The main hotel and the site of all Program events and parties, the Doubletree Hotel at Randolph Park, is sold out. However, our overflow hotels (the Viscount and The Lodge on the Desert) still have rooms. We have a free shuttle running from 9 am through 2am the next morning among the hotels, so getting about should be easy. The Dealers' Room and Art Show are sold out. Final reports to dealers and artists will be mailed at the end of September. #### An Accomplice of Liars & Forgers

An Ethical Position Paper by
One of the Guests of Honor
of 1991's 17th Annual World Fantasy Convention
in Tucson, Arizona

#### statement by HARLAN ELLISON

It now appears ultimate and inevitable: I am destined ever to be in trouble with the righteous state of Arizona, cradle of liberty, home of the brave, land of the free, bastion of moral rectitude, and otherwise nifty showplace of honorable America.

The last time was back in 1978, when I was to be the highly-revered and oh-so-personable Guest of Honor at the 36th World Science Fiction Convention (aka IguanaCon) slated for the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Phoenix, Labor Day weekend.

Well, if you recall — and most of you have the retention of memory at a level we usually associate with things that make their residence in petri dishes — there was this big brouhaha going on about the

Equal Rights Amendment in 1978.

(The ERA: twenty-five words intended as Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, as follows: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account

of sex." Every poll estimated that between 65–68% of the American public was in favor of passage; yet on 24 June 1982, because of the determined refusal of fifteen states to ratify, the ERA was defeated. Along with a fistful of redneck states, Arizona was in that group.)

Having had my consciousness raised from the primordial muck where, as an average American male born in the '30s and inculcated in the ways of society during the '40s and '50s, it had wallowed happy as a pig in puke — raised howling and whining like Baby Sinclair by the none-too-tender devices of women far wiser than I — I'd been involved with passage of the ERA for a number of years. To the extent that the National Organization for Women had given me a pretty tacky medal for efforts above and beyond: an actual by-count total of more than 1100 hours spent on the lecture platform, in states so backward and depressing that not even obsessive ERA fanatics would consent to venture to those venues. Eleven hundred hours actually talking, which does not include the hundreds and hundreds of hours spent getting to and from those places, or the hundreds and hundreds of hours spent in dingy motels waiting to speak, or spent having "courtesy dinners" with the local NOW/ERA chapter officials. (You want to know from boredom? From massive heartburn? From conversations without charm? Go have dinner with the well-meaning, gracious and grateful people who bring you to their environs in service of a Holy Cause. It is to gnaw off one's own wrists.)

So by 1978, I had this sorta kinda moral dilemma where Arizona was concerned.

Because, you see, I'd accepted the Guest of Honorship of the Phoenix convention several years earlier — as is the m.o. of selecting World SF Conventions — and now I was in substantive conflict with myself. Even as I fought for ratification of the ERA, so I buttressed that position by refusing either to do business in, or visit, unratified states. I was turning down \$5000-a-night speaking gigs in Illinois, Florida, Georgia, and other benighted pus-pockets of institutionalized inequality.

But if I was boycotting unratified states, what was I to do about my promise to be Guest of Honor at an Arizona convention that would be (they advised me when I tried to back out)

"crippled, ruined, sued, shot down in flames"?

On the one hand, I'd given my word. And those who've gotten it know that it may take me fifty years, but I keep my promises. And that goes for THE LAST DANGEROUS VISIONS, too, despite meanspirited assholes like Greg Feeley, Christopher Priest, and other similar running sores who have nothing better to do with their time than stick their beaks into other people's business just to see if they can make the meat twitch.

On the other hand, I'd been annoyingly, publicly vocal about boycotting ERA-unratified

states.

Immovable object, unstoppable force. Cute li'l fella squozed in the vise.

My then-assistant (now married to Mike Moorcock) came up with a spectacular solution to the conundrum. Linda Steele suggested we rent a Winnebago, load it full of supplies, drive to the Arizona border, fill up with gas, go on into Phoenix and live out of the motor home for the duration of the convention.

Well, we did just that. We didn't spend a cent in the state (though Jerry Pournelle continues to try to pin on me the rap of having slept one night in the convention suite, and of hav-

thirteen years ago, and it was bullshit then as it is now, talk about how some people need to get a life!) and I performed every function as a highly-visible Guest of Honor. Even won another Hugo.

But you cannot *imagine* the amount of crap that was visited on me and those who supported my behavior. You'd've thought I'd given them an enema with a thermite bomb. How *dare* I bring moral, ethical, and political considerations into the arena of fan frivolity!?!

