

Author Guest of Honor - Charlaine Harris

Charlaine Harris has been a published novelist for over twenty-five years. A native of the Mississippi Delta, she grew up in the middle of a cotton field. Now she lives in southern Arkansas with her husband, her three children, three dogs, and a duck. The duck stays outside.

Though her early output consisted largely of ghost stories, by the time she hit college (Rhodes, in Memphis) Charlaine was writing poetry and plays. After holding down some low-level jobs, she had the opportunity to stay home and write, and the resulting two stand-alones were published by Houghton Mifflin. After a child-producing sabbatical, Charlaine latched on to the trend of writing mystery series, and soon had her own traditional books about a Georgia librarian, Aurora Teagarden. Her first Teagarden, REAL MURDERS, garnered an Agatha nomination.


Soon Charlaine was looking for another challenge, and the result was the much darker Lily Bard series. The books, set in Shakespeare, Arkansas, feature a

heroine who has survived a terrible attack and is learning to live with its consequences.

When Charlaine began to realize that neither of those series was ever going to set the literary world on fire, she regrouped and decided to write the book she'd always wanted to write. Not a traditional mystery, nor yet pure science fiction or romance, DEAD UNTIL DARK broke genre boundaries to appeal to a wide audience of people who just enjoy a good adventure. Each subsequent book about Sookie Stackhouse, telepathic Louisiana barmaid and friend to vampires, werewolves, and various other odd creatures, has drawn more readers. The southern vampire books are published in Japan, Great Britain, Greece, Germany, Thailand, Spain, France, and Russia.

In addition to Sookie, Charlaine has another heroine with a strange ability. Harper Connelly, lightning-struck and strange, can find corpses . . . and that's how she makes her living.

In addition to her work as a writer, Charlaine is the past senior warden of St. James Episcopal Church, a board member of Mystery Writers of America, a past board member of Sisters in Crime, a member of the American Crime Writers League, and past president of the Arkansas Mystery Writers Alliance. She spends her "spare" time reading, watching her daughter play sports, traveling, and going to the movies.





"Charlaine Harris: Convention Memories" by Toni L.P. Kelner

It's awfully appropriate to write this for a convention program. I first met Charlaine Harris at a convention in 1994, and since we live nowhere near each other, most of our time together has been in hotel lobbies, restaurants, and bars. In honor of our episodic friendship, I present these convention memories, each one illustrating a bit of why you're so fortunate to have Charlaine as your Author Guest of Honor.

BOUCHERCON (Seattle, WA)

I don't remember who introduced Charlaine and me, but I do remember chatting with her at a convention cocktail party. Charlaine was firmly ensconced in the mystery world, while my second paperback original had just been released, so I was delighted to even be there, let alone to be treated like a colleague. A fan came up, introduced herself to Charlaine, and after a dismissive glance at my nametag, told Charlaine that she adored her work. Charlaine warmly accepted the compliments, then told the woman all about my books and how she was sure the woman would enjoy then, too. Later that evening, we spotted British mystery writer Peter Lovesey, and Charlaine pulled me over so she could introduce the two of us, and so she could tell him how much she liked his series. So I learned that Charlaine is gracious to admirers, generous to other writers, and as nice a fan as any writer could ever have.

CLUEFEST(Dallas, TX)

Cluefest that year had the misfortune of being held at a flaming disaster of a hotel. Charlaine, I, and a handful of attendees bounded at the bar, as survivors of such events often do, and the conversation turned to writing. Charlaine was working on her latest Aurora Teagarden mystery. These days, Charlaine is best known for Sookie, but do yourself a favor and read the Teagarden books, too. The way Charlaine simultaneously follows the conventions of cozies and totally subverts them is amazing. Charlaine was well into the book, but was desperate for a title, and described the setup: a body tumbling down from the sky to land in front of Aurora. "Dead over heels!" fellow writer Dean James crowed. Charlaine laughed herself silly, and used it, never failing to give Dean credit. So you see that Charlaine loves talking about the craft of writing, and give and take between writers. Plus she makes any convention more fun, even if the hotel is a pit.

