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Author Guest of Honor Connie Willis

Connie Willis is the award winning SF Author of novels such as *Doomsday Book*, *Passage*, *To Say Nothing of the Dog* and *Bellwether* and many short stories. Connie has been awarded 8 Hugo Awards, 9 Locus Poll Awards and 6 Nebula Awards. Her books have an epic feel to them and range from laugh out loud funny to very deadly serious. In addition to populating her stories with believable characters, the amount of research she does for background material is impressive.

Whether it is details about life during the time of the black plague, famous (and not so famous) last words or all the different versions of "White Christmas", her books are filled with details that other authors wouldn't bother to include. She is currently working on *All Clear*, a time travel novel to the time of the London Blitz. Her most recent novel, *Passage*, deals with the study of near-death experiences and the sinking of the Titanic. It was nominated for the 2001 Hugo Award for Best Novel, losing to Neil Gaiman's *American Gods*.

The <shudder!> Female Person from Colorado by Mike Resnick

You scare kids with stories of the boogeyman. You scare Democrats with talk about tax cuts. You scare Republicans with talk of abortion. You scare publishers with talk of royalty audits. Stuff like that almost always works — on lesser mortals.

But only one thing in all the world scares me: the <shudder!> Female Person From Colorado.

Her name is Connie Willis — I avoid using it whenever possible — and I have lost 103 Hugos to her. (Okay, 87 — but it _feels_ like 103.)

So what is it (I hear you ask) that is so frightening about her? Why does she terrify me?

Let me count the ways.

1. _The Female Person is into humiliation._ I have 4 Hugos. That's a lifetime's worth, more than I ever dreamed of winning when I started out in this field. It should impress just about anyone. But not the

Female Person From Colorado. She has 8, more than anyone in history.

I have a Nebula. Worked like hell to win it. Looked great on my trophy shelf — until I saw her collection of Nebulas. 6 of them. More than anyone in history.

Okay, so I can't out-trophy her. But I've won the _Asimov's_ Readers Poll 4 times. That's something worth bragging about. Or it was until I found out that one person in history has won it more often. Guess who? I have a Locus Award. She has 8. *sigh*

The list goes on and on. It really makes you stop and wonder, just how greedy can one woman get?

2. _She's a sadist, minus the whips and



leather._ You think not? Ask any writer who has ever been nominated for a Hugo or Nebula when the wildly-popular Female Person From Colorado is the presenter. She not only gets the audience laughing hysterically with her endless presentations, but despite the tension, despite the importance to careers and to the accumulation of groupies, despite everything, she even gets the _nominees_ laughing. Talk about cruelty.

(So why do we put up with it? I mean, besides the fact that she's so funny you'd _pay_ to see her on a stage? The answer is simple: if you are a nominee and she is the presenter, the odds are 1-in-5 that she will present you with a major award. Whereas if you are both nominees, the odds are about 200-to-1 that she'll beat you without drawing a deep breath.)

3. _She made a fool out of Andy Warhol._ How does one do that? Easy. For decades we've all been quoting Warhol to the effect that everyone deserved 15 minutes of fame. Well, _Locus_ just voted her the Best Author of the 1990s. Do you know how many 15 minuteses go into a decade? Pull out your calculator and do the math.

So much for Andy Warhol.

4. _She never repeats herself_. No 7-book trilogies for her. The only thing _Lincoln's Dreams_, _Doomsday Book_, and _To Say

Nothing of the Dog_ have in common is that the author's name is Connie Willis. (Uh...check that. They have one other thing in common: they all won major awards. Huge surprise, right?)

- 5. _She is impossible to imitate._ Not only is her felicity of expression totally unique, but so is her choice of subject matter and her approach to it. Who else could turn a screwball comedy about subatomic particles into a Nebula winner (see "At the Rialto")? Who but the Female Person From Colorado could turn a story about menstrual cycles into an hilarious Hugo and Nebula winner (see "Even the Queen", a story Gardner Dozois has dubbed her "period piece")?
- 6. _She's fickle_. All she ever wanted in life was Harrison Ford. Until he got divorced. Now she doesn't want him anymore. (I hear on the grapevine that she's transferred her affections to Cheech Spazio, who plays the fire hydrant in _Porky's XVII_.)
- 7. _She appropriates other people's religions._ She tells me that she is currently writing _All Clear_, a novel about the London Blintz. Hey, do _I_ write novels about the Paris Pork Chops?

(Okay, so I'll buy it anyway. And probably nominate it. And vote for it. *sigh*)

And now we come to the really serious stuff:

- 8. _She is thinner than I am._
- 9. She has more hair than I do.
- 10. She's nicer than I am.
- 11. _She's younger than I am._
- 12. _She works harder than I do._

And my fondest wish is that she wasn't so all-fired sweet and charming and friendly, and that I didn't like her so much, so I could hate her (just a little bit) on Labor Day weekends.

