Author Guest of Honor - Stephen R. Donaldson


Stephen R. Donaldson made his publishing debut with the first "Covenant" trilogy in 1977. He lives in New Mexico. His works have received 19 awards including the World Fantasy Award ("Reave the Just and Other Tales.") He has published the science fiction "Gap" series and the "Man who.." series of mysteries among his 40 publishing credits.. In 1993 he received a Doctor of Literature degree from the College of Wooster, and in 1994 he gained a black belt in Shotokan karate. Donaldson recently spent quite some time "on vacation." However, he is currently hard at work on "The Last Chronicles of Thomas Covenant."

Stephen R. Donaldson: An Appreciation by Michael A. Stackpole

I am sincerely envious of all of you getting to enjoy Stephen R. Donaldson's wit and charm this weekend. I sincerely wish I could be at CopperCon (and if not for a prior commitment, I would be.) You are fortunate enough to have with you one of the most intelligent and articulate authors in the world.

I first read Steve's work when I was in college. Lord Foul's Bane hooked me solidly. I actually skipped classes to keep reading. And when the flu hit, I had these most wonderful and terrifying dreams of The Land. What I loved about the books was that Steve introduced me to a brand new fantasy world that wasn't a LOTR knock-off, but a serious fantasy world, with issues and concerns that no one else had addressed in epic fantasies before. I truly think his work raised the bar for the rest of us writing after the advent of Thomas Covenant.

Steve's books were not without controversy. Because of that thing Covenant does in the early pages of Bane, many readers became very angry. I recall a number of writers (who should have known better) furiously claiming that Steve was a "bad writer." I'd look at them and say, "If he was a bad writer, you wouldn't care. The fact that he's just so darned good is what opens you up to that emotional reaction." Alas, those writers never got it and, now that I think of it, their careers have fallen into remission.



Steve is known best for his fantasy work, but he also writes science fiction and mysteries. I especially enjoy those mysteries, written as Reed Stevens. The same weight and thoughtfulness he brought to speculative fiction provides a lot of power in crime fiction. In the mysteries, since you're not figuring out lands and nations, you get to see the true strength of his characterization. He is right up there with Stephen King in his ability to fully realize characters and engage you in their stories. That is a rare skill, and one that makes every Donaldson book a treat.

You have the added bonus of getting to listen to Steve on panels. This is one of the reasons I love finding myself with him at conventions. The same thoughtfulness he brings to his stories he offers during discussions. He also tosses in a solid dose of humor, which is deliciously puckish and entertaining.

Please, make Steve feel welcome in the Valley of the Sun, and enjoy your time with him. It will make this CopperCon a convention you will long and happily remember.

Weston Ochse; Stuntman for Rent: An Appreciation by Yvonne Navarro

If you've ever received an email from Weston Ochse, you can't help but note the signature: Stuntman for Rent, Gun for Hire. Maybe you've wondered "Who is this guy? Is he as interesting as this makes him sound?" Absolutely.

Weston started life in the wilds of Wyoming but moved around quite a bit as he grew up. We won't say why he was in so many schools as a child, but it's been noted in the record books that he was the sole reason why one school installed its first public address system ("Weston Ochse, report to the Principal's Office immediately."). As his first step along the road to making an honest living, childhood acquaintances relate tales of Weston chasing old men down the street, waving dead snakes at them until the elders paid him to leave them alone. In high school he tried his hand at being a waiter, quickly learning in his first job at a Chinese restaurant that the way to ask a girl out was to put a piece of paper with his phone number on it in her fortune cookie. He went on to nab a couple of college scholarships, but the colleges just couldn't keep up with his energy. Finally he joined the Army and set off to see what the world had to offer him. Most of what he did can't be told (take THAT however you want), but let's just say it was quite the crazy ride.

Nowadays Weston is a retired Army Staff Sergeant who lives in Southern Arizona and soaks up the sunshine. By day he works on Fort Huachuca and occasionally travels across the country and around the world, still doing Secret Government Stuff. By night he works at home, doing Secret Writing Stuff. Even so, the world knows all about that Secret Writing Stuff. When you have talent that big, people—LOTS of people—find out, and they find out fast.