How dare I suggest others do as I had done, boycott the state by staying not in hotels but at public camp grounds or in private vehicles, denying Arizona even one penny of succor!?! It was the big flap of the convention. Just shut right down all the arguments about The New Wave and Heinlein's latest novel.

There was even a death threat, and the hotel called the cops, and they came with sniffer dogs and silent, stealthy SWAT teams, and suchlike. And the cops suggested that I really shouldn't encourage the crazies by wearing a chambray work shirt with a gigantic bullseye appliqued on the back.

But when it was all done, and I drove that long drive back to Los Angeles, having eaten my cake and holding onto it as well, I felt genuinely spiffy. False heroism, of course; but it is a rush, folks, I gotta tell you. Now I knew how Ralph Nader feels all the time.

Yet time passed, even if the ERA didn't, and here comes a year or so ago, and I get the call from Bruce Farr, Chairman of World Fantasy Con for 1991, and he asks me if I'd do him and his group the honor of being one of the two Special Guests, the other being this woman who, when we got married, proceeded to take the side of the bed I'd slept on for fifty years, without even asking and I'm not pissed off about it or anything, she's a wonderful woman, and I haven't even this much rancor at her usurpative behavior despite the fact that I haven't had a decent night's sleep since she insinuated herself into my life six years ago and my back cries out for Doan's Pills five times a day simply because I turn and turn all night trying to find those comfortable places I wore away for years, and don't give it a moment's thought, because I sure as hell don't!

So. Would I, in tandem with She Who Drools on the Pillow, my most excellent wife, The Electric Baby, would I be Special Guest? Heh heh. Would I?!? Hell, I'd only been waiting seventeen years to be asked. Half a dozen times in previous years, FantasyCon convention committees had sought to have me as the GoH (you see, I have this sorta kinda longstanding career in fantasy, as opposed to sf), and they'd been politely but firmly advised that the Shadowy Ancient Old Ones who ruled the FantasyCon venue from behind-scenes would sooner see Charlie Manson or maybe Jeffrey Dahmer as GoH than the dreaded Ellison...

(Sidebar. Here is your latest bulletin from the Council of Politically Correct Language. You are no longer permitted to refer to people of my height — which is 5'5" — as "short." We are now to be referred to vertically challenged. Just as those who formerly were tagged with the opprobria "crips" or "handicapped" now insist on the nomenclature differently abled, and we are no longer correct in using the words "dead people" for those who are, in fact, differently alive, so we must now have the good sense to refer to Jeffrey Dahmer not as a "cannibal" [sheeeesh, gnaw one paw and they give you such a bad rap], but as dietetically challenged or, more elegantly, nutritionally esurient, as Daniel M. Pinkwater said to me yesterday when we were discussing this and his radio commercials.)

...so would I accept, pretty please? Like I was really this hard to convince guy, right? So I blithered my yesyesyes, and Farr went off and won the convention bid, and I forgot all about it, and time passed, and one day I got this call from Bruce or one of the other card-carrying nuhdjes who haven't given me a moment's peace for the last thirteen, fifteen months or so, and I'm asked about what sort of travel arrangements I want to make, and I ask arrange-

ments to where? and the voice down the line says, "Why to Tucson, of course; for the

world Fantasy Con.

And I suddenly realize, with more than a smidge of horror, that Tucson is in Arizona; and I've been at odds with Arizona yet again,

for a couple of years, because...

Arizona is one of only two states in the entire goddam union that doesn't have a paid Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday, and I've been boycotting Arizona again, and holy geez, gang, but it's more than a decade since my last horrific go-around with Arizona, and here I am in the same bloody stupid impossible ethically-twisted situation as in 1978. And I drop my head into my hands and begin to weep like a true movie buff in 1967 when George Kennedy won Best Supporting Actor for Cool Hand Luke when it should have been Eli Wallach for his role in The

Good, The Bad, and The Ugly, because there I am, right in the ka-ka again!

Now let us pause for a moment, for a history lesson. Painless, I promise. But necessary in a nation where 68% of all college seniors tested were unable to name the adversaries of the United States in World War II; where only 22 of 1300 U.S. newspapers carry disclaimers with horoscopes, advising they ain't really "science" but simply horse-puckey; and where, in a recent National Geographic Society survey of more than 1600 adults, only about one-third could locate Vietnam on a map, 75% couldn't find the Persian Gulf, and 45% didn't know where Central America is located.

The Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr. was a black man who was as pivotally responsible for the successes of the Civil Rights Movement in America during the '50s and early '60s as was John Jay for the successes of the Continental Congress in 1776. To many people, he is the personification of strength and courage and decency, all that is best in the American character; and for most black people in this country he is as close to a demigod as anyone born of man and woman can get.

On November 3rd, 1983, a man who was then President of the United States — his name was Ronald Reagan, but you may remember him from Hellcats of the Navy (Columbia 1957) or as the host from 1962 to 1964 of tv's "Death Valley Days" — signed into law a bill establishing the third Monday in January as a paid legal holiday, Martin Luther King day. Its first nationwide observance was to be January 20, 1986.

On 6 November 1990, Prop. 302 upholding the establishment of a Martin Luther King/Civil Rights Day was voted down by the people of Arizona 533,510 to 516,274. In case your math skills are worse than your memory, that was a denial of the holiday by a one percent difference. 51% of the people of Arizona said no to that which is observed by more than 120 nations, the U.S. government, 48 states and... 21 Arizona cities!

To this day, Arizona remains one of only two states (the other is New Hampshire) devoid

of a legal, paid King holiday.

Prop. 302 passed in Maricopa County (Phoenix), Pima County (Tucson), Coconino (Krazy Kat) and Apache and Santa Cruz counties. It failed out there in the rural counties. Pools showed that voter age was a big consideration. Under-35 voted yes by 56%; all those Good Amuricans over 55 voted no by 57%. The minority vote was small. And the constituency that had kept King Holiday Legislation from advancing out of committees to the full Arizona legislature in 1972, 1975, 1976, and 1981–1985... the swell guys and gals who elected a loud-mouthed bigot, homophobe, racist and sexist named Evan Mecham as Governor... the freedom-loving and equality-espousing Arizonans who learned all about the joys of patriotism at the knees of John Wayne, J. Edgar Hoover, Richard Nixon, George Wallace, Orval Faubus and Lester Maddox ...well, they had their way.

And the rest of the country turned away from Arizona with the taste of ashes on its tongue. These are not Americans, we said. We looked at this creep Evan Mecham, with his tawdry appeals to the basest and vilest instincts, to racial fears and illogical demons,

and we could not believe that in this day and age the people of Arizona could be party to such a despicable manner.

Well, in fact, most Americans couldn't take it. In 1988 Mecham

was indicted on charges of fraud and perjury, and charges related to illegal campaign donations. He was convicted, he was impeached, he was tossed out of office on his ass. (And was acquitted of criminal charges in June of 1988. But at least he was wrenched away from the controls of the engine of state.)



Governor Rose Mofford took over, but the damage was already done. Mecham and his 51% of the population had become so detestable in the eyes of decent men and women that convention after convention decided to cancel plans to meet in Arizona. The NFL pulled the super Bowl. Church groups canceled. No one with any self-respect would book into the state. It cost Arizona more than \$30 million in lost revenues.

And Mecham, even out of office, continues to lobby against the holiday, as the rest of the nation watches... and boycotts Arizona.

(There is more, much more history that I could set down, dates and details, chapters and verses, names and addresses; in preparation for this statement I read hundreds of pages of information, prepared for me by Victor Dricks of Phoenix Newspapers, Inc. but you can check out all of this on your own. I'm sure the nitwits who attacked me for my ERA position have already begun to employ their vast cool intelligences to justify the moral and social positions of skinheads everywhere, in aid of slaying the message by badmouthing the messenger.)

Now, if you ask why I take all this so seriously, I guess I have to cop to a personal tilt here. You see, for a lot of other reasons, but mostly for this one, I admired Martin Luther Kind enormously: I was one of thousands who flew to Alabama in 1965, just another one who marched along behind him, from Selma to Montgomery, as State Troopers and Alabama National Guardsmen pointed rifles at our heads, as elegant white women mooned us from their porches, as Alabama intellectuals threw dogshit and garbage on us as we passed under their windows. Like everyone else in that long, sweating, frightened line of men, women, and children, I was there in large measure because of the heroic image of Martin Luther King, Jr.

So there I found myself, late last year, having given my word, having committed myself, to appearing as Special Guest at a convention being held in a state that believed (at least 51%) that "Martin Luther King may not be worthy of having a holiday established for him." Committed to attending a convention in a state where hundreds of other conventions of nobler intent had chose to give a pass. And I tried very hard to get out of my committment. I urged and begged and worried the question with Bruce Farr and his people for months. They were concerned, because they had advertised my name. And at this time I had no Linda Steele to think things through for me, to come up with a clever and all-around satisfying coup that would serve both masters of my conscience. This time I had to do it alone.