SOUTHERN MYSTERY GATHERING(Greenville, SC)

Two panels stood out that weekend. One was Charlaine's panel about martial arts, where she handed out an outline labeled "Evolution of Whoop-Ass" and demonstrated a surprising variety of moves. Later on, she was on a humorous mystery panel I was moderating, and when given the signal, all of the participants donned red clown noses to show how serious we were about humor. Lessons learned? One, that Charlaine knows a whole lot about a lot of subjects. And two, that she doesn't mind making a fool of herself for a good cause.

MALICE DOMESTIC (Bethesda, MD)

Like Charlaine, I read science fiction and fantasy as well as mystery, and that weekend, we realized that we'd both discovered Laurell K. Hamilton's Anita Blake series. At the time, the books were coming out as unheralded paperback originals, and we were so excited about discovering another fan. We had a wonderful time comparing notes and speculating about upcoming

books in the series. Eventually Charlaine admitted that she was toying with the idea of writing her own vampire mystery. She just wasn't sure it would sell. It's easy to laugh now, but that showed something important about Charlaine: her courage as a writer. She was willing to take a chance and try something totally different from anything she'd ever done before. We can thank that attitude for Lily Bard, Harper Connelly, and, of course, Sookie.

BOUCHERCON (Milwaukee, WI)

Worn out from convention festivities, Charlaine and I retreated to her room for bowls of cheese soup and conversation. I was in one of those transitional states many writers endure, not at all sure about what I wanted to write next. Charlaine told me then that while she liked my books, she didn't think I'd yet written the book I could write. She was totally confident that I had greatness ahead of me. That night again reminded me of how generous Charlaine has always been to other writers. Her words and faith have kept me going through some tough times. There is no greater gift that a writer can receive.

MALICE DOMESTIC(Crystal City, VA)

I'd recently become friends with writer Dana Cameron, and the two of us met Charlaine for lunch one day. Either Dana or I made a joke about Richard Gere and the gerbil he'd supposedly...encountered. Charlaine had never heard the story. We had to explain it to her in some detail. You never heard such giggles. This from a writer whose love scenes curl the page! What did I learn from this? Nothing, actually. It's just a funny story. And Charlaine does like funny stories, whether or not gerbils are involved.

BOUCHERCON (Austin, TX)

I was sitting next to Charlaine at the banquet when she won the Anthony Award for Best Paperback Original for Dead Until Dark. The applause was thunderous, and her speech was characteristically gracious. Afterward, as we headed for the bar, I asked if she wanted to use my cell phone to call her husband and children back in Arkansas. She said that she'd rather wait and call them from her room, but she would like to call her agent. Since I've told you how sweet Charlaine is, you're probably thinking she just wanted to share the moment with him. That may have been part of it, but the real reason was to rub it in. You see, her agent didn't originally think he could sell the Sookie books. To his credit, he suggested that Charlaine check with readers knowledgeable of vampire books, and when they said, "We love it! Write more! NOW!!!" he took their word for it and did an excellent job placing the books. Still, Charlaine couldn't resist teasing him just a little. I thought I should point out that as wonderful a person as Charlaine is, she's still human.

COPPERCON 27 (Phoenix, AZ)

By the time this weekend is over, I'm sure you'll have your own convention memories of Charlaine Harris, and I have no doubt that they'll be happy ones. Enjoy, and tell Charlaine that Toni says, "Hey!"

(In addition to being long-time friends, Toni L.P. Kelner and Charlaine Harris co-edited the brand-new vampire anthology Many Bloody Returns.)

Author Guest of Honor - Michael A. Stackpole

Mike grew up in Vermont and graduated from the University of Vermont in 1979 with a BA in History. Instead of becoming a history teacher, he moved to Arizona and went to work as a game designer with Flying Buffalo, Inc. In 1987 he went freelance fulltime, worked on Wasteland, Bards Tale III, and The 25th Anniversary Star Trek Computer Game. He also started writing novels for FASA, GDW, ROC and Bantam Books. He is best known for his New York Times Bestselling **Star Wars X-Wing** novels and I, **Jedi**. His 40th novel, **The New World**, was published by Bantam Books in August of 2007.

Mike co-authored the movie **Gone** with Brian Pulido and the screenplay took the Grand Prize in **Fade-In Magazine's** Scriptwriting contest for 2006. Their second script, **The Sickness**, is in preproduction. Mike's first animated film, **Return to Thaumopolis**, was part of the **Lara Croft Revisioned** project produced by GameTap.com.

