

Diane Duane - Born in New York City, she grew up in


Diane Duane - Born in New York City, she grew up in Roosevelt, Long Island. After school, she studied nursing and practiced as a psychiatric nurse for two years until 1976, when she moved to California and worked as an assistant to David Gerrold. Her first novel was published by Dell Books in 1979, and she subsequently worked as a freelance writer. In 1981 she moved to Pennsylvania. She married Northern Irish author Peter Morwood in 1987; they moved to the UK and then to Ireland, where she currently resides in County Wicklow.

Her work has spanned a wide range of topics and venues. Her first novel, The Door into Fire, started the "Middle Kingdoms" series that has encompassed three novels so far. In 1983, she published the first book in the Young Wizards series, "So You Want to Be a Wizard?", that has been very successful reaching the eighth novel in 2005 with Wizards at War. 1983 also saw her first Star trek tie-in novel with The Wounded Sky. Her other Star Trek novels include the first Pocket Books hardcover Star Trek novel, Spock's World and her latest Trek novel, The Empty Chair, will be released in December. She's



also written almost two dozen other novels, some with Peter Moorwood. She has also written for television, both live-action and animated (Star Trek: The Next Generation, The Real Ghostbusters, Batman, and more), and been involved with the development of several series. Most recently, she and Peter co-wrote the script for the miniseries The Ring of the Nibelungs (which aired in the US as Dark Kingdom: The Dragon King on the SciFi Channel in March).

Abuthor Guest of Honor - Leter Moorwood



Peter Morwood –Morwood was born Robert Peter Smyth in Lisburn, County Antrim, Northern Ireland, and lived there for more than thirty years. From 1969 to 1975 he attended Friends School, a Quaker-operated primary and middle school in Lisburn, and then Queen's University in Belfast, where he studied English literature and acquired an honors Bachelors degree with an emphasis on middle-English poets such as Chaucer. During this period Morwood also took pilot training as a cadet pilot with the Queen's University Student Air Squadron of the Royal Air Force; though budgetary considerations (on the Air Force's side) forced Morwood to make a choice between his degree studies and his further studies as a pilot. He chose to continue his work in English literature, and subsequently resigned his commission.

After graduation from university in 1979, Morwood took a position in the UK's Civil Service as a clerk working for the Customs and Excise. During this period he began work on his first novel, which he submitted and sold in 1982. He adopted the pen name "Peter Morwood" in honor of his mother, whose maiden name was Morwood. (He legally changed his surname to match the pen name in the mid-1980s.) His second and third novels were published in 1984 and 1986.

At a science fiction convention in Glasgow, Scotland in 1985, Morwood was

introduced by author Anne McCaffrey to his future wife, the fantasist and science fiction writer Diane Duane. After several more meetings and a brief courtship, Morwood asked Duane to marry him, and they celebrated their engagement at the World Science Fiction Convention in Atlanta, Georgia. Morwood then returned to Northern Ireland to complete his term of employment in the Civil Service, and resigned his post in December of 1986. Shortly thereafter he relocated to Los Angeles, California, where Duane was working for the animation studio DIC. They were married at the New England regional science fiction convention, Boskone, on February 15, 1987. Later in 1987, Morwood and Duane relocated briefly to Scotland, and then, after a short period spent roving the United Kingdom, to County Wicklow in Ireland, where the two of them currently reside.

Peter's first novel, The Horse Lord, published in 1986 started the Alban Saga, which was collected in omnibus form by DAW in 2005 as a two volume collection called The Book of Years. His other series, The Prince Ivan series, was published in the 1990's. He's co-written several books with Diane Duane, including one of the more popular Star Trek novels, The Romulan Way. Most recently, he and Diane co-wrote the script for the miniseries The Ring of the Nibelungs (which aired in the US as Dark Kingdom: The Dragon King on the SciFi Channel in March).

Diane Duane and Leter Morwood

Let me tell a few things about Peter Morwood and Diane Duane:

Together, they are the most marvelous hosts you could ever imagine. I had one day with them during a business trip to Ireland but they made me feel incredibly welcome, fed me, kept me up late showing me things on the web and chatting happily about everything under the sun.

Peter likes weapons (no surprise). Peter would make a terrific teacher as demonstrated by his patience and enthusiasm. On a family trip to Ireland, we met the couple for dinner in Dublin and Peter enthusiastically showed my young son, Robbie, various weapons catalogues and engaged him in history and detail.