Artist Guest of Honor David Mattingly

David Burroughs Mattingly was born in Fort Collins, Colorado in 1956. David began drawing and painting as a small child, influenced by comic books, Edgar Rice Burroughs, and a wide array of artists from Jim Steranko, to N.C. Wyeth, to Jackson Pollack. After high school, he attended the Colorado Institute of Art, Colorado State University and later transferred to Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California. After school, he worked at Walt Disney Studios, ultimately becoming head of the matte department. He worked on "The Black Hole", "Tron", "Dick Tracy", Stephen King's "The Stand" and many others.

While at Disney Studios, David began doing freelance art. His first published piece was the album cover for "The Commodores Great est Hits". His first sale of art for a book cover was for "A Wizard in Bedlam," by Christopher Stasheff, published by DAW Books. In 1983 he moved to New York City, and a year later across the Hudson River to Hoboken, New Jersey.

David has produced over 500 covers for most major publishers of science fiction and fantasy, including Baen, Bantam, DAW, Del Rey, Dell, Marvel, Omni, Playboy, Signet, and Tor. For Scholastic Inc, David



painted 54 covers for K.A. Applegate's "Animorphs" series, along with the last 5 covers for the "Everworld" series. He illustrated the popular "Honor Harrington" ser-

ies for author David Weber. He painted the latest repackaging of Edgar Rice Burroughs' "Pellucidar" books for Ballantine Books. He is a two time winner of Magazine and Booksellers "Best Cover of the Year" award, and winner of the Association of Science Fiction Artists "Chesley" award. Other clients include Michael Jackson, Lucasfilm, Universal Studios, Totco Oil, Galloob Toys, R/ Greenberg Associates, Click 3X and Spontaneous Combustion. After 20 years of traditional painting, David bought a computer ten years ago and has mainly worked digitally since then, preferring the powerful new tools that working digitally offers the artist. Most of his work today combines digital painting, and elements generated in 3D programs.

David is married to Cathleen Cogswell, and they share their home with three cats, Buster and Annie and Henry.

In Praise of Dave by Jim Baen

(Or, "How to Be a Great Art Director")

Once, in 1983, Dave Mattingly dropped by my offices while Poul Anderson happened to be present. Poul and I were talking about his novel, *Firetime*. Dave just happened to be delivering the cover art for that novel. Poul's comment on first seeing it: "Magnificent."

I couldn't help but agree; it was indeed magnificent. This was a good thing. Firetime was set against a world background which had as its mainspring the ebb and flow of civilization across the millennia as horse barbarians (centauroid barbarians, actually) crashed against the ramparts of civilization as they fled the cyclical droughts caused by the millennial approach of their system's second, hotter star. Like me, Dave was very impressed with the grand theme of Firetime, and so he did something... magnificent. It was what the work catted for, after all, so that's what Dave delivered.

David Mattingly is the consummate freelance professional: He delivers what's needed.

But please don't get the idea that Dave is *just* a professional. I think of a professional as someone who does his job as a job, and nothing else. True, Dave is a master of his craft, but he also has a curious and slyly playful mind; and you must always check his asteroids for stray cats, and his naughty Christmas cards are a great pleasure. In fact, even the non-naughty ones are great fun, speaking of cats.

But to praise his professionalism is only to scratch the surface of Dave's artistic accomplishments. Back in the 80s Dave started to wonder what all the buzz about computers and art was about. Starting atrock bottom that inquiring mind of his began an examination of what an artist could

do better with a computer than without. In the beginning the answer was just a few things. Now, it is impossible to know with any certainty just what in Dave's work is computer-assisted and what is not, and far be it from me to say. I will mention, however, that it must be a great convenience to only have to invent the same spaceship one time and have it for all time, from every perspective and every possible frame of reference. Anyone who gets the chance should request a flythrough of the Mattinglyverse. I saw his video years ago and was blown away. Lord knows what he could show now.

In sum, Dave Mattingly is in the forefront of artists willing to use new technology, but he never ever forgets that he is creating art. When I need something to be right, something that fits and is of the highest quality, and on deadline, I call on David Mattingly — which of course means that I call on David Mattingly all the time, because David Mattingly makes me look good.

Music Guest of Honor Larry Warner

Once termed the "James Taylor of Filk Music," Larry Warner has written and performed filk music both locally and nationally since 1983.

Having appeared on numerous recordings produced by Off Centaur/Firebird, DAG, Thor Records, and Wail Songs, Larry has two solo projects of his own: "Through My Eyes" (virtually out-of-print), and "On Deck 11," the latter being a tribute to his favorite subject, the Star Trek Universe.

Lately, Larry is enjoying spending time with his wife Theresa and 11-month-old son, Grayson, while continuing to design exhibits at the Arizona Museum for Youth in Mesa.

He started out in Fandom as a Fanzine artist doing work on some of the early Trekzines.

Even today he sometime does hands-on workshops on Sketchboard Art at Conventions. Using his extensive Filk experience, he also sometimes does Harmony and Song writing workshops.

He remains an avid Fan of Star Trek in all of its incarnation though Classic Original Trek remains his favorite.



An Appreciation of Larry Warner By Gary L. Swaty



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Media Guest of Honor Lani Tupu

Multi-talented Lani John Tupu has two major roles in the prestigious Saturn Award-winning TV series Farscape. He is the cranky, unpredictable Captain Crais, and the voice of Pilot, the ship's naviga-

Lani is also in the international, critically acclaimed Australian film Lantana which won the AFI (Australian Film Institute) awards for Best Australia Film of the year in 2001 and which picked up no less than seven major awards.