And I anguished over it; truly descended to bloody cuticles trying to reach an equitable solution. I know that has the tinkling resonance of foolish melodrama to many of you for who such situations pose no concern. I look at the roster of schools where students have been expelled for cheating; I listen to the comments of the Roving Reporter as he interviews men and women in the streets, who think the worst thing Charles Keating did was get caught, same for Nixon, same for that great hero Ollie North; I speak to network executives who have no sense of shame at the garbage they continue to slather on the screens of a nation's most perfect opiate. And I recognize that in many ways I'm a buffoon for my constant carping about this'n'that.

What am I to do, I thought, over and over, for weeks. If I take the route of convenience, then having walked that road more than a quarter of a century ago was adolescent

foolishness, and nothing more. If I stand on my hind legs and bark about this, if I boycott the convention and the state, what harm do I do to the Committee and that portion of their lives invested in this event?



And then, too, I could not shake from my mind the admonition of the French philosopher Charles Peguy: "He who does not bellow the truth when he knows the truth makes himself the accomplice of liars and forgers."



And then, one day, as if a silken breeze had found its way into the impacted confusion that filled my brain, it all became sweet and simple to me. I had the answer. I knew what to do.

Screw it.

In truth, who gives a damn about one dead nigger.

It's not as if it were something urgent, something real, like going to a convention of fantasy fans and having a good time!

There are all kinds of real problems to worry about:

Are fantasy trilogies ruining the genre?

What's happened to the market for short fiction?

Will there be any really good parties to attend, or just a lot of boring get-togethers?

Why should I befuddle and bedevil people, get in their face, suggest that social considerations have any place in the world of quests for golden chalices and unicorns and the enchanted dagger of Neptune? Why must I bother the status quo with crap like abortion rights and censorship and arming drug dealers if they're anti-Commie and the death or imprisonment of students and writers in a hundred different countries? What the hell has that got to do with the World Fantasy Convention?

This King character got blown away a long time ago. Worrying about some croaked jigaboo who's long-since been put on the worm's menu is counter-productive, annoying, out of line, out of place, out of touch, out of my mind. Screw it!

So what if gang kids slaughter each other, and Native Americans who ought to be happy we call 'em Indians are losing their heritage, and "developers" are paving over the whole damned planet, and the ozone layer is jazzed? Hell, Pournelle and Niven and one of their proteges have even written this swell paperback about what pains in the ass these whale-loving, tree-hugging ecology freaks have become. That's the real world, not all this brain-busting worry about things over which we have no control.

Let's party, dudes!

So I'll be there, right there in Tucson, along with all of you who can't be bothered worrying about this senseless boring crap. We can sycophant one another, and tell each other how terrific we are, and how we have the edge on the Mundane Crowd, and piss off to what's going down in Croatia and South Africa and the inner city. We know what's important: the quest for the Jeweled Girdle of Garnorathanath!

It's fantasy, guys and gals. Fantasy is our life. It's the wave of the future. And who cares where the party's being held, as long as we can root for our ball teams and toss down a brew or two and get laid once in awhile, so what if some fag actor withers and pukes and dies in pain from getting sex in a perverted, disgusting way! I finally got the message:



#### **Hospitality Suite**

We will have the suite open for most of each day and every night of the convention, starting at 9pm Thursday night through late Sunday evening/Monday morning. We hope that this will provide a convenient rendezvous for members and perhaps relieve some of the overcrowding at the other open parties. Please note that the drinking age in Arizona is 21.

#### Banquet

THE BANQUET IS SOLD OUT!! However, we will be accepting people for a waiting list as we expect A FEW spots to open up. Please check with Registration at the convention (if you're on the waiting list) to see if one opened.

As is traditional, the World Fantasy Awards will be presented during the banquet. The banquet will be held starting at 2 pm on Sunday, November 3, 1991 and will run (including the ceremonies) until approximately 4:30 pm. Tickets cost \$25 and are limited to 320. We will let non-banqueters in to watch the Awards ceremonies as soon as they begin.

The entrees are Prime Rib, Chicken Jerusalem (chicken breast, sauteed in basil, mushroom, and artichoke sauce), Broiled Halibut, and the Vegetarian selection will be stuffed artichoke with vegetable Ratatouille, served with garlic-flavored pasta. Meals include garden salad with ranch or honey/lemon vinaigrette, large portion of Julienne carrots and zucchini, 4 mushroom-cut red potatoes, rolls and butter, three-berry shortcake, milk, coffee, decaf, and hot or iced tea.