He hit the horror scene in a big way in 2001 with a collection co-authored with David Whitman and called SCARY REDNECKS AND OTHER INBRED HORRORS, following that a couple of years later with another collection with Whitman called APPALACHIAN GALAPAGOS. This second collection garnered Weston a nomination for the Pushcart Prize for Short Fiction. His first novel, SCARECROW GODS, won the 2005 prestigious Bram Stoker Award. Since these he's been all about writing, and the stories spill from his imagination seemingly non-stop. It's hard not to be noticed when you come up with piece after piece of fantastic fiction, then give each one irresistible and intriguing titles



such as "22 Stains in the Jesus Pool," "Hiroshima Falling," "Pitfighter Serenade," "A Day in the Life of a Dust Bunny," and "Glue and the Art of Supermodel Maintenance," just to name a few. Now, less than ten years later, he has a number of wonderful novels and novellas to his credit in addition to SCARECROW GODS, and he has contracts for several more. His most recent creation is EMPIRE OF SALT (published in April 2010), one of the Tomes of the Dead zombie novels in the series published by Abaddon Books.

Clearly a master at multi-tasking, his work has also appeared in comic books, professional writing guides, magazines and anthologies-- too many to recount here. He's written screenplays and flirted with having one of his short stories made into a movie. Somewhere in all this productivity he even found time to get a Master's Degree in Creative Writing. He writes non-stop, promotes with enough energy to make a publicist envious, and provides tireless support and love (yes, he has his softer side) to his wife, kids, and a menagerie of animals that includes two affectionate but flight-deprived parakeets and three special needs Great Danes. He likes to tell people he "...races tarantula wasps, wrestles rattlesnakes, and watches Border Patrol Death Race," but rumor has it he's not at all fond of spiders.

And be careful what you say around him. You'd never guess it, but this blue-eyed, blond-haired American boy speaks both Chinese and Vietnamese. Wonder what else he can do that he isn't telling anyone about?

Author Guest - Yvonne Navarro

Yvonne Navarro; Renaissance Woman: An Appreciation by Weston Ochse

When I think of Yvonne Navarro, I am reminded of Leon Battista Alberti. When people use the term "renaissance man," they are actually referring to Alberti, who could not only write, paint, create, and decipher, but could also tame wild horses, climb mountains, and leap over a man's head from a standing position. He was able to do anything he set his mind to... wonderfully.

As is Yvonne. She's the author of more than twenty published novels and a hundred published short stories. She created a reverse-name dictionary that has been in print for more than ten years thus far. She paints amazing acrylics and is equally adroit with graphite. Her creativity knows no bounds, other than the limitations unjustly presented to her by the too-quick rotation of the earth as it cycles day into night.

Yvonne climbs mountains. She rafts class five rivers. She's jumped out of an airplane. She rides motorcycles. She's not afraid of heights. She's not afraid of spiders. She is a martial artist who holds belts and ranks in more than half a dozen fighting arts. She is truly fearless in her desire to live life.

But she also has a tremendous heart. She has rescued four Great Danes over the years. Dear Lilly passed away too soon, but Goblin Monster Dog and Pester Ghost Palm Eater live on. Most recently, she sped 2000 miles across America in two days to rescue a blind Great Dane. Now, along with two parakeets, two Great Danes and a husband, she cares for this special needs dog, dubbed Mad Dog Ghoulie Sonar Brain, who loves and trusts her implicitly.

She also cares for a special needs husband. He once smoked and drank too much. He was slovenly and could often be seen shuffling down the street. People crossed to the other side when they saw him. But after bathing in the love and affection of Yvonne, he cleaned himself up and became the man he is today, someone who is always proud and pleased to call Yvonne his wife.