Diane would make for a good nanny. First, there's her training as a nurse. Then, there's her own uncanny ability to spout off any on topic from German cooking appliances to nanotechnology. At that same dinner, she and Robbie finished early (since neither could get a word in edgewise during one of Peter's stories) and he got fidgety. With ease, she took him by the hand, led him out of the Pub and they walked around the block window shopping. He returned calm and fascinated.

Their ability to absorb data, retain it and retrieve it at a moment's notice astonishes me. So does their ability to globetrot, enriching their lives and informing their works to a degree most writers merely aspire to.

Truth to tell, like Peter, I've also slept with Diane. When I first met her, she was sharing her Philadelphia home with several other women. One of them and a friend of mine had some mutual lust developing during the course of a few years. Some time later, we were at a convention in Lancaster, Pennsylvania and my friend and her housemate wanted to hook up. That left me and Diane to share a room - with a single bed. As I turned off the light, I quipped, "Gosh, I've always wanted to sleep with a Star Trek author" which leads me to my final fact: Diane hits really hard.

Author Guest of Honor - Marc Zicree

Marc Scott Zicree - Writing both individually and as a team, Marc and Elaine Zicree have over 90 dramatic television credits to their name, including episodes of Star Trek: The Next Generation, Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, Babylon 5, Forever Knight, Beauty and the Beast, Twilight Zone and Sliders. Marc's story for Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, "Far Beyond the Stars", was one of the more popular episodes featuring Benjamin Sisko imagining he as a science fiction writer in the 1950's.

Marc has served on staff on four series: most recently, as a producer on Sliders; as Co-Producer on Lazarus Man (on which he and Elaine co-wrote multiple episodes); Executive Story Editor on Beyond Reality; and Story Editor on Friday the 13th - The Series. Beyond this, he and Elaine have written seven pilots on assignment, including two for NBC and one each for ABC and Showtime. Their screenplay work has included stints for New Line, MGM, Orion, the Jim Henson Company, Davis Entertainment and Chanticleer. Elaine's plays have been produced Off-Broadway and in L.A.

Additionally, Marc was a commentator for three years on NPR's Morning Edition and is also well-known as the author of the best-seller The Twilight Zone Companion, which was nominated for the American Book

Award. Marc's recent Magic Time novel trilogy (co-written with Maya Kaathryn Bohnhoff, Barbara Hambly, and Robert Charles Wilson) was based on a pilot he and Elaine wrote for Henson

Recent projects for Marc and Elaine include Phillip's Head, a pilot for Showtime (about Marc's odd family); CORE, a drama series project with Star Trek's Jonathan Frakes attached as director; in association with OZ's Tom Fontana, wrote and executive produced Real Story, a pilot presentation starring Buffy's Armin Shimerman, and Liberty's Kids, a dramatic series about the American Revolution for PBS, featuring Walter Cronkite.

Marc is also getting ready to direct a new installment in the fan produced Star Trek New Voyages series, "World Enough, and Time", that he co-wrote with Michael Reaves. The story will feature George Takei returning to the role of Sulu for the first time in many years. He's currently working to develop new features with Ray Harryhausen

Marc Scott Zicree: an appreciation

I met Marc Zicree almost by accident. In 1999 when we were music guests of honor at Leprecon, my husband Jeff and I were serendipitously seated next to Marc and his wife, Elaine, at the GoH banquet. Marc and I started to talk about ... well, writing. Do you honestly believe writers talk about anything else — ever? (Well, okay, we do, but not willingly.) By the end of the meal, Marc and I had barely touched our food, and our spouses were laughing at us, but we each knew we'd met a kindred spirit. And so, I came to work on Marc's MAGIC TIME book series, for which he was seeking a collaborator for book two and a Keeper of the Character Profiles.

I don't have space to explain Marc Scott Zicree, so let me just sum up:

Marc is an extraordinary talent. He was a producer on Sliders and has written for such shows as Star Trek: The Next Generation, Deep Space Nine, and Babylon Five. In fact, he penned my single most favorite episode of DS9, "Far Beyond the Stars". It was an episode about — what else — a science fiction writer! He's also wrote two of the three Magic Time novels (in harness with Barbra Hambly and Robert Charles Wilson) and is the author of the definitive Twilight Zone Companion.