All selections have been upgraded as to size. Also, the Prime Rib allows a choice of Medium-Rare, Medium, or Medium-Well. PLEASE LET US KNOW BY OCTOBER 1, 1991 WHAT SELECTION YOU WANT. Otherwise, the default is Prime Rib, Medium.

#### **Child Care**

A-1 Beverly Messner Sitter Service, which is licensed and bonded, is providing professional child care service at the Doubletree Hotel for the convention. There will be a charge for the service, but we plan on keeping the cost reasonable at \$2.00 per hour per child. However, for convention workers who put in at least 4 hours a day, we will not be charging.

If you plan on using this service, please contact us by October 15 at 602-470-0494 and give the hours, names, and ages of the children. THIS INCLUDES CONVENTION VOLUNTEERS AS WELL AS ATTENDEES!! There is a limit of 5 children per sitter (depending on ages), so we have to know how many sitters we need in advance! If you don't contact us, we might not have space available to take your child.

The convention will be providing light snacks and one quiet and an adjoining noisy room in the Doubletree's Tower. The room numbers will be noted in the Program Booklet you'll receive when you register. Child care's regular hours are as follows:

Thursday, 10/31/91 6 pm - 10 pm Saturday, 11/2/91 9 am - 8 pm
Friday, 11/1/91 9 am - 8 pm Sunday, 11/3/91 9 am - 5 pm
If a member needs a sitter in their room other than the times listed, the full cost will be passed on. For one child, the cost is \$6 per





hour with a 4-hour minimum. An extra child (same family) is \$1 per hour and transportation is charged at \$8 per sitter. However, we will extend the official hours if several people express a need and we can pool the cost. Advance arrangements are only 50% refundable, so we need to get a DEFINITE schedule of your needs.

Many people have asked for more information on the ride and we are now able to provide the following report. We took four people on this ride: an experienced horse trainer, an intermediate trailrider, an intermediate level hunter-jumper (arenas only) rider and a neophyte who had NEVER ridden a horse before. ALL enjoyed the ride and completed it without trouble. The scenery is rugged and the trail does climb in places, but it has been carefully selected so that even the most inexperienced riders can handle the terrain. More experienced riders will find the horses several cuts above the typical "rent-a-nag" and the scenery as enjoyable as the horses.



#### Hotels

We're back at most of the same hotels we used for the 1985 WFC, including the Doubletree Hotel at Randolph Park. You might remember it as having the best lobby bar yet discovered! The Doubletree is sold out of rooms and suites; however, rooms still remain at the Lodge and the Viscount. If you are handicapped or need other special consideration and so MUST stay at the Doubletree, please call the convention office at 1-602-470-0494.

The hotels are seven to nine miles from the airport. The recommended way to get there from the airport is via Arizona Stagecoach (you'll recognize their vans by the horses painted on the sides of their vans). The Stagecoach runs from the center concourse, lower level (baggage claim level). They run 24 hours a day at 15 minute intervals. The cost is \$7.50 for guests of the



Doubletree, \$8.50 for the Lodge, and is no charge for those at the Viscount. For return trips to the airport, call at least 1-1/2 hours in advance (602-889-1000) to schedule a pickup time.



There will be a late checkout of 2 pm for the convention. The hotels will provide storage space for luggage for checked-out guests (such as during the banquet). There is no charge for parking at any WFC hotel.

The Doubletree is a resort hotel with year-round heated swimming pool and jacuzzi (open 23-hours a day), three lighted tennis courts, two 18-hole golf courses across the street and nearby horseback riding stables. Tucson has an average peak temperature during that time of year of 79 degrees F; 58 degree F at night.

There are many fine restaurants in Tucson, including the two large ones in the Doubletree. One of them, the Javalina Cantina, is a Southwestern theme with a large bar that's good enough to draw the general public. For the budget conscious, there is a Circle K convenience market across the parking lot. Again, don't plan to walk to "nearby" restaurants. The convention will be distributing a Restaurant Guide with your Program Book packet compiled by Tappan King and Beth Meachem.

The Lodge on the Desert, which was a runaway hit in 1985, has allocated 30 rooms to us this time. This is a hotel that will inundate you in "old southwest" atmosphere with adobe walls and spacious rooms. The rates are \$79.00 single/quad for "standard" rooms and \$89.00 for "luxury" (which we highly recommend), Call 1-800-456-5634, 1-602-325-3366, for FAX 1-602-327-5834 for reservations. One night's advance deposit is required by check or credit card.

