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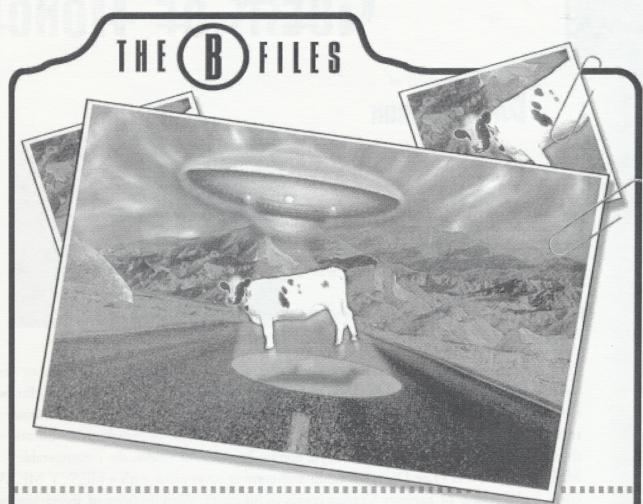
THE CHAIR...

In Appreciation of

DAYE DORMAN

I was introduced to Dave Dorman in 1987 by my college illustration professor, Mark Nelson, while attending a party at the Chicago Comicon. I had no clue I was meeting the talented man who would become my business partner, my stalwart companion, my brother.



Dave and I exchanged a couple of phone calls that year, a far cry from the daily calls or emails we now exchange (and it's slowed down since the birth of baby Jack last November.) But we met up at an ill-fated comic convention, the Florida Fantasy Festival, attended by at least twenty talented guests and maybe thirty fans. That weekend saw us mingling one-on-one with the screen's first SUPERMAN, Kirk Alyn, comics legend Will Eisner, the incomparable Michael Kaluta, and Dave Dorman, an up-and-coming cover artist with a HEAVY METAL cover, and a couple of Eternity Comics covers to his credit. With no hope of interaction with fans that weekend, we had the opportunity to get to know each other better. Dave was about to be married, my son was a month away from being born, and life just seemed good for a couple of guys in their twenties.

I recall Dave's excitement about landing the job of cover artist for the STAR WARS: DARK EMPIRE comics at Dark Horse. I remember thinking: what's the big deal about Star Wars? Why not something people will like? STAR WARS is dead. Hmmmm. But Dave knew better from the beginning, and despite any claims to the contrary, I still contend Dave Dorman is as responsible for the resurgence in popularity of the STAR WARS brand as is Timothy Zhan or Drew Struzen.

In 1994, Dave and I were invited to Skywalker Ranch for a STAR WARS licensing summit. It was all business, but at the end of the first day, George Lucas came out to meet all of the business people who had traveled to be part of the event. George spent a good two or three minutes greeting each person, thanking them, doing the industry small talk, etc. Dave was nervous that he was a nobody. But when the president of Lucasfilm introduced Dave to George, he shook Dave's hand enthusiastically and praised Dave's work. Lucas is the owner of the single largest collection of Dorman STAR WARS original works.



At the height of Dave's popularity for his STAR WARS, INDIANA JONES and ALIENS work, Dave and I had the opportunity to visit the set of ALIEN RESURRECTION. In advance of the meeting, Dave had created a small painting on the inside of his ALIEN: TRIBES book for director Jean-Pierre Jeunet and for Sigourney Weaver. We were more excited than a kid going to Disneyland for the first time; but when we got there, Dave was surprised that it was he, not them, who was treated to hero worship. Jeunet, whose film, CITY OF LOST CHILDREN, still ranks as one of Dave's favorite films, was frazzled from a strenuous day of shooting, but when introduced to Dave, he straightened up, shook Dave's hands, and graciously praised him for the beautiful gift of the remarqued book. Sigourney Weaver's assistant called Dave shortly after to tell Dave how honored the actress was to have received hers. But perhaps the greatest compliment for Dave came from an unlikely person on the set, Academy Award-winning cinematographer Darius Khondji (se7en, Evita, Ninth Gate, The Beach.) Understand: Dave loves movies and he thinks meeting a celebrity is cool, but Dave respects other artists. Khondji is an artist's artist. Dave had admired his work, but it was Khondji who praised Dave's talent profusely.

