book coming out in early '88 entitled *Faerie Tale*.

LESLEY FITZPATRICK is a long time member of the SCA and active historical costumer.

PHIL FOGLIO won the Fan Artist Hugos 1977-78. Realizing that this was the way to bigger and better things, he moved to Tibet to study bigger and better things and from there turned left into comics. Last seen in Mythadventures and dubious company.

ALISON DAYNE FRANKEL has done a very well received series of presentation workshops with Paula Crist. Alison has also done award winning costumes at various conventions.

JANET GLUCKMAN is a writer, lecturer, translator, editor and literary consultant. Her co-authored story *Timestalkers* was a recent CBS movie-of-the-week. Her last novel *Rite of the Dragon* has been optioned to Mark Taper Enterprises.

STEPHEN GOLDIN has over twenty books to his credit, including A World Called Solitude, And Not Make Dreams Your Master, The Eternity Brigade, Assault on the Gods, The Business of Being a Writer and the Family d'Alembert dekology. He has a Bachelor's degree in Astronomy, and has been likened to a koala bear.

SHERRY GOTTLIEB is the owner of A Change of Hobbit, the world's oldest and largest science fiction/fantasy bookstore. She was Special Guest of Honor at WesterCon 32 and is currently writing a book-length oral history of draft evasion during Viet Nam titled "Hell No, We Won't Go!"

STEVEN GOULD has been publishing science fiction sporadically since 1980 when his first story was in *Analog*. Subsequent publications have been in *Amazing*, and *New Destinies*. His most recent publication is "Poppa Was a Catcher," a novella in the Fall/Winter '87 edition of *New Destinies*. His 1984 *Analog* story "Rory" was nominated for the Hugo. In 1986 he made the enormous error of running for and being elected to the Directorship of the SFWA's South/Central Region, an office he holds until 1989.

SCOTT E. GREEN is one of the very few members of SFWA whose full membership is based entirely on poetry. His work has appeared in *Amazing*, *American Fantasy* and numerous small press magazines and anthologies. In addition, two of his collections have been published, *Baby Sale at the 7-11* and *Private Worlds*. He is presently serving his second term as a member of the New Hampshire House of Representatives.

JIM GROAT is basically a cartoonist and a clown at heart: He got into comics in 1983 and decided to self publish in 1984. By summer of 1985, Equine the Uncivilized hit the market. Still publishing black and white comics his future goals are in animation.

ALAN GUTIERREZ has done covers for <u>Analog</u>, BAEN books and software, and Tonka toys. (He's doing exceedingly well for such a young man.) His covers include *Imperial Star* and *Island Worlds*.

MARY HANSON-ROBERTS has work which appeared in a great many places. Gamers and convention attendees may recall seeing her illustrations in early issues of *Dragon Magazine* and *Fantasy Review* as well as many program books and fan publications. Her Tarot deck, published by U.S. Games Systems is currently in international distribution and she has recently worked with Andre Norton to produce a map and other items based on the *Witch World* series.

DAVID M. HARRIS is a senior editor for Byron Preiss Visual Publication. He has been the sf editor of Dell Books and Tower Publications and was an agent with Scott Meredith Literary Agency. He authored the adaptations of *The Wind in the Willows* and *Starman Jones* for computer, and an original computer games, *The Star Riders*. At present, he is working on the novelization of *The Star Riders* for Simon & Schuster.

GARY HERBELLA is currently employed by a local defense contractor designing advanced processing systems for autonomous vehicles. He has been a long time SF fan and large personal library.

JOAN HORVATH has a B.S. in Aero Engineering from MIT, Masters in Mechanical, Aeorspace and Nuclear Engineering from UCLA. She worked summers at Hughes and as a Master's Fellow at the Aerospace Corp. She currently works in Advanced Computing at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, looking into "neural networks" (computing elements that mimic the brain) to make robots for spacecraft smarter.

DEAN ING rocket engineer, USAF crew chief, professor in communcation theory and author of 15 books. In his spare time, he likes to fish, design sports car prototypes, and work with model aircraft.