Our main overflow is the Viscount Suites. We have 150 suites blocked. The rate is the same as the Doubletree, but includes some things the Doubletree doesn't. First, each room is a two room suite. Next, there is complimentary transportation from the airport for guests. Then there is the free breakfast (no, not just a continental-style) and evening hosted cocktails. This is a non-party hotel. Their rates are \$79.00 for single/quad occupancy. They can be contacted at 1-800-527-9666 (outside of Arizona), 1-602-745-6500, or by FAX at 1-602-790-5114. We suggest advance payment by check or credit card for one night to hold your room past 4 pm.

To make things easier on all of us for both choice of restaurants and for getting to overflow hotels, we will be running a free shuttle service. See the Shuttle Service article in this PR for further information.

#### Copper Star

Besides the high-quality Program Book that World Fantasy attendees have come to expect, the convention has produced a book of fantasy and horror stories, edited by Bruce D. Arthurs, with a Southwestern theme. This book, Copper Star, will be distributed on a complimentary basis to all 1991 World Fantasy Convention members.

It contains seventeen original short stories, totaling approximately 70,000 words. Illustrations have been done for each story by various artists, including our artist Guest Arlin Robins. We are selling a signed, limited (to 300), boxed version of the book for \$30.00. Advance orders are being taken for the limited edition, available only to members. Copies will also be for sale at the convention. Advance orders will be available at Convention Registration for pickup.

#### **Travel Information**

Following is a guide to Tucson and the surrounding areas that the staff of WFC have put together. To those who were here in 1985 and feel that they have no need to read this, shame on you. We have added a few more wrinkles and a map of Tucson and the surrounding areas for those who have a car and wish to find their way around (a complete map of Tucson and the surrounding area will be available at the convention).

#### **Historical Sights Around Tucson**

#### **Armory Park Historic District**

Just west of Stone Ave. is a residential district of the late 1800's by the Southern Pacific Railroad. Many of the homes were built in Queen Anne Victorians and a regional hybrid called Anglo-territorial, which is a blend of Spanish Colonial, early Mexican building materials with American design.

#### Barrio Historic (Barrio Viejo) Historic District

South of Cushing St. there are 150 adobes, possibly the best collection in the Old West. You should stop and see Cushing Street Bar built in 1860, a small museum of the area in photo's.

#### Charles O. Brown House

Located at 40 W. Broadway, this building of 1868 is now the Arizona Historical Society, shops, and restaurant. It is one of the best examples of Sonoran architecture.

#### **El Presidio Historic District**

North of Alameda St. is a Spanish presidio established in 1775. A daytime walking tour of the district includes: the Edward Nye Fish House, one of the grandest houses of its day; Plaza of the Pioneers, the Steinfield Mansion, site of the first running water bathtub; and other buildings of early adobe such as the Casa Cordova.

**Fort Lowell Historic** 

West of Crayfort Road located in the foothills northeast of downtown,





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this area is an actual fort with officer's quarters, storehouse, and trader's store. In 1873 the fort was the regimental headquarters of the Sixth United States Cavalry where Apache leader Geronimo finally surrendered.



#### Fremont House Museum

The Arizona Historical Society offers an extremely popular two-hour walking tour of the El Presidio Historic District every Saturday at 10am beginning at 151 S. Granada Ave. Reservations are required, call (602) 622-0956.

#### Mission San Xavier Del Bac

Located on I-19 at San Xavier Road, nine miles southwest of Tucson, this is the most photographed mission in the country. Built in the 1700's, this brilliant white, baroque architectural style mission is a must see. Prerecorded historic lectures play every 20 minutes throughout the day (except Sunday, when the lectures play only after 2pm). Open daily 9am to 5:30pm, call (602) 294-2624.

NOTE: The above sights are safe to visit during the day, but they are not wise places to visit at night.

#### **Desert Attractions**

NOTE: Desert temperatures may run 30° cooler than the valley floor — be sure to bring along something warm.

#### Colossal Cave

Located at the Old Spanish Trail, 22 miles east of Tucson, the name says it all for this incredible limestone cave. Tours are held Monday-Saturday from 9am to 5pm, Sunday till 6pm. (602) 791-7677.