Marc is a generous mentor. He presides over an artist's Round Table in West Hollywood that connects and encourages and really helps aspiring writers, directors, producers, performers, and well, anyone who shows up for the meetings. And I don't use the term "Round Table" lightly. You may go in feeling like a schlump, but you'll come out certain that the Grail is practically in your hands. Only thing I haven't figured out is whether Marc is Arthur or Merlin — my money's on Merlin.

Marc is a bundle of energy. He's got more irons in the fire than most blacksmiths. These include his work pitching his original ideas for TV and movie properties, writing books and promoting them on radio and TV (the third novel in the Magic Time series made the LA Times Bestseller list), and working on the newest rage in Trek fandom: Star Trek New Voyages, for which he and our mutual friend Michael Reaves have written a script that will star George Takei. (Yes, you heard me: George Takei.)



He certainly made a difference in my life; I let him convince me to try things I'd only dreamed of and ended up going ... well, where no me had gone before.


So, if you have a chance to sit down and talk with Marc this weekend, do it. Then, let him convince you to try something you've only dreamed of.

Artist Guest of Honor - Sarah Clemens

Sarah Clemens - Sarah Clemens graduated from Florida Atlantic University with a degree in fine arts and art history, and the conviction that she would always be an artist in one capacity or another. She has freelanced in logo design and bookcover illustration and photography, worked as the curator of exhibits at a science museum and for the last fifteen years been a medical illustrator.

But the need for self-expression is most important, and she began creating her own challenges, in the form of large oil paintings of friends and family members. Her realistic approach was second nature, after so many years of meticulous detailing in medical illustration. She has shown her work at galleries in Palm Beach, Florida and Boca Raton, Florida, Scottsdale





Arizona and Beverly Hills, as well as exhibiting at the Society of the Four Arts in Palm Beach and the Armory Art Center in West Palm Beach and the Mesa Art Center in Mesa, Arizona. A recent move to the Southwest has been inspiring, and trips to the Grand Canyon for intensive photographic shoots are sure to show up in her paintings. Her forays into fantasy art have been well received, especially her series about Magnus the cat and Loki the Norwegian speartail dragon.

Living with Saxah Clemens (Recovery not included) by Rick Martin

I'm a friend of Sarah Clemens, which makes it tough to write about her. Friends are to be appreciated, admired, and loved, not rendered to mere text. Tougher still is being a fan of Sarah's, which means objectivity is tossed right out the window. I truly enjoy her art, as well as her other creations. This past spring, Sarah and her husband Ray Worley opened their home to me and let me stay with them until I had established myself here in the Valley of the Sun. I owe them big time! So if this ends up sounding like a total puff piece about CopperCon 26 Artist Guest of Honor Sarah Clemens, published author and damned fine cook, at least you'll have an idea why.

Most folks come to know Sarah through her art. The more popular examples of her work currently are the "Magnus and Loki" series of paintings, involving scaly and furry friends and the situations in which they finds themselves. Living with those two defines "interesting times." Where Sarah truly shines, in my biased opinion, is in her protraiture. The term used is "photo-realism," but that seems inadequate to me. Photos can be accurate and kind and show a person in their best light, but they cannot capture the warmth, the life, the textures of a living person the way Sarah's portraits seem to do. Though they are static, there are elements of the third and fouth dimensions incorporated in her paintings go far beyond capturing her subjects in a moment in time in the manner of a photograph. They capture life! After all that, one of her paintings best loved by me is "Victorian Boots." You'll just have to visit her web site, www.clemensart.com, to see why (shameless plug).

Then again, she did a medical illustration of a fish hook in an eye just for the fun of it. Go figure.

She also writes. Not nearly as much or as often as I would like, but there are only so many hours in a day. She's had some short stories published, worked on a couple of novels, and has a pretty cool project in the early stages that I'm quite excited about and will only teasingly hint at here. Like here paintings, she has a beautiful feel for distilling all the experience of a place and time into her work. She writes what she knows and she writes what she lives. Note to Stephen Hawking: Can we do something about that more hour in the day thing?

Sarah is earthy and refined. She works her cabinetry and her garden, knows Home Depot like the back of her hand, and will tell you of how she came to learn of and love opera while shoveling fill dirt for her planter. She cleans up nice, too. I've seen her most often in her "bag lady clothes" (her term!), taking for granted just how pretty she is when she gets dressed for an evening out. I like hanging out with the bag lady lots, but she should get out more.