Lani was classically trained in New Zealand Drama School (Toi Whakaari). After graduating, he worked steadily on stage in Auckland at Theatre Corporate. His colleagues at this theatre included Michael Hurst of Xena and Hercules fame. His second boss and Artistic Director at Mercury Theatre in Auckland was also none other than Jonathan Hardy, who is the voice of Rygel in Farscape. He then landed the title role of a doctor in Country GP for two seasons on national television before leaving for Australia, in 1985. The idea was to branch out across "the big pond," and see what fame and fortune might bring. It was a decision that he has not regretted. "If I hadn't left NZ," he says, "I wouldn't be flying around in space with

a wacky and wonderful bunch of misfits, such as the Farscape crew, and even more



so, meeting an equally wild and wacky bunch of sci-fi fans. My world has certainly expanded; it really is a long way from Kansas, Toto!"

Lani's screen film credits include Lantana, The Punisher, Liquid Bridge and his television credits include Farscape, The Lost World, Green Sails, Mission Impossible, Tales of the South Seas, Flipper (with Jessica Alba), Time Trax, Stingers, Grass Roots, Police Rescue and Tanker Incident, to name a few. His last stage appearance was with the Bell Shakespeare Company in Australia touring The Tempest and playing Antonio and Stefano. The last major musical he performed in, "when I had a voice and thought I could sing," he says, "was the title role in Jesus Christ Superstar."

David Franklin is best known to Sci-Fi/ Fantasy fans as the consummate Peacekeeper officer Captain Braca on Farscape.

Another memorable role is that of Brutus in season 4 and 5 of Xena Warrior Princess. He has also appeared in the series Time Trax and Flipper and Movies of the week include Survive the Savage Sea and The Flood

Latest features include Crocodile Dundee in Los Angeles, The Crocodile Hunter and Matrix 2: Reloaded, due for release in 2003.

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Program item FAQs

Q. What do the 3-letter codes that identify the panels mean?

A. We used them to keep track of all the different types of programming that fans have come to expect. Meanings are thus:

Panels with code "FAN" fall in the realm of "General Fandom"

This category includes topics that fall within the realm of genneral "fannish" interest that don't really fit any of the other categories but that we included anyway.

Panels with code "WRI" fall in the realm of "Authoring"

This category deals with aspects of writing, from the creative process through grammatical construction, to the practical aspects of getting your work published.

Panels with code "ART" fall in the realm of "Artistry"

This category deals with aspects of art, from the creative process through techniques to the practical aspects of marketing your work. Included are the arts of costuming, cartooning, fine arts, theater, movies and anime.

Panels with code "SCI" fall in the realm of "Science"

Good science fiction relies on authors' creative use of believable science and this track is meant to present updates and glimpses of the cutting edges of scientific disciplines and technology.

Panels with code "GAM" fall in the realm of "Gaming"

Gamers don't often leave the gaming tables for panels, but there are one or two times that a good panel or presentation will lure them out to the program rooms. This is the track for those few good gaming topics — which often coincide with other fannish interests.

Panels with code "FFP" fall in the realm of "Family Friendly Programming"

Kids are fen too, and this track is set to bring them into the fold by sharing with them all that first attracted us to speculative fiction and fantasy. This track of programming is NOT intended to be a daycare or babysitting service - but to provide families with children ages eight to twelve with activities they can do together.

Panels with code "MED" fall in the realm of "Media"

This category deals with movies, video, electronic fandom and the worldwide web.

Panels with code "SOC" fall in the realm of "Socio-Political Topics"

Socio-Political topics lend fodder for fandom's endless speculations of "What If..". Speculative fiction at its best starts with observable fact and moves toward a believable possibility. These topics help provide facts from credible sources and a forum for speculation.

Panels with code "RDG" fall in the realm of "Readings"

Readings are a chance for fans to listen to an author read from her/his own works.

Panels with code "ATG" fall in the realm of "Autographings"


Autographings are a chance for fans to get autographs from their favourite participants.

Q. I see WRI02 and WRI06 in the descriptions – what happened to WRI03 through WRI05?

A. The process of programming begins by making a list of LOTS of ideas, more than we can possibly use during the course of one convention. Each is given an ID code so that we can keep track of it. By the time the convention is scheduled, only those ideas that keep to our theme AND are chosen by the participants actually get on the schedule (you can't have a panel discussion without panelists!) So, the "missing" codes are left out, and the ideas are saved for other conventions. Oh! Now you know!

Q. A couple of the panelists listed in the Program Book weren't on the panel. (Or a panelist took part who was not listed.) Why?

A. At the time the Program Book went to press, not all the panelists had made final choices or been scheduled. Sometimes, our participants have personal emergencies and must leave, others who thought they could not attend find that they can show up at the last minute. We did our best to be as accurate as possible, but we couldn't see into the future — if you know anyone who can, please ask them to contact us to volunteer for next year's convention!