PHIL JENNINGS has his first book *Tower to the Sky* coming out in March of '88 from Baen Books. He also has 11 short story/novelette sales to his credit in F&SF, Amazing, Far Frontiers, New Destinies, Tales of the Unanticipated and IASFM, and he makes his debut as a fictional character in the July/August issue of Aboriginal SF.

JEFF JOHANNIGMAN is currently an Associate Producer for Electronic Arts, the publisher of entertainment software for micromputers. His job is to find, sign and manage some of the most talented software designers in the world, and, as an added

bonus, he gets to kibbitz on the game design. His past accomplishments include publishing six games for three different microcomputers, (the only successful one being "G.I. Joe" for the C-64). His great loves are: cats, comic books, bad movies, sf fandom, and his beautiful new wife. Not in that order.

MARY JOHNSON is a long time member of the SCA, former Baroness of Tir Ysgthr. She is very active in historical costuming and related skills.

KAT KANEY is an Phoenix fan active in both costuming and SCA.

JAY KAY KLEIN sold his first story in 1969, started reading sf at the age of 7, became an active fan at 14, and was Fan Guest of Honor at the 1974 WorldCon. His "Biolog" column in *Analog* is a continuing feature. His photographs of people in sf and its events have been widely used in books, magazines, and newspapers.

ED KLINE is well known for his strange sense of humor and electronic gadgets.

DANA KRAMER-ROLLS with a background in genetics, martial arts, theatre, music, painting, human ecology, and a variety of other subjects she has turned out three books. *Cut by Emerald* (ACE) an interactive combat adventure; a fantasy *Magic War Horn* (TOR), and an adventure *Blast Out in Lebanon* (TSR), are due out this fall.

JACQUELINE LICHTENBERG grew up in the fifties with all the potentials of nuclear power and all the sf novels of the horrors of mutation. She won acclaim for her *Star Trek* fan fiction, was the primary author of *Star Trek Lives!* and was the founder of the STAR TREK WELCOMMITTEE. Currently, she runs the SF Writers of American Speakers' Bureau, writes and in her spare time gives Tarot and writing workshops.

DAVID LIPPMANN got his B.S. in chemistry in 1947 and M.A. in chemistry in 1949 form the University of Texas; and PhD in chemistry in 1953 from Berkley. Between 1953 and 1963 he did industrial research on rocket and gun propellents and underwater buoyancy systems. 1963 to present he has been teaching chemistry at Southwest Texas State University, researching rates of condensation of gases and chemistry and physics of opals. His hobbies are in order: gems, weapons and science fiction.

JAN LOCKETT is an Arizona fan and long time SCA member. She is often asked at cons to show people how to tat. Take the tatting class and learn from the best. Currently she is Vice President of the S.W. Costumers Guild.

DANA MacDERMOTT has worked on many award winning costume presentations at major and minor conventions. Most recent was "The Summoning" at the 1987 WesterCon featuring Jon-Ton, the Wizard Clothahump.

KEN MACKLIN is an artist with a truly warped sense of comedy. He can and does take you for brief stops in the lives of a band of nutty, galaxy hopping critters.

CHRISTINE MANSFIELD is an artist whose drawings of wolves and centaurs have appeared in many convention art shows.

ROD MARTIN is storysmith by his own admission. A science graduate by fact that has worked for Exxon and NASA and is currently doing research into metaphysics and writing.

MARY MASON is beginning her career as a writer by collaboration with her new husband, Stephen Goldin, in a three book series for Signet/New American Library with the overall title *The Rehumanization of Jade Darcy*, a futuristic soldier-of-fortune. She dissects brains for the sheer fun of it.

BRUCE McALLISTER has done thirty-five short stories that have appeared in various magazines as well as appearing in anthologies. In 1971 he published *Humanity Prime* with ACE Books and has two more novels "in the works". He is called a writer's writer and is viewed as one of the fields more "literary" short story writers.

MICHAEL McCOLLUM was a regular contributor to Analog and has since turned to novels including A Greater Infinity, Life Probe, Procyon's Promise, Antares Dawn, and its sequel due later this year Antares Passage. He says he writes "Engineer Fiction", because it's the kind of fiction he likes and it's what Del Rey pays him for.

LORETTA McKIBBEN is majoring in Physics at ASU, and is currently writing a book on women in space.