In addition to writing novels, short stories and scripts, Mike is an award-winning podcaster. He cohosts the popular **DragonPage Cover to Cover** program and has two of his own podcasts: **The Secrets**, a podcast for serious writers, and **Fortress Draconis: The Podcast**, which is an audiobook production of his novel **Fortress Draconis**.

Mike lives in the east valley and spends his spare time playing indoor soccer and dancing.



Anyway, I wondered what might be so amusing to this mumbler and chuckler, and so I sat down beside him and asked, "What's so funny?"

He looked at me and showed me a small advertisement and said, "I'm reading this Columbia House record offering that you find in the backs of various magazines and TV Guide and—

"—leaders—Falwell, Robertson, the Moral Majority . . . that ilk—would say about some of these offerings. For example"he pointed at one of the listings—"here we have Black Sabbath." His voice took on a portentous Falwell oratory cast¹. "Definitely Satanists. They ought to be rounded up and put down, or stood up against a wall and stoned." (We laughed over "stoned," envisioning the band sucking on weed.) "And then there's"—he pointed at a different one and intoned—"AC/DC, spawn of the Devil, I say, (you could hear the capital 'D' in Devil). Spawn of the Dee-Eee-Vee-Eye-Ell. And, right here (pronounced 'rat cheer') there's this song by David Bowie"—by this time I was well into the drift, and I interrupted him, and in my best deep south Bible-thumping voice (or perhaps that of Foghorn Leghorn) I said, "Looky here, son, I say, I say, son, any child of Jim Bowie has got to be all right. I mean, remember the Alamo! This here David has got to be—" By this time we were laughing ourselves silly.

"Hi, I'm Mike Stackpole."

"I'm Dennis McKiernan."

We finished off that entire list of Columbia House records, vilifying most of them (via tortuous, very twisted logic, I add), yet managing to save anyone that we remotely could (I mean,

Then we went and got a beer or something, and have been friends ever since.

Screen plays? (Mike, yes, but not me, I'm sad to say, though one of my stories was turned into a TV episode.)

Thugs? (Who threw that in?) No, not, nary, uh-uh, nope, nada, nyet . . . we're nice guys.

I could go on, but actually, Mike is skilled in so many areas that to write them all down would overflow this booklet. Like, for example, you want to know about serial killers? (Not that Mike is one . . . or I don't think he is. But then there was—ah, but that's just foolish speculation.)

Mike really is a nice guy. He's a good teacher, too. We've had many a long conversation over the business, craft, and art of writing, as well as what the future might bring. I almost always learn something when he and I have had serious talks, and I've learned almost nothing whatsoever when we've had extreme non-serious discussions (see way above).

As for this convention, I encourage you to engage Mike in conversation, for he is a very nice and a very interesting person. Ask him about screen writing and playwriting and novel writing and collaborations and Star Wars and gaming and anything else that comes to mind. (Heck, ask him how to solve world hunger and global warming or whatever, for, like all of us writers, we have a plan.)

Oh, yeah, I still don't remember at which convention I met Mike, nor the books he and I were promoting, but, hey, they have to be one or more of the books you can get at this convention (see, I never said we were modest)

I have been involved in fandom almost since I could remember; however, I didn't know it was fandom. My Family had been attending the Southern California Renaissance Faire since I was 3. When we found out that it was a literary society and a gathering place for friends of our from the conventions, After a few visits Heather joined as was customary and I tried to but was told I was dragged screaming and kicking I didn't need to pay. (Very Rare from the current treasurer at the time, Robbie Bourget) Both Heather and I said that Mom and Dad absolutely needed to come with us the next time we went. The whole family was now involved in LA area "fandom", I was Registrar of LASFS on more then one occasion and I am still Assistant Librarian, and Assistant Video Curator. I had already been helping out in "Kid's Room" at LosCon. When I was 16 I started being in charge of Children's programming at LosCon, I

changed the name from Kid's Room because I wanted and have somewhat succeeded at LosCons and other Conventions that I run the Children's Programming to integrate it as a programming tract geared for children that are fans, not babysitting.