What separates Dave Dorman from many other artists of his caliber is his genuine humility and his immense drive to please his fans. If you've ever been the tenth or later person in a convention line to meet Dave, you'll know what I'm talking about. It's not about signing a few books and shoving you off so he can do the same thing to the next fan. Dave appreciates his fans and makes sure they know it. He is as loyal to his fans as they are to him. He is as loyal to his friends as a friend could ever ask. Needless to say, Dave has made and kept many friends.

Over the years, Dave and I have laughed and cried together, lending support to each other through both of his parents' and my wife's battles with cancer, through a divorce, and then into a new phase in Dave's life, a second, much happier marriage, blessed with a beautiful child. We've watched an industry rise to the heights of mass popularity and again watched, with sadness, as it all but died out. But all the while, I have watched a self-taught illustrator rise to the ranks of the great artists of our time. Comics or no comics. Do I feel privileged to know Dave? Sure. Do I feel blessed to have been given the best, most loyal friend any person could ever hope to have in life. You bet I do.

If you have the opportunity to meet Dave Dorman during this convention, leave knowing that as much as you might appreciate the talents of this great illustrator, he appreciates you, his fans, even more.

KEVIN J. ANDERSON

More than Mr. nice Guy by Brian Herbert

In January of 1997, I began corresponding with Kevin J. Anderson about the possibility of collaborating on a series of new "Dune" novels. A few months later he and his wife, Rebecca, flew to Seattle and I met them for the first time. During that memorable visit, the three of us brainstormed story ideas with tremendous energy and excitement. In the car as we left SeaTac Airport, fantastic ideas started flying and while rolling along the freeway we were fumbling for notepads, pens and a tape recorder to get it all down. I was trying to keep the car on the road, and little did the irritated drivers around us know that we were making science fiction history.

When Kevin returned to his home in California, he said that he was so exhausted from the mental exertion that he went straight to bed and slept for much longer than usual. For Kevin that is saying a lot, because he is a man of tremendous vigor, much like my own dynamic, energetic father, Frank Herbert. The

familial similarity does not end there, as Kevin has become like a brother to me over the years that we have worked together on six huge *Dune* novels, numerous short stories, and a new, 60,000 word novella.

During that time, we have been on six national book tours, have appeared together at conventions, and have only had one fifteen-minute argument. As Kevin quipped once, we argue more with our wives every day. Any way you look at it, our continuing collaboration has been a remarkable, enjoyable experience for both of us, and we are proud of the new stories that we have produced. *Dune* fans, who are very demanding (and rightfully so), have responded with enthusiasm, and all of our novels have reached international bestseller lists.

Back in 1998, when I had only known Kevin for a year, I was asked to write a tribute about him for a convention in Colorado – "MileHiCon 30." Kevin was in the process of moving to that state, where he was building a castle on a hill, complete with a suit of armor just inside the front door. I wrote the piece about him, and the convention organizers added a title for the program guide. They called my tribute, "A Real Nice Guy," and printed the article along with an excellent photograph of Kevin.

The title they selected was accurate and remains so, as fans discover whenever they approach Kevin and talk with him. He goes out of his way for his readers, in countless ways. I'll provide just one of many examples. I went to the Nebula Awards ceremonies in Santa Fe with Kevin, where I saw him give his own nametag to a young Star Wars fan. The boy went home with a memorable photograph of himself standing next to his favorite author; a picture in which the kid was wearing Kevin's nametag around his neck. It's hard to top that for sheer generosity, and that young man will be a Kevin J. Anderson fan forever. Kevin has great relationships with his fans and stays in touch with them through an excellent newsletter, AnderZone, that he sends out several times a year. Anyone wanting to receive the newsletter can sign up wherever Kevin makes public appearances or can contact him at our website, www.dunenovels.com.

The title of that tribute, "A Real Nice Guy," while accurate, only tells part of the story. Kevin is much more complex than that. Like me (and like Frank Herbert), he's only happy when he is writing, when he is making progress toward completing one of his many projects. Every day, no matter what else he has to do, he tries to get something on the page. As many of his fans know, he writes in multiple universes, not just *Dune*. Ask him about his own terrific solo science series, *The Saga of Seven Suns*. Or about one of his interesting projects with his wife, Rebecca Moesta, who is herself a bestselling author. Something new and exciting is always churning in Kevin's active mind. Of course, he does owe a great deal of his

energy to Starbucks coffee, and he knows where all of their stores are in every city in the United States. When we're on tour, he finds his way to Starbucks before he figures out how to get to the bookstores.