But Yvonne is best known as a writer, her work winning awards ranging from the Bram Stoker Award, to the Illinois Women's Press Awards, to the National Women's Press Award. She was one of the core Buffy



the Vampire Slayer authors. She's been known to write movie novelizations for such films as Hellboy, Species I and II, Elektra, and Ultraviolet, as well as a tie-in novel to the Aliens franchise called Aliens: Music of the Spears.

Yvonne is proudest of her own original fiction. She exploded onto the scene in 1993 with Afterage, which was a finalist for the Bram Stoker Award and named by Science Fiction Chronicle as "one of the best horror novels of 1993." Her subsequent novels deadrush (sic), Deadtimes and Mirror Me cemented her as an exceptional horror author. But ever the polymath, horror couldn't hold her. Yvonne researched, created and wrote two epic science fiction novels, Final Impact and Red Shadows. Yvonne has written a thriller titled That's Not My Name. She is currently working on The Dark Redemption Series. The first novel about an angel escaped from Hell is called Highborn and will premiere in November from Pocket Books.

Clearly there is nothing that Yvonne can't do if she sets her mind to it. I've contacted Encyclopedia Britannica. If they can have Leon Battista Alberti as their example for a renaissance man, then it's only appropriate for them to have Yvonne Navarro as their example for a renaissance woman.

I'm awaiting a reply.



I met David Lee Summers a number of years ago at Coppercon and we immediately struck up a friendship. My work has appeared in the magazine David edits, Tales of the Talisman, on several occasions. I interviewed him for a video podcast I once hosted, and one of his stories is likely to soon appear in an anthology I am editing.

David is a professional astronomer at Kitt Peak Observatory. The observatory is located in Arizona, and David lives in New Mexico. He has a pretty rough go, commuting regularly for extended stays at the observatory then back to New Mexico for visits with the family. Such is the life of an astronomer.

Interestingly enough, David and I had a common acquaintance that we each met through different channels. The late Keith Allen Daniels, a science fiction poet, appeared in Hadrosaur Tales, the predecessor to Tales of the Talisman, long before I started writing seriously. I worked with Keith in a laboratory of a start-up bio-medical company in Silicon Valley. Swapping tales with David was a little like having Keith back for a short time.

David is an interesting guy. He speaks with the exact enunciation typical of scientists trained to be precise, yet he's quick with a joke and isn't a bit stuffy. His



writing is imaginative and original. His magazine is of professional quality. He can tell you about his research in lucid language yet can turn around and speak at a high level with his colleagues.







Masquerade

What is the CopperCon Masquerade? It's kind of like a fashion show, it's kind of like performance art and it's all about COSTUMES!

Members of the convention who have created costumes from SF, fantasy, anime' history, and the many cultures of our world are willing to share them with you.

Want to Watch?

The masquerade performance will begin at 7:30 PM in Painted Mountain Ballroom A. Come by a bit early to get your seat.

Want to Show A Costume?

The stage is all yours! You can walk across and give us a spin like a top fashion model, or perform a brief "Cosplay" sketch. We'll provide lights, a sound system to play the background music you provide, and a Master of Ceremonies to introduce you.

Please come to the Contestant Meeting on Saturday afternoon. Check your pocket program for the exact time and room. This is the time to prepare your signup forms and bring your music, notes for the MC, documentation, and to work out any presentation questions with the director and crew.

If you absolutely can't make the Contestant Meeting, the Masquerade Director will be available on Saturday to assist contestants and handle last-minute details. Look for the person wearing the yellow "Masquerade Director" sash. There will be some signup forms set out near the convention's registration table. Absolute deadline for entry is 4PM on Saturday.



Masquerade, cont.

Staging Details:

The auditorium for the masquerade will be Painted Mountain Ballroom A.

The contestant preparation area, or "Green Room" will be the Palo Verde I meeting room. In the green room, you can do final preparation of your costume, interview with the judges, have your documentation photo taken, and queue up for your presentation. It is an open space without a lot of privacy, so you may want to do most of your clothes-changing before you arrive.