I have been involved with the music side since I was 6 and we went to ConChord (Los Angeles Filk Conference). With my family and gaming group I have been involved get a word down in a song but not necessarily writing my own songs until recently when "the muse" grabbed me and said you will write this down. I have however been doing harmonies ever since I can remember and singing along with my friend Jan Kelson's songs as she wrote them and sang them at parties and cons. was asked to Coordinate the Music at Galifrey when they had Gary Anderson as Music Guest of Honor and the following year when they had Amberwolf as the Music Guest of Honor. I have since been the Music head or Co-Head for Baycon the last 3 years, I also was the Music second for Westercon 60. I am still running Children's Programmings at LosCon, I also have for ConChord, Consonance, multiple Westercons, NASFiC, and WorldCon (LACON IV) just this past year.

Heather Stern by Alison Stern (Sister and Music Guest of Honor)

Heather Stern has been involved in fandom since she was nine. She was however working with computers since she was little and her father brought home the paper terminal that he needed to use to log in to the work machines (PDP-11) in downtown Los Angeles because he was the on call fix it guy. Heather could actually match the tone that was needed to handshake with the machines in downtown. Which always impressed me. It is of no big surprise that Heather grew up to be a computer wizard, specifically with linux these days, and lives in the Silicon Valley.

While growing up she was introduced to a interesting musical style of singing and writing by going down a hall to find out what that wonderful music was. At the time the people who were performing were singing of conventions, computers, dragons, and more and she was so hooked she went to find our



father and said "hey Dad, you've got to hear this." From that point the whole family was going to conventions and joining in

the filk (science fiction and fantasy folk music) circles. In 1981 she was introduced to the convention ConChord (Los Angeles filk conference) down near LAX that year, and has been attending them just about ever since.

As it went along she started to have ideas and started writing songs of her own, sometimes to tunes already established and sometimes of her own design. She wrote or helped to write songs also with our father and a group of friends including Jan Kelson. She is a regular attendee and lately been in charge of the internet lounge at Consonance (the bay area filk conference).

She first ran her own filk, unwittingly, at a very small convention (Universe '88) simply by presuming that every convention has a filk, and then finding a room to host it in when it turned out not to be formally set up. She got married at LACON III, to a man she'd met by chance at that same convention, though she only really got to know him later through the LASFS and her local BBSs. combining her techie and fannish nature. Over the years she has been Music Coordinator at conventions: these would include Loscon, Baycon, Westercon 60, and NASFIC '99. She has also been in charge of or involved with Internet lounges at many conventions and conferences both fannish and professional.

She is greatly honored to be a guest of honor in the filk/music world at this convention. She looks forward to seeing you at the performance and staying up late to "Dawn Patrol" - after all, someone has to keep the coffee shop honest to its opening times over the weekend.

Gone West – Pete Manly 9/8/1945 - 7/27/2007

Younger members of Phoenix fandom may not remember Pete Manly. Over the past few years, chronic illness forced his withdrawal from most activities. But if you were in Phoenix fandom during the 1990's, you knew him. A short, silver-haired ball of energy, he seemed to be everywhere, sharing his knowledge with everyone who would listen. From astronomy to warfare to rockets, he'd done it all - and told us how it was done on science and engineering panels. When he dived into writing fiction with Dragon Three-Two *Niner*, he added writing panels to his appearances. And during spare moments at conventions, he held court in the lounge or at parties, entertaining everyone with his stories. His repertoire included dozens, perhaps hundreds of anecdotes, most centered on him. And no matter how often we heard a tale, we listened one more time, just because Pete was a born storyteller.

He was the guy who got my husband flying again after years of denial. For years, Pete spent Saturday afternoons up at Deer Valley Airport hammering aluminum to restore decrepit WW II warbirds; during one convention we got to talking and he convinced Mike to join him. Twelve years later, Mike is still flying because of that conversation. Pete's passion for aviation enabled him to wrangle rides that had other aviation addicts drooling with envy – he flew in antique war planes, with the Thunderbirds and on Concorde. His last article for *America's Flyways* covered the first flight of SpaceShipOne.

I had a special relationship with Pete; for some reason known only to himself, he decided I was his second favorite artist. (His favorite was, of course, his daughter Susan. I remember him sharing her latest drawing with so much pride he seemed ready to explode into a fountain of fireworks.) The first piece I illustrated for one of his stories was for *Unfinished Symphony*, which he wrote with Rick Cook. I did other pieces for him because his enthusiasm was hard to refuse. He always came with an idea for what he wanted and I'd come up with a different one. We'd grumble and grouse at each other for a while, I'd come back with a sketch of my idea, and he always said it was just what he wanted. Talk about charming the savage artist!