VICTOR W. MILAN is a former cowboy and D. J. who has been making his living as a writer for better than a third of his life. His recent works include 1986 Prometheus Award-winner The *Cybernetic Samurai* and *Runespear* coauthored with Melinda Smodgrass. He's a charter member of the *Wild Cards* Mafia. A Sequel to *Samurai* is expeced out of Arbor House in late 1988, pending aggreement on the title. He lives on Jupiter with a pair of ferrets and large silly pups.

RON MONTANA is screenwriter and novelist with four movie options and five published novels to his credit. Shorter works have appeared in national magazines like *Alfred Hitchcock*, *Amazing Science Fiction*, and numerous hardcover anthologies.

JEFF MOORE is presently working on his PhD in Geology at ASU. He has published several papers on planetary geology, including a discussion of Manned Mars base science. He also does space paintings.

CAROL ANNE MUNSON is a costume designer and has been wardrobe mistress at Northern Arizona University for three years. She specializes in structural and material effects, or how to make Roman armor out of garbage bags.

ROBERT "Bob" MUNSON was U.S. Naval Historian. He is also a military history buff (if you pick the right area). He is currently with the Arizona State Parks Service, with special interests in arid land geography.

currently working on seven novels, four collaborative and three solo. A *Ringworld* movie is in gestation.

MARILYN "Fuzzy Pink" NIVEN is a well known fan, who is often asked about tatting. She also just happens to be married to an author.

MARK O'GREEN wrote his first game project, *The Hole Delver's Catalog*, to contain unusual items for fantasy RGP. It is set in an outlandish adventure. The second, *Tricks of the Trade*, will be out by NASFIC. The *Second Hole Delver's Catalog* will be out later this year, as will a game tentatively named, *Amazing Ginsu*. He is currently working on *Crossfire*, indoor paint gun games, and will subject everyone to **Sneeho**.

JOE PATROUCHE was instantly converted from Roman Catholicism to Science Fiction after reading Edward Hamilton's books in 1947. He used the 50's and 60's to get degrees, family and a job and has since done books on Asimov, Heinlein and Ellison. He has a love-hate relationship with sf that cycles and he currently needs to fall in love again, so help him.

TERESA PATTERSON is a costumer and event organizer who just did six masquerades in seven months.

GERALD PEARCE is a feelance writer who has had work appear in *If, Amazing, Galaxy* and others. He was a staff writer for the Walt Disney Sunday evening show from 1968-72. He lives in Hollywood with his wife and multiple cats.

RICHARD PINI is perfectly suited to publishing: he has NO experience what so ever. Before he tried publishing he worked for IBM, taught high school and earned a degree in astronomy. He and his wife, Wendy now publish Elfquest comics and opened their own comic company Apple Comics. He also has a book coming out from Father Tree Press, his publishing company. The book is entitled Law and Chaos and is based on Michael Morecock's Elric Saga. It is due out sometime this November.

BLAKE POWERS is a professional journalist, writer and photographer, who extensively covers both space and science programs for a variety of media. He attended the Space Academy in 1986 and was a recipient of **The Right Stuff Award**.

JOHN-ALLEN PRICE graduated from Bradley University in 1977 with a B.S. in LAS/ART. His books include Doomsday Ship and Operation Nighthawk which are W.W. II adventures. Extinction Cruise is a contemporary naval adventure, all three books are published by Zebar Books. He also has a novel in the works entitled Pursuit of the Phoenix which is about the space shuttle. PATRICK LUCIEN PRICE has been editor of Amazing stories since January 1986 and fiction editor for Dragon magazine since 1981. His occult nonfiction articles have appeared in Leaves from the Inn of the Last Home, the complete Krynn source book for the DRAGONLANCE Saga, and he recently collaborated on an anthology with Martin H. His second novel *Deserted Cities of the Heart*, is forthcoming from Bantam's "New Fiction" line, probably in 1988.

DAVID SMEDS is a graphic artist and author who just happens to have a black belt in Karate. He has written *The Sorcery Within and Talisman of Alemar*. Short stories include *Dragons of Light, Sword & Sorceress*, and *In the Field of Fire*.