#### Coronado National Forest

East of Tucson and south of the Mexican border, these pine forests with recreational facilities dispersed throughout the area are usually uncrowded. (602) 629-6483.

#### **Mount Lemmon**

40 miles north of Tucson (about and hour's drive from the hotel), this 9,157 foot peak is covered with forests and 150 miles of hiking trails. The Mount Lemmon Ski Valley is open yearround for sightseeing or skiing if it is snowing, (602) 576-1321.

#### Planetarium

The Grace H. Flandrau Science Center is located at Cherry Ave. and University Blvd. at the University of Arizona. Their planetarium features science films, a star show, science exhibits, and a 16-inch telescope.

#### Pima Air Museum

Located at 6000 E. Valencia Road, at the Pima Air Museum you can explore the history of U.S. aviation by viewing one of the largest collections of vintage aircraft in the West. Open daily from 9am-5pm and requires paid admission. (602) 574-0462 or (602) 574-9658.

#### Sabino Canvon

Located on Sabino Canyon Road, 13 miles northeast of Tucson, Sabino Canyon is a desert oasis where cottonwoods, sycamores, and willows grow beside cool, quiet, stream-fed pools. Closed to all motorized vehicles, there is an open-air shuttle that leaves regularly from the visitors' center. The shuttle takes a 7 1/2 mile round trip that stops along the way at picnic areas from 9am to 5pm. (602) 749-3223 or (602) 749-2861.

#### **Saguaro National Monument**

Twenty miles west of Tucson is the only place where saguaro cacti are indigenous. These stately sentinels can live to be 200 years old and 40 feet tall. The west side has a nine-

mile scenic loop drive with pullouts, marked trails and picnic areas.

(602) 670-6680.

#### **Desert Sonoran Museum**

Also west of Tucson you'll find the most distinctive zoo in the

United States with 200 different animals and 400 kinds of plants in alive desert settings... a must see! Open everyday from 8:30am – 5pm. Tickets: adults \$6, children 6–12 \$1, under six free. No picnicking is allowed, but they do have a (high-priced) snackbar. Plenty of water



fountains and shady ramadas, and wheelchairs and strollers are free. (602) 883-1380.

#### **Old Tucson**

Again, west of Tucson, this historic site is where many of your favorite westerns were filmed — over 150 movies and tv shows! Includes Simmons Gun Museum, featuring a collection of over 1,000 historical guns. Open daily from 9am – 5pm. Call for admission price and show times for the gunfights. (602) 883-6457.

#### **Titan Missile Museum**

Take Exit 69 off of I-19 to see the former site of an ICBM missile, (now a Titan II) with a one-hour guided tour. (602) 791-2929.

#### Museums

Note: Before planning your museum itinerary, please call ahead to confirm hours and admission fees.

#### **Arizona Historical Society Tucson Museum**

Located at 949 East 2nd Street, you'll find exhibits and a research library presenting Arizona's history from Spanish period to the present. (602) 628-5774.

#### John C. Fremont House Museum

By the Tucson Convention Center, between the Music Hall and the Arena (at 151 S. Granada Ave.), you'll find the lovingly restored 1880 house of Governor Fremont. (602) 622-0956.

#### International Wildlife Museum

Come appreciate 38,000 feet of world wildlife at 4800 W. Gates Pass Road (off Speedway Blvd.), (602) 629-0100.

#### Old Pueblo Museum

See a large collection of Southwest art and artifacts at the Foothills Mall, 7401 N. La Cholla Blvd. (602) 742-2355.

#### **Day Trips**

#### Biosphere II

Thirty-five miles north of Tucson, at the SunSpace Ranch in Oracle, you'll find the famous mini-simulation of planet Earth, designed for future space bases on the Moon or Mars. An eight-member team will inhabit it for two years, living on the food, oxygen and water their controlled environment provides. Reservations are required. (602) 622-0641.

#### Bisbee, Arizona

Just take I-10 ninety miles to the east of Tucson, and you'll find one of the infamous boom towns of the 1880's Old West. It is now almost a ghost town, and you can take one of the daily tours of the underground Copper Queen Mine. (602) 432-2141.

#### **Casa Grande National Monument**

Just take I-10 sixty-eight miles northwest of Tucson to see an ancient Hohokam four-story dwelling, museum exhibits, visitors center, and 45-minute guided tour. Open daily from 7am – 6pm, with wheelchair access. (602) 723-3172.