Sarah appreciates. Sarah has taken to the desert like a lizard on a warm rock, just soaking it up. She likes good cheeseburger, nothing compares to the first Coke on the rocks of the day, and we both miss the wonderful neighborhood Basque bakery back in Florida. She's still tickled about looking out her window and seeing mountains practically in her back yard. It's as much fun watching a great movie with Sarah as it is watching a bad one.

Both Sarah and Ray have a great appreciation for soundtracks, and their music library is dominated by them. She has a scary memory for T.V. theme songs. Scary.

Sarah's a great cook. When I was their guest, I'd take a few turns in the kitchen, but Sarah's meals were real treats. Her influences are from all over the world, from the simplest egg salad to boliche. Her boliche sauce has me salivating. So does her egg salad. Dang. She's great at just throwing together a dinner that's delicious with a lovely presentation that just happens to be good for you. I still get invited over, and while the meals are wonderful, the real fun is helping in the kitchen. She introduced me to mezzaluna herb choppers, makes an awsome hollandaise sauce to go with the best damned egg poacher ever, and struggles to maintain an herb garden in the desert. It was sad to watch all that dill wither in the heat, but it'll be back next year. She puts fresh dill in her egg salad! Yum! And Ray's mother said Sarah's boliche was just as good as hers.

Sarah's funny. In the most refined environment she'll tell the worst jokes. If she's on a panel, ask her to tell you about her moment of triumph while waiting in line for a coffee and beignet in New Orleans. She's painted a portrait of a saint that has me giggling every time I see it. Sarah once navigated a friend driving to a museum in downtown Phoenix, all the while unaware that she was holding the map upside down. She still hasn't told him about it.

One of my many priveliged experiences with Sarah has been observing the creative process. In the time I spent in her home, I was able to watch a painting of fairies at a woodland tea party come to life, from sketch, the first layers of colors, revisions, to the last brushstroke. Each day I would wander over to the easel to say hello to the girls (all the fairies were girl fairies), see what was new in their world, and sigh. Creation is a beautiful thing, all the moreso if one can observe the hand upon the work.

This barely scratches the surface of Sarah Clemens. I leave it to the guests of CopperCon to discover the rest. See you there

Seanan McGuire is geographically unpredictable, although she maintains a residence in Northern California, largely so that she'll have a place to store the cats. 

We will provide a stage with runway, Masters of Ceremonies to announce you, a sound system to play the music or narration you provide, and a stage crew to bring it all together. An appreciative audience will provide itself: Your 15 minutes of fame on a silver platter!

Where/When

The Coppercon 26 Masquerade will be held at 7:30 PM on Saturday, September 2, 2006 at the Tempe Mission Palms Hotel in Tempe, Arizona.



There will be a Contestant Meeting at 2PM on Saturday. Check your Coppercon Pocket Program for the exact place. This is the time to prepare your entry forms and bring your music, notes for the MC, documentation, and to work out any presentation questions with the director and crew.

How do I Sign Up?

There will be signup forms set out near the registration table. Bring your signup form to the contestant meeting.

If you absolutely cannot attend the contestant meeting, give your completed signup form with signatures to the Masquerade Director. He's wearing the shoulder bag with the yellow sash.

Staging Details

The masquerade will be presented in the Palm E and F rooms.

The stage will be built of portable risers arranged into a rectangular main stage. The stage will be 24 feet wide, 12 feet deep and 16 inches high. You will step up from stage right to enter and step down from downstage center to exit.

The contestant preparation area or "Green Room" is the carpeted hallway behind the ballroom. We'll close it off with a curtain.

We will have water, mirrors, tables and volunteer "den mothers" for your assistance. The <u>Southwest Costumers Guild</u> will provide some emergency repair supplies. You should expect, however, to bring whatever tools and materials you will need for basic setup and maintenance of your costume. Sharing of resources among contestants is appreciated.

Lights and Sound

Lights will be arranged for general illumination of the stage. Don't expect special effects or anything too elaborate.

We hope be able to play audio cassette tape, CDs, and digital music formats submitted on CD.

The Masters of Ceremonies will have a microphone, but onstage microphones will not be available for contestants. If your presentation uses dialog, please record it on your sound track or TALK LOUD.