It's interesting to note that Kevin J. Anderson has remained a pleasant person while still being an admitted "Type A" personality. That sounds like an impossibility; but he's found a way to pull it off. He doesn't bear fools well, either, which makes it even more interesting to watch him remain emotionally level and civil in virtually any situation. He actually has a number of techniques that work quite well when he is traveling, but which I will not reveal here. As a clue I will tell you that he uses one of his methods on airplanes, if the person in the next seat is bothering him to distraction. No, he does not slip into a parachute and bail out. But he does manage to extract himself from the situation quite neatly.

On occasion, Kevin drives a bit too fast when we're on book tour. Oh, he tries to be good and keep a light touch on the accelerator, but occasionally when he thinks I'm not looking he tends to press his foot down a little harder, and little harder. ...and a little harder. I don't nap when he drives, for obvious reasons, so that's not when he makes the rental cars zoom. Rather, he knows that I like to flip open my laptop computer and work whenever possible, filling in the bits of time with productive work. Last August, I was doing exactly that, and I was typing very rapidly; really into a story. It was the final scene of "Spice Planet," a novella that we will be including in our next collaboration, "The Road to Dune." We were on our way to Santa Cruz, California, and the highway had a lot of twists and turns, like one of our plots.

I knew my friend was going a bit fast on the turns, because my computer was sliding all over my lap, but the story was going so well that I didn't say anything to him. I just kept holding onto the machine and typing like crazy. Somehow, we made it to the bookstore, and – since we were early! – I sat in a big armchair in front of the audience and finished the story, polishing it up a few moments before we were scheduled to speak. It was only later that I told Kevin he could have eased up on the accelerator a bit. I wasn't upset, though, because I know that personality well. As I wrote in "Dreamer of Dune," my father drove that way. Frank Herbert also wanted to get from Point A to Point B as rapidly as possible, and even ordered a high-performance sports car shortly before he died.

When I met Kevin, he wore thick glasses. A short while afterward, he went in for laser surgery to improve his vision. Worried about him, I suggested that he do only one eye at a time, but he went ahead and did them both at once anyway. They turned out great, and he no longer has to wear coke bottle glasses. The procedure did not, however, improve his driving.

Late in his life, my father wanted to be the oldest man to climb Mt. Everest. Like his mentor, Kevin also has his eye on mountain peaks. He writes books by dictating them into a miniature tape recorder while he hikes, and occasionally calls me by cell phone from the top of a mountain. He has climbed all of the major peaks in Colorado, and may set his sights on Everest one day. He certainly set his sights high when he decided to tackle the *Dune* universe.

Kevin J. Anderson is a Renaissance man with wide-ranging knowledge and skills; as he would have to be in order to write books that are set in the most fantastic universe in all of science fiction... Frank Herbert's *Dune*. And of equal importance, Kevin is a man of honor, a throwback from another age. If he tells me he is going to do something, it does not have to be a contractual commitment. I know he is as good as his word and he will complete the project with aplomb, without giving me a litany of excuses.

For Kevin, deadlines are sacred. Unlike other authors, who typically stretch their publishing deadlines by months and even years, Kevin does not miss them. Frank Herbert, a lifelong newspaperman, was like that himself, so he would appreciate Kevin for being that way, and for his writing skills. Unfortunately, the two of them never met. Back in the mid-1980's, Kevin was getting ready to send his favorite author, Frank Herbert, a copy of his first novel, "Resurrection, Inc.," and then learned the sad news that the great science fiction master had died.

But, as it turns out, my celebrated father did not really die. His legacy lives on in the marvelous books he left for his fans to read, and in the incredible universe where Kevin and I are still crafting stories.

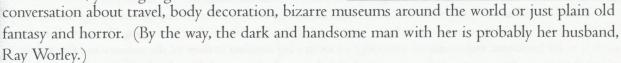

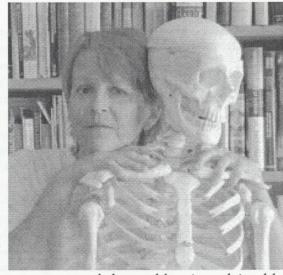
SUBUH CLEMENS

If you are in the Art Show and see a pretty blonde woman dressed in leather, hanging art about alien medical techniques and cute cats and erotic tattooed nudes and galactic tourism, then say hello to your Artist Guest of Honor ~ Sarah Clemens.