We will have water, mirrors, tables and volunteer "den mothers" for your assistance. The Southwest Costumers Guild will provide some emergency repair supplies. You should expect to bring whatever tools and materials you will need for basic setup and maintenance of your costume. Sharing of resources among contestants is appreciated.

The stage will be built of six portable risers arranged into a rectangular main stage. The stage will be 16 feet wide, 12 feet front to back and 15 inches high.

Participants will exit the green room and walk through either a kitchen service corridor or a gap in the airwall to the auditorium. The doors are 36 inches wide and 84 inches tall. You will enter from Stage Left by stepping up two steps, do your presentation, then exit downstage center. You will follow the center aisle through the audience to your reserved seat at the back of the auditorium.

If you have limited mobility or vision because of your costume design or natural physical limitations and this stage plan will not work for you, please speak with the Masquerade Director in advance so we can work something out. With sufficient advance notice we may be able to arrange a screened area to assemble your costume, have you enter through the double doors off the main hallway, or arrange a lift up onto the stage.

Lights and Sound:

Lights will be arranged for general illumination of the stage. Lighting special effects will not be available

We can accept your music/narration on audio cassettes, CDs, DVDs, or flash memory devices (camera cards or USB thumb drives). MP3 or WAV digital sound files are best. Please submit your sound no later than the Saturday contestant meeting. We will need some time to "rip" your sound track onto the sound director's computer.

If you purchased your music from an online store, it may contain "Digital Rights Management" (DRM) software that allows it to be played only on specially authorized devices. We will not be able to use music that contains DRM.

The Master of Ceremonies will have a microphone, but onstage microphones will not be available for contestants. If your presentation uses dialog, we recommend that you record it on your sound track, then lip synch.

Narration to be read by the MCs should be submitted the form we provide. Write or type carefully!

Contestant Divisions

Masquerade entrants will be registered in one of these divisions:

Masquerade, cont.

Young Fen is for children. This is a noncompetitive division that gets lots of good "oohs" and "aaws" from the audience. Young Fen will each receive a special prize of chocolate Pirate Gold for participation.

Young Fen are expected to be under the supervision of a parent or guardian. The guardian will sign the entry form/image waiver and guide the child through the proceedings. We don't pretend to be qualified as child care professionals! Older kids who have built their own costumes may choose to enter the Novice Division.

Novice is the division for contestants who have not previously won three or more awards in SF convention masquerades and have not previously won a Best in Show. This masquerade is novice-friendly—Try your wings!

Experienced is the division for contestants who have won three or more awards or a Best in Show at previous SF masquerades, or who have significant experience in theatre, historical societies, or other costuming fields. The contestant is on his/her honor in choosing the division. We won't be checking resumes or anything. (Hint: There are usually far fewer entries in the Experienced Division. Moving up in divisions can actually gain you a competitive edge.)

Performance Only This division allows you to show a costume that was rented, purchased off the rack or custommade by a professional. In other words, costumes you paid for. Performance Only costumes are not eligible for Best in Show, but may win performance-related mentions like most humorous or best cosplay sketch. If your costume was made by a close friend or relative (in other words, for love not money), you are not limited to this division. Be sure to give the designer/maker full credit as part of the costume team.

For Display Only is for persons who wish to display a costume, but not to be part of the competition. If your costume has already competed at a large SF venue like Westercon or Worldcon, this is the division for you. (Your director would take it as a personal favor if you would do an encore showing of one of your best costumes). For Display Only is also the appropriate division if you have some conflict of interests (For example, a costume made by one of the judges).

These divisions are meant to be flexible in their definition, since we can't know in advance how many contestants will appear and what kinds of costumes they will show. When in doubt, please converse with the Director.

Suggestions for Documentation: If your costume is something you designed yourself, it is an original. If your costume was taken from a picture, drawing, film, etc, it is a re-creation. Costumes which were inspired by a well-known movie, graphic novel/manga, or television show, but did not actually appear in that show, are sometimes called interpretations. If your costume re-creates clothing from a particular period of the past, it is a historical costume.