Narration to be read by the MCs should be submitted on 4 by 6-inch note cards or on the form we provide. Write or type carefully! Besides your introduction, please include the designer, maker and wearer of the costumes; and any sources of inspiration for the presentation. Character names and other unusual words should be spelled out phonetically (fone-et-ick-al-lee).


Your Master of Ceremonies will be <u>Jack Mangan</u>, author of Spherical Tomi and host of the <u>Deadpan Podcast</u>.

backstage, House Managers and Catchers to handle the seating, and a Judges' Clerk to help with record keeping.

Contestant Divisions

Masquerade entrants will be registered in one of these divisions:

Young Fen is for children. This is a noncompetitive division that gets lots of good "oohs" and "aaws" from the audience. Young Fen will each receive a special prize of chocolate Pirate Gold for participation.

Young Fen are expected to be under the supervision of a parent or sitter. We don't pretend to be qualified as

child care professionals. Older kids, particularly those who have built their own costumes, may choose to enter the Novice Division.

Novice is the division for contestants who have not previously won three or more awards in SF convention masquerades and have not previously won a Best in Show.

This masquerade is newbie-friendly--Try your wings! **Experienced** is the division for contestants who have won three or more awards or a Best in Show at previous SF masquerades, or who have extensive experience in theatre, historical societies, or other costuming fields. The contestant is on his/her honor in choosing the

division. We won't be checking resumes or anything.

(Hint: There are usually far fewer entries in the Experienced Division. Moving up in divisions can actually gain you a competitive edge.)

Performance Only This division allows you to show a costume that was rented, purchased off the rack or custom-made by a professional. In other words, costumes you paid for. Performance Only costumes are not eligible for Best in Show, but may win performance-related mentions like most humorous or best cosplay sketch. If your costume was made by a close friend or relative (for love not money), you are not limited to this division. Simply include the maker's name as part of the contestant team.

For Display Only is for persons who wish to display a costume, but not to be part of the competition. If your costume has already competed at a large SF venue like Westercon or Worldcon; or if you have some conflict of interests, your costume should be entered For Display Only.

These divisions are meant to be flexible in their definition, since we can't know in advance how many contestants will appear and what kinds of costumes they will show.

Prizes

We are planning special awards for Best in Show, for the Novice and Experienced divisions, and several Judges' Choice/Special Mention awards. These will most likely be in the forms of ribbons and certificates.

Anizona, Arizona's own annual Anime' convention, will present a special award for best anime' or manga-inspired costume.

Our roving congratulators will present Hall Costume Ribbons during the convention. No forms to fill out, just randomly presented thank-you's for spicing up the convention with

Prize Donations If you are a fandom or costume-related artisan, author or business person and would like to donate a prize for the Coppercon 26 Masquerade, please talk to the Masquerade Director. You will receive our gratitude and the chance to promote your work or products before a highly motivated fannish audience. You can also designate what kind of costume presentation will receive your prize (best historical, best special effect, most humorous, best use of duct tape--it's your choice).

Rules and Suggestions

1. Strong Suggestion: Please limit your presentation to 60 seconds or less.

It's longer than you think. Brevity is the soul of wit.

2. Rule: No fire or flame allowed on-stage.

The masquerade is indoors. It's a hotel & city fire code thing.

3. Rule: Wholly purchased or rented costumes may not be entered for full competition, but are welcome as Performance Only or Display Only.

You can use some purchased parts in a competition entry, but the overall costume is to be fan-made. An original arrangement of variously obtained parts (thrift store costuming) counts as a fan-made costume. If your costume was made by a friend or relative (for love not money), just be sure the maker's name is included on your signup forms. Any awards belong as much to the maker as the wearer.

For example, a Darth Vader with a store-bought helmet would be okay if you built your own cloak and chestplate. You'd certainly impress the judges more if you did build the helmet. If you have a store-bought costume that you'd like to show, or a cosplay sketch to perform using professionally made costumes, you are very welcome here. Just be sure to enter the "Performance Only" or "Display Only" division.

- 4. Clarification: The "Contestant" can be one person or a team consisting of designers, makers, and models. Everyone who worked on the costume presentation should be given credit on the signup forms.
- 5. Rule: Thou shalt not slime thy neighbor! No messy substances (wet, dusty, oily, sharp, etc.) that might damage the stage or interfere with other contestants will be allowed.
- 6. Rule: The masquerade is rated TV-14.