But be forewarned, this artist doesn't just like to talk about sex art; you might get thrown into a





We have had all these conversations and more with Sarah over the past 20-something years. When we first met Sarah, she and her late-husband Vince Miranda talked us into working at one of the first academic conferences about teaching science fiction and fantasy. Imagine – a leather-clad goddess teaching fantasy art appreciation to a bunch of college professors whose tastes ran to Andre Norton and Isaac Asimov! (By the way, the Conference on the Fantastic in the Arts and Literature they also helped start is still a going concern and for years, Sarah Clemens was one of its luminaries.)

Sarah didn't actually wear leather too often in those days – it's too hot and much too muggy in South Florida. But she was never your ordinary commuter. She has enthusiasms, and talent, and... shall we say: an unusual perspective on the world. She also has had the kind of life that makes for memorable jacket copy. You do know, don't you, that Sarah is a published author? She is also a painter of dog portraits, and has made a living out of illustrations for expert medical court testimony. She was one third of a gypsy (really – ask her about it). She was a co-owner of a bookstore. She was an art director for the West Palm Beach Science Museum Planetarium. To avoid boredom, she did some of these at the same time. One of her recent projects has been to create the art used to animate a gastric bypass surgery for a medical website.

Sarah's artwork can be quirky. Take a south Florida girl and start her thinking about tourism and science fiction, and pretty soon you have an image of your aunt and uncle posing on a spaceship in front of Jupiter. The effects of those medical malpractice suites show up in her alien medical setpieces. At the same time, she has a talent for traditional forms, and is particularly effective in her depictions of the female form. Those can be very lush. And the luxurious texture can also be seen



from the background gardens to her "photo" realistic landscapes. We have several very different examples hanging on our walls. Take a look at her web site: www.clemensart.com for a sampling of her styles.

Sarah has the ability to take a traditional medievalist piece and morph it with unpredictable humor. One of our favorites is "Gargoyles in Love", where she uses Notre Dame as the backdrop for the inner lives of the stones.

But it's not all gargoyles in love, science fiction and strangulated hernias. There are other things you should know about Sarah. She is passionate about cats, and once had a miniature shrine to Bast in her living room; complete with carvings from legendary fan, Lee Hoffman. She loves gardens and roses, raising them in pots when the ground is too barren for them to live. She comes by it naturally, as her aunt grew the unusual as a decades-long member of the Rare Fruit Council. Sarah's actually a grownup, too. She runs her own web sites. She's very responsible about taking care of animals and people, even when it's not easy. For example, have you ever tried giving an insulin injection to a cat?

Sarah sparkles on a variety of topics. On "Sex at II" panels at Tropicon, she was the one that convinced the panelists to go topless – the other panelists! Those panels quickly evolved to having Sarah at the center, with everyone else trying to keep up with her. Still another career beckoned from this. Violence and mayhem are also an interest. Sarah can be serious and excited over serial killers. Some of this research showed up in her story "A Good Night's Work" for Gardner Dozois' *Ripper!* anthology.

And she can hobnob with the rich and famous of the genre. You've heard about *Craig's List* of all kinds of information? Ask Sarah what Craig Newmark is really like. Ask her about the best way to flirt with Brian Aldiss (it really doesn't have anything to do with what you can do on a luggage cart). Or what kind of person actively solicits and encourages horrifying writers as her friend Ellen Datlow does?

Science fiction and fantasy is filled with smart and entertaining people. Sarah Clemens is one of them. One you should take the opportunity to get to know better. She might even tell you about the first cover art she ever sold – *Edgar and his Electric Phallus*, or about the postcard museum. Hey Sarah, we wish we were there!

I first met Bear Burge, and his partner, Dana Ginsberg, at a FantastiCon in the late 90's, along with a few others of the *Space: Above & Beyond* cast and crew. Bear is a somewhat quiet, friendly person whom I find to be quite approachable about his work. He enjoys talking about the hows and whys of prop building, and likes to show what items he has worked on. Bear got his start in prop making in High School with a love of building things. After taking shop class and learning how to use equipment such as lathes and milling machines, prop building has been his passion ever since.



A few of the productions Bear has worked on include *Space: Above & Beyond, Star Trek, Babylon 5*, and *SeaQuest* for television, as well as various movies. He has worked with Mike Moore of HMS-Studios, and Dragon Dronet (also of *Space: Above & Beyond*). Some of the materials he works with include aluminum, resin, and rubber. I have been told that Bear never takes a screen credit for anything he does; although, in my opinion, he deserves it.

Both Bear and Dana can be found at various conventions including BayCon, Westercon, GateCon, and LosCon. Usually in costume, and toting one of the many props he has worked on.