Pete could be unexpectedly thoughtful. He made sure I ended up with an *Analog MAFIA* pin (Many Articles Found In Analog), something I still keep in my jewelry box. He thought I might find the Full Moon Club interesting; it was a "group of writers who get together for food and conversation," when the moon was too bright for astronomical observation. 



Created by Mark Rein Hagen, Vampire: The Masquerade was the first of White Wolf Game Studio's World of Darkness liveaction and roleplaying games, based on the Storyteller System and centered around vampires in a modern Gothic-Punk world. The games uses the cursed and immortal Vampiric condition as a backdrop to explore themes of morality, depravity, the human condition (or appreciation of the human condition in its absence), salvation, and personal horror. Staging Details:

The masquerade will be presented downstairs in the Ballroom Suite. The stage will be built of portable risers arranged into a rectangular main stage. You will step up from stage right to enter and step down from downstage center to exit. The contestant preparation area or "Green Room" will have water, mirrors, tables and volunteer "den mothers" for your assistance. The Southwest Costumers Guild will provide some emergency repair supplies. However, please expect to bring whatever tools and materials you will need for basic setup and maintenance of your costume. Sharing of resources among contestants is appreciated.

Lights: Lights will be arranged for general illumination of the stage. Don't expect special effects or anything too elaborate.

Sound: We will be able to play tapes and CDs that contain only your music and/or presentation. General music selections may be available. If your presentation uses dialog, please record it on your sound track. . DO NOT SUBMIT AN ORIGINAL TAPE OR CD. The tape/CD should be marked with your name, costume title, and a return mailing address. Give your tape/CD to a Masquerade Director or the sound man at the walk-through on Saturday. Onstage microphones will not be available for contestants.

CONTESTANT DIVISIONS:

These divisions are meant to be flexible in their definition, since we can't know in advance how many contestants will appear and what kinds of costumes they will show. Masquerade entrants may be registered in one of the following divisions:

Young Fen: for children 0 to 12 years of age; and are expected to be under the supervision of a parent or sitter. This is a non-competitive division that gets lots of good "oohs" and "aaws" from the audience. Young Fen will each receive a special prize for participation. Contestants between 12 and 18 may choose whether to enter in the Young Fen or another division.

Novice: for contestants who have not previously won three or more awards in SF convention masquerades and have not previously won a Best in Show. This masquerade is newbiefriendly—Try your wings!

Experienced: for contestants who have won three or more awards or a Best in Show at previous SF masquerades, or who have extensive experience in theatre, historical societies, or other costuming fields.

Performance Only: Purchased or rented costumes may not be entered for competition, but are welcome as display-only. You can use purchased components, but the overall costume is to be fan-made. If you take a ready made garment and add details or decorations, it qualifies as fan-made. If you go out and purchase an entire Darth Vader costume from a costume shop it does not. If you collect a bunch of thrift stores finds and combine them into something wild and wonderful it qualifies as fan-made. When in doubt, ask the Masquerade Director.



already competed at a large SF venue like WesterCon or WorldCon; or if you have some conflict of interests, your costume should be entered For Display Only.

Clarification: The "contestant" can be one person, or a team consisting of designers, makers, and models. Everyone who worked on the costume presentation should receive credit on the sign up forms.

If your costume is something you designed yourself, it is an original. If your costume was taken from a picture, film, etc, it is a re-creation. If your costume re-creates a particular period of the past, it is a historical costume. If your costume is a recreation or a historical costume, I would suggest bringing a picture of what you are trying to create for the judges to see. You and our friends will know what you are going for, but the judges may not be familiar with the character/series/period.

PRIZES

Awards are planned for Best in Show, Best in Class for the Novice and Experienced divisions, as well as several Judges' Choice/Special Mention awards. There will also be an Anime award.