There will be children present and it's not our job to teach them the facts of life. Please, no more skin than beach-legal at a fairly liberal beach, no deliberately offensive language or disturbingly violent action.

If you have an idea that sounds good, but might be over the top, please talk to the Masquerade Director first. I have a fairly open idea of what constitutes TV-14 and how an idea might be made to work.

7. NO Smoking in the Green Room or Ballroom

8. Audience Rule: No flash photography during the stage presentations.

Flashes are very distracting to the contestants and audience. A sudden, dazzling light can cause a contestant to trip and fall. Non-flash pictures are okay. Posed pictures can be arranged offstage with permission of the individual contestants. If there is enough support for it among the contestants, we might do a second run-through for photos.

Please Turn Off Cell Phones and Camera Flashes



9. Law of Nature: S----Stuff Happens.

Yes, some of your plans may go wrong here in the real world. Murphy was a prophet. Please stay loose and handle it with grace. Don't let self-imposed stress or a hot temper ruin the experience for you and those around you.

10. Firm Rule: Keep the action on the stage. Weapons, stunts, and special effects must be approved in advance by the Masquerade Director.

If the weapon and its presentation have not been cleared, you will be disqualified from competition. This is a safety thing. I like weapons as much as the Next to Last Action Hero, but I want to see for myself what you are carrying and what you intend to do with it. This safety approval rule also applies to acrobatic stunts, special effects, energetic dances, or anything else that might inadvertently extend beyond the stage.

11. Safety Principle: Surprise the audience, not the crew. See Rule 10. I once scared the heck out of a masquerade director because I forgot to tell her that a pratfall was part of my presentation! If you are going to do something surprising, please clue in the Director, MC, and Catchers in advance. If you want to interact with the MC, you must rehearse with him at the contestant meeting.

This rule is intended to protect you and the convention from the real loons. The rule will not be invoked for frivolous or unfair reasons.

Security

This is the Weapons and Security Policies and Procedures for the CopperCon 26 convention held September 1-4, 2006. The Convention and Convention Security are not limited by what is contained in this document and will handle any and all incidents during the convention in a manner they deem appropriate for the circumstances.

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to security for appropriate action, which can include but is not limited to the following:

> Verbal cautioning

> Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches = revocation of membership

> Confiscation / removal of weapons or props

> Removal from programming / event

> Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue

> Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

Weapons Policy

Horseplay with weapons WILL NOT be tolerated!

No real or realistic firearms are allowed at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue. Firearms include but are not limited to the following:

> Handguns

> Long guns / shotguns

> Tasers / stun guns

> Any prop or device designed or intended to fire a projectile

Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace-bonded. Convention attendees will need to go to the Convention Security Office and have their blade peace-bonded. They will also need to read and sign a copy of the weapons policy.

Any attendee carrying a peace-bonded blade will need to carry or wear the blade in such a manner so that other attendees or anyone else present at the convention venue is not at risk to be struck by or otherwise physically encounter the sheathed weapon. Unsheathed or non-peace-bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any peace-bonded blade carried in an unsafe manner or any non-peace-bonded or unsheathed blade can be confiscated and the attendee could face further action by Security.

General Policies

Use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get in you in trouble in the real world, it will probably get you in trouble at CopperCon. Remember Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity.

Your badge shows that you are a member of convention. Attendees are required to have their badge worn and displayed so that it is easily seen and readable at all times. A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone. The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and your membership is revocable for cause at any time.

If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact the Security Office, a Security Team member, or any CopperCon 26 Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to insure that you have a good time.

Please feel free to contact Security at anytime if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.

Room Party Policies

If you are planning a room party please stop by the Security Office and fill out a party registration form. Room Parties are not required to be registered but you are encouraged to do so. Registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by convention security, and we will act as a buffer between you and hotel security. Non-registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by hotel security and the convention will not act as a buffer nor will we intervene if the hotel chooses to shut down your party. This does not mean that you can register your party and be excessively rowdy and avoid being shut down - the convention reserves the right to shut down parties or events or to withdraw convention recognition

and turn the problem over to hotel security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00pm of the day of the party.

The Tempe Mission Palms may have guests who are who are not convention attendees. These guests have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during latenight hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at The Embassy Suites Phoenix North to register your room party

The individual(s) registering the party are responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol.