MITCHELL BURNSIDE CLAPP

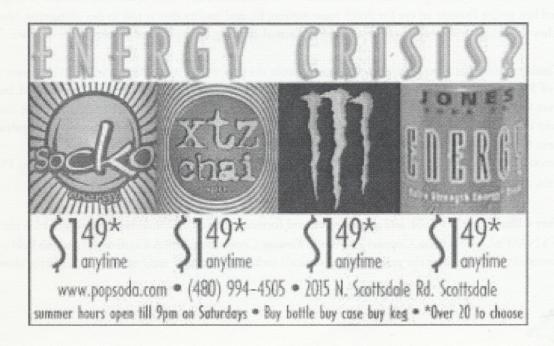

Mitchell is the author of a number of Filk Songs including "Red Star, Rising,", "Falling Down on New Jersey," and "Hangar My Heart". He was Winner of the 1990 the Pegasus award as Best Filk Performer. He has been a past GoH at both LepreCon and CopperCon. His wife, T.J., is also a well known and award winning Filker. When he was Filk guest in Phoenix

last he won the auction for the privilege of being a character and dying in "War of Honor" by David Weber.

He "holds a Master's degree in Aeronautics and Astronautics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). He has flown more than 40 different types of military and civilian aircraft and is the only person outside McDonnell-Douglas trained to fly the DC-X single stage research demonstration vehicle. Out of a possible 4 I/2 stars, this book was given 4 stars. Her science fiction e-books have all recieved excellent reviews in the industry.

Greg Brown - Greg Brown was the chair of the first three LepreCons. Since then, obviously a lot of water has passed under his bridge; he spent a few years as a teacher, and far more as a systems analyst. Late in his IT career he decided to try his hand at writing, in particular screenplays. After retiring from his day job, he spent some time at film school, worked on a movie as a script supervisor, and continued to work on scripts. He had a script optioned by a TV studio (although they never picked it up) and he has written several other screenplays that are being shopped around.

Frances Burns - Frances Burns has been active in costuming for over fifteen years. It is rumored that she popped into this world naked, clutching a portable sewing machine and proceeded to design her own diapers. Frances has been altering and fitting patterns for family and friends since grade school, perfecting the art of clothing making for real-world bodies. Her neighborhood seamstress - who was trained in French Quebec in Couture sewing - mentored her, giving Frances an eye for detail construction, fit, and quality that is rare in fan costuming. She approaches the design and production of costumes as actual clothing - not props to be used once or twice.

Mike Cassidy - Mike has been attending conventions since the first one he attended at the Del Webb tower in the middle of Phoenix in 1976. He is a former Marine (OORAH !!!) who rebuilds carburetors blindfolded, builds computers with out using instruction manuals and makes scale models with such excruciating detail that most people cry out "You MUST be CRAZY!". Mike currently spends most of his days maintaining and repairing equipment that tests little pieces of silicon impregnated with various kinds of metal oxides for a major multinational company. He has been seen recently at the Velavision corporate office at "The Big Building Plaza" in Dyptheria, AZ in high level talks with the Velavision board of directors.

Bruce Farr - Bruce Farr is a book and art collector, and former collector of convention positions. He's the past chair of a NASFiC, SMOFCon, CopperCon, World Fantasy Convention, SFRA Conference, and has held over 120 convention positions over the years (mostly vertical) including Treasurer and/or Hotel Liaison for about 12

She likes to try her hands at every kind of art she come across. She believes how well she does is far less important than the enjoyment and learning she take away from trying new things. She has been active in fandom for some years now as a costumer, artist, videophile, otaku, gamer, filker and all around fen.

jan howard finder - The Wombat, aka jan howard finder, has been reading SF for more than 50 years & active in SF circles for about 30. He chaired 2 Tolkien conferences, 69 & 71. He participates in, judges, & MC's masquerades. He is one of the best auctioneers found at cons. According to backs that know, he gives the best backrubs north of the South Pole. He put out an award winning fanzine, The Spang Blah. He sold a short story, edited an SF anthology (Alien Encounters) & published his incredible Finder's Guide to Australterrestrials. He puts out an irregular fanzine on Arthur Upfield, an Australian mystery writer. He also likes aerobics, learned to scuba, is taking up sailing, learning how to play cricket, & has a budding film career. Ask him about Yaminons, wombats, BYTELOCK, visiting Middle-earth & other stuff.