RULES AND SUGGESTIONS FOR PARTICIPANTS

- 1. Rule: Please limit your presentation to 60 seconds or less. Masquerade Director approval is required for anything that runs longer than 60 seconds. It's longer than you think. Brevity is the soul of wit.
- 2. Rule: No fire or flame allowed on-stage. The masquerade is indoors. It's a hotel & city fire code thing.
- 3. Rule: Thou shalt not slime thy neighbor! No messy substances (wet, dusty, oily, sharp, etc.) that might damage the stage or interfere with other contestants will be allowed.
- 4. Rule: The masquerade is rated TV-14. There will be children present and it's not our job to teach them the facts of life. Please, no more skin than beach-legal at a fairly liberal beach; also no deliberately offensive language or disturbingly violent action. If you have an idea that sounds good, but might be over the top, please talk to the Masquerade Director first
- 5. Law of Nature: S——Stuff Happens. Yes, some of your plans may go wrong here in the real world. Murphy was a prophet. Please stay loose and handle it with grace. Don't let self-imposed stress or a hot temper ruin the experience for you and those around you.
- 6. Firm Rule: Keep the action on the stage. Weapons, stunts, and special effects must be approved in advance by the Masquerade Director and Security. This is a safety thing. If the weapon and its presentation have not been cleared by the Masquerade Director and security, you will be disqualified from competition. This safety approval rule also applies to acrobatic stunts, special effects, energetic dances, or anything else that might inadvertently extend beyond the stage.
- 7. Safety Principle: Surprise the audience, not the crew. If you are going to do something surprising, please talk to the Masquerade Director. If you want to interact with the MC, you must get the MC's approval and rehearse with him at the contestant meeting.

8. Rule: The Masquerade Director has full authority to eliminate anyone from the competition on the basis of unrepentant bad taste, danger to the contestants or audience, violation of the above rules, or any other reason deemed sufficient. This rule is intended to protect you and the convention from the real loons. The rule will not be invoked for frivolous or unfair reasons.


RULES FOR AUDIENCE

1. Rule: No flash photography during the stage presentations. Flashes are very distracting to the contestants and audience. A sudden, dazzling light can cause a contestant to trip and fall. Non-flash pictures are okay. Posed pictures can be arranged offstage with permission of the individual contestants. If there is enough support for it among the contestants, we might do a second run-through for photos. Ask the Masquerade Director.







Security

This is the Weapons and Security Policies and Procedures for the CopperCon 27 convention held September 7-9, 2007. The Convention and Convention Security are not limited by what is contained in this document and will handle any and all incidents during the convention in a manner they deem appropriate for the circumstances.

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to security for appropriate action, which can include but is not limited to the following:

- > Verbal cautioning
- > Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches
- = revocation of membership
- > Confiscation / removal of weapons or props
- > Removal from programming / event
- > Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue
- > Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

Weapons Policy

Horseplay with weapons WILL NOT be tolerated!

No real or realistic firearms are allowed at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result

in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue. Firearms include but are not limited to the following:

- > Handguns
- > Long guns / shotguns
- > Tasers / stun guns
- > Any prop or device designed or intended to fire a projectile

Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace-bonded. Convention attendees will need to go to the Convention Security Office and have their blade peace-bonded. They will also need to read and sign a copy of the weapons policy.

Any attendee carrying a peace-bonded blade will need to carry or wear the blade in such a manner so that other attendees or anyone else present at the convention venue is not at risk to be struck by or otherwise physically encounter the sheathed weapon. Unsheathed or non-peace-bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any peace-bonded blade carried in an unsafe manner or any non-peace-bonded or unsheathed blade can be confiscated and the attendee could face further action by Security.

General Policies

Use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get in you in trouble in the real world, it will probably get you in trouble at CopperCon. Remember Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity.

Your badge shows that you are a member of convention. Attendees are required to have their badge worn and displayed so that it is easily seen and readable at all times. A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone. The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and your membership is revocable for cause at any time.

If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact the Security Office, a Security Team member, or any CopperCon 27 Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to insure that you have a good time.

Please feel free to contact Security at anytime if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.

Room Party Policies

If you are planning a room party please stop by the Convention Office in room 3037 and fill out a party registration form. Room Parties are not required to be registered but you are encouraged to do so. Registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by convention security, and we will act as a buffer between you and hotel security. Non-registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by hotel security and the convention will not act as a buffer nor will we intervene if the hotel chooses to shut down your party. This does not mean that you can register your party and be excessively rowdy and avoid being shut down - the convention reserves the right to shut down parties or events or to withdraw convention recognition and turn the problem over to hotel

security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00pm of the day of the party.

The hotel may have guests who are who are not convention attendees. These guests have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during late-night hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at the Embassy Suites Phoenix North to register your room party.

The individual(s) registering the party are responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol.