You can't be sure the judges have read the same books, studied the same periods of history, or seen the same shows that you have. You should bring a drawing, photograph, or other visual documentation for the judges to see. Keep your documentation brief. The judges won't have time to sift through a lot of paper.

Prizes:

Masquerade, cont.

We are planning special awards for Best in Show, for the Novice and Experienced divisions, and several Judges' Choice/Special Mention awards.

Best In Show will receive a Scissor Dagger presented by Southwest Costumers Guild. It looks like a jeweled dagger in a metal scabbard, but it's really a pair of shears!

Best in the Novice Division will receive a copy of Yoshitaka Amano's collectible art book, "Coffin: The Art of Vampire Hunter D," still in its shrink wrap. Coffee table not included. This prize was kindly donated by Mike and Theresa Contos.

Best in the Experienced Division will receive a pair of high quality Gingher shears in a velvet-lined presentation case, donated by Southwest Costumers Guild.

Children in the Young Fen division will receive a special reward of chocolate Pirate Gold.

We have ribbons and some blinky wonders from Mike & Theresa for special mention awards.

The Rules:

- **1. Strong Suggestion:** Please limit your presentation to 60 seconds or less. It's longer than you think. Brevity is the soul of wit.
- **2. Rule:** No fire or flame allowed on-stage. The masquerade is indoors. It's a city fire code thing.
- **3. Rule:** The competition is for Fan-Made Costumes. Wholly purchased or rented costumes may not be entered for full competition, but are welcome as Performance Only or Display Only.

You can use a few purchased components in a competition entry, but the overall costume is to be fan-made. An original arrangement of variously obtained parts (also known as thrift store costuming) counts as a fan-made costume. If your costume was made by a close friend or relative (for love not money), it's still a fan-made costume. Please be sure the maker's name is included on your signup forms. Any awards belong as much to the maker as the wearer.

For example, a Darth Vader with a store-bought helmet would be okay if you built your own cloak and chestplate. You'd certainly impress the judges more if you did build your helmet.

If you have a store-bought costume that you'd like to show, or a cosplay sketch to perform using professionally made costumes, you are very welcome here. Just enter the "Performance Only" or "Display Only" division. Sometimes a presentation has one person in a professionally made costume to help set up the performances of the "real" costumes. Just tell the judges, "We're using him as a prop."

- **4. Clarification:** The "Contestant" can be one person or a team consisting of designers, makers, and models. Everyone who worked on the costume presentation should be given credit on the signup forms. All persons appearing on stage shall be members of the convention.
- **5. Rule:** Thou shalt not slime thy neighbor! No messy substances (wet, dusty, oily, sharp, etc.) that might damage the stage or interfere with other contestants will be allowed. There is an infamous story about a costume covered with peanut butter. Yuck!
- **6. Rule:** The masquerade is rated TV-14. There will be children present and it's not our job to teach them the facts of life.

Masquerade, cont.

Please, no more skin than beach-legal at a fairly liberal beach, no deliberately offensive language or disturbingly violent action. If you have an idea that sounds good, but might be over the top, please talk to the Masquerade Director first. I have a fairly open idea of what constitutes TV-14 and how an idea might be made to work.

7. Audience Rule: No flash photography during the stage presentations. Flashes are very distracting to the contestants and audience. A sudden, dazzling light can cause a contestant to trip and fall. Non-flash pictures are okay. Posed pictures can be arranged off-stage with permission of the individual contestants. If there is enough support for it among the contestants, we might do a second run-through for photos.

An official documentation picture of each costume will be taken before the masquerade for the judges' reference. We'll try to send each contestant a copy of the picture if a mailing address is provided. We'll shoot some video of the performance, which may be made available to participants if all the technical issues work out well.

- **8.** Law of Nature: Stuff Happens. Yes, some of your plans may go wrong here in the real world. Murphy was a prophet. Please stay loose and handle it with grace. Don't let self-imposed stress or a hot temper ruin the experience for you and those around you.
- **9. Firm Rule:** Keep the action on the stage. Weapons, stunts, and special effects must be approved in advance by the Masquerade Director.