#### Nogales, Arizona/Mexico

If you're running for the Border, it's just an hour's drive from Tucson (on I-19 South). You don't need a visa or a passport, but cash is a good idea because shopping is the thing to do. Park your car on the American side (on Terrace St.) and walk across... otherwise you'll need to carry the title to your car with you.

#### **Kitt Peak National Observatory**





else in the world. See 22 different telescopes, models, exhibits, daily film shows, the visitors center and the museum. Guided tours are available weekdays at 1:30pm, and weekends at 10:30am and 1:30pm. Self-guided tours can be taken on weekdays from 9am – 4pm. (602) 327-5511.



#### Tombstone, Arizona

Visit the OK Corral! Take US 80 eighty miles southwest of Tucson to see one of the wildest and most dangerous towns in the West (now strictly for tourists). Old West shootouts are held every Sunday at 2pm. (602) 457-2202.

#### Tubac, Arizona

If fine arts and crafts are what you'd like to see, take 1-19 south for 40 miles. Galleries and artisans abound at the Tubac Center of the Arts, in a 1752 Spanish presidio.

#### **Tumacacori National Monument**

A Franciscan mission built in 1691, now a museum, is open daily from 8am – 5pm. The mission took 20 years to build, and then was deserted in the 1850's. Take I-19 forty-eight miles south of Tucson. (602) 398-2341.

If you don't want to rent a car, Great Western Tours offers trips to all the above, for between \$20-\$75 per person, including admission. Tour arrangements can be made by calling (602) 721-0980, or by writing to them at P.O. Box 31831, Tucson, Az 85751.

#### **Convention Shuttle**

The 1991 World Fantasy Convention is providing a free shuttle among the Doubletree, Viscount, and Lodge on the Desert Hotels. Note that the Viscount (which has its own dining facilities) is next to a large TGI Fridays Bar and Restaurant. The schedule will be as follows:

Thursday 4 pm - 2 am Friday 9 am - 2 am Saturday 9 am - 2 am Sunday 9 am - 2 am

They will run continuously among the hotels, through the wee hours after most parties are shut down. During peak times there will be two vans running. The vans will have a sign in the window saying "1991 WFC". Arizona Stagecoach has contracted for the shuttle service, and their vans have a large horse design painted on the side. However, remember that some of their vans are airport shuttles and so won't provide service between our hotels (they're the ones that don't have a "1991 WFC" sign).

Note that this is a literary fantasy convention for people who enjoy attending the Program. Therefore, there is no regular video program, no films, no masquerade, no wargaming, and almost no media emphasis. You'll also see no hall costumes or

weapons and very few people even wear a teeshirt.

We wish to emphasize that MEMBERSHIPS ARE REVOCABLE WITH
CAUSE AND WILL BE NON-REFUNDABLE. This is our way of saving

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that we reserve the right to ask those who cause serious problems to leave the convention. Fortunately, this is something we frankly don't expect ever to have to exercise.



#### **Function Facilities**

The space being used is the same as we used in 1985. That is, the Doubletree's Hotel's ball-room, pre-conference lobby, second floor function rooms, Library Rooms (where the discoused to be), and the Boojum/Bonsai room.

The Dealers' Room is half of the Doubletree Ballroom, with ready access for dealers. The two main Program tracks will be in the other half of the Ballroom with readings and workshops generally being in the second-floor rooms. The Art Show is in the Boojum/Bonsai room and the artist reception will be in the lobby area outside.

Evening program items, except for Thursday night and the major Friday and Saturday events, will be in the second-floor rooms. The Autograph Party on Friday night, the Open Mike/Cabaret on Saturday night, and the Awards/Banquet on Sunday will be in the Doubletree Ballroom.

Thursday night and Friday convention registration will be in the pre-conference lobby outside of the Doubletree Ballroom. Display tables and general information posting will also be located there.

The convention office, programming operations, and pro/staff hospitality will be located in the Library Rooms. These are beside the Art Show (near the Cactus Rose, the main hotel restaurant).

The Hospitality Suite will be in the Tower on the ninth floor — the suite furthest from the elevators. Child care will also be (at this point, anyway) in the Tower.

Most important, the lobby bar is located on the way to almost anywhere someone you want to meet is going. It's overlooking the pool, the walkway to the Ballroom from the lobby area, on the way to the Art Show and second floor rooms, and near the Tower elevators. Great place to hang out and lots of seating. Nifty salt water fish to watch if no one interesting is in the area (which is probably going to be rare).

We think that you'll find that we're fortunate to have a lot of flexible, yet attractive, function space available that is quite suited to a convention of this character. We hope you enjoy!