If the weapon and its presentation have not been cleared, you will be disqualified from competition. This is a safety thing. I like weapons as much as the Next-to-Last Action Hero, but I want to see for myself what you are carrying and what you intend to do with it. This safety approval rule also applies to acrobatic stunts, special effects, energetic dances, or anything else that might inadvertently extend beyond the stage. We have a small stage this year, so it pays to be extra careful.

10. Safety Principle: Surprise the audience, not the crew. See Rule 9. I once scared the heck out of a masquerade director because I forgot to tell her that a pratfall was part of my presentation!

If you are going to do something surprising, please clear it with the Director, Master of Ceremonies, and Catchers in advance. If you want to interact with the Master of Ceremonies, you must rehearse with him at the contestant meeting.

11. Rule: The Masquerade Director is Absolute Dictator. They have full authority to eliminate anyone from the competition on the basis of unrepentant bad taste, temper tantrums, danger to the contestants or audience, violation of the above rules, or any other reason deemed sufficient.

This rule is intended to protect you and the convention from the real loons. The rule will not be invoked for frivolous or unfair reasons.

12. Rule: Do Your Paperwork. Everyone appearing on stage will submit an image waiver which bears their legal signature. It's part of the contestant signup form. Persons under 18 will need a parent or guardian to sign for them.

Security

Letter From the CopperCon 30 Security Team

The CopperCon Security Team is here to help you enjoy your CopperCon experience. We will act as a buffer between convention members and the hotel staff and the public. Please keep in mind that Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity. Please use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get you into trouble in the real world, it will probably get you into trouble at CopperCon 30.

General Security Policies for CopperCon 30

- If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact the Security Office, a Security Team member, or any CopperCon 30 Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to insure that you have an enjoyable convention experience.
- Please feel free to contact Security at anytime if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.
- Have fun and be courteous of your fellow CopperCon 30 attendees.

Badge Policy

- Your badge shows that you are a member of convention.
 Convention attendees are required to have their badge displayed so that it is visible and readable at all times.
- A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone.
- Acceptance of the badge releases the convention from all liability in the event of accident, damage, or theft while on convention premises.
- 4) The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and must be surrendered on demand.
- 5) CopperCon 30 reserves the right to refuse admission to or to eject any person whose conduct is deemed in the sole discretion of the CASFS Board to be unsafe or disorderly.

Weapons Policy

- 1) ALL weapon like props MUST BE TAKEN TO THE SECURITY OFFICE for review and peace bonding. CopperCon 30 Security reserves the right to refuse permission to carry any prop.
- 2) All owners of weapon like props will read and sign a copy of the CopperCon30 Weapons Policy, which will be then kept on file in the Security Office for the duration of the convention
- Absolutely NO Horseplay with weapon like props will be tolerated.
- 4) **No firearms are allowed** at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue.

Security, cont.

- 5) Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace bonded.
- All weapon type props will be carried or worn in such a manner so that other individuals in the convention venue are not at risk to be struck by the prop.
- 7) Unsheathed or non-peace bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any person carrying a blade in an unsafe manner or any non-peace bonded or unsheathed blade will be asked to store the item in their room or vehicle for the remainder of the convention. Further offenses may result in the item being confiscated until the end of the convention, and the attendee could face further action by CopperCon Security.


Room Party Policy

- 1) If you are planning a room party, stop by the Security Office and fill out a party registration form. CopperCon 30 reserves the right to curtail non convention parties or events by withdrawing convention recognition and turning the problem over to hotel security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00pm of the day of the party
- You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at The Windemere Resort to register your room party
- 3) The individual(s) registering the party is responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol
- 4) The Windemere Resort may have guests who are not convention attendees. These guests have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during late-night hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

Violations

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to security for appropriate action, which may include, but is not limited to the following:

- * Removal from programming / event.
- * Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue.
- * Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.