Maryeileen Flanagan - Maryeileen Flanagan began costuming at the tender age of eight when she attempted to make a paper mache' horse for her jockey "character" to ride on Halloween. Since then she has advanced to costuming live horses and their riders as part of the "Once Upon a

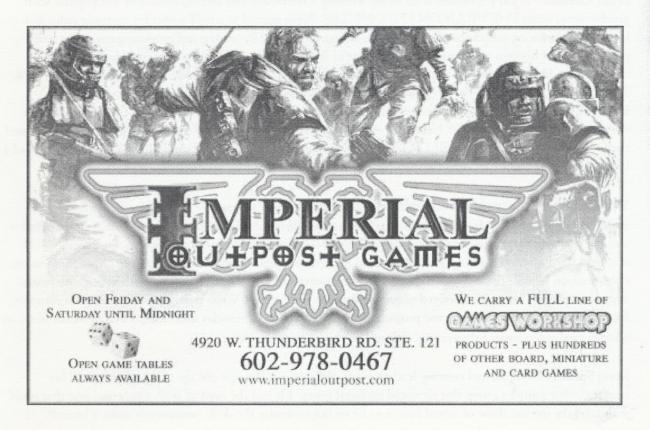

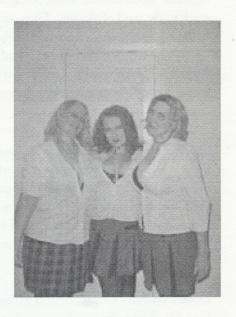

Q. What do the 3-letter codes that identify the panels mean?

A. We used them to keep track of all the different types of programming that fans have come to expect. Meanings are thus:

Panels with code "LEP" fall in the realm of "LepreCon Events"

This category includes topics and activities specifically associated with LepreCon itself. Old favorite events like Meet the Pros, the auctions, the masquerade etc., are grouped under this category of programming.

Panels with code "ART" fall in the realm of "Artistry"

This category deals with aspects of art, from the creative process through techniques to the practical aspects of marketing your work. Included are the arts of costuming, cartooning, fine arts, theater, movies and anime.

Panels with code "SCR" fall in the realm of "Screenwriting"

This category deals with aspects of screen writing and scripting, from the creative process through grammatical construction, to the practical aspects of getting your work published.

Panels with code "FLM" fall in the realm of "Film Making"

Film making, from amateur to independent to the big screen, requires many different technical and artistic skills. This category covers all of those.

Panels with code "SCI" fall in the realm of "Science"

Good science fiction relies on authors' creative use of believable science and this track is meant to present updates and glimpses of the cutting edges of scientific disciplines and technology.

Panels with code "GAM" fall in the realm of "Gaming"

Gamers don't often leave the gaming tables for panels, but there are one or two times that a good panel or presentation will lure them out to the program rooms. This is the track for those few good gaming topics — which often coincide with other fannish interests! (Look for "cross-overs"...)

Panels with code "SOC" fall in the realm of "Socio-Political Topics"

Socio-Political topics lend fodder for fandom's endless speculations of "What If.". Speculative fiction at its best starts with observable fact and moves toward a believable possibility. These topics help provide facts from credible sources and a forum for "think tank" style discussions.

Panels with code "FAM" fall in the realm of "Family Oriented / Kid Friendly Programming"

Kids are fen too, and this track is set to bring them into the fold by sharing with them all that first attracted us to speculative fiction and fantasy. Most items will be "hands-on" and should fit other categories as well as this one. This track of programming is NOT intended to be a daycare or babysitting service - but just to provide some activities that will appeal to those attendees between 6 and 12 years of age. Family members of all ages are encouraged to participate with the kids!

Panels with code "DEM" fall in the realm of "Art Demonstrations"

This category deals with demonstrating techniques and practical aspects of creating your work.

Q. I see WRI06 and WRI10 in the descriptions - what happened to WRI07 through WRI09?

A. The process of programming begins by making a list of LOTS of ideas, more than we can possibly use during the course of one convention. Each is given an ID code so that we can keep track of it. By the time the convention is scheduled, only those ideas that keep to our theme AND are chosen by the participants actually get on the schedule (you can't have a panel discussion without panelists!) So, the "missing" codes are left out, and the ideas are saved for other conventions. Oh! Now you know!

Q. A couple of the panelists listed in the Program Book weren't on the panel. (Else a panelist took part who was not listed.) Why? A. At the time the Program Book went to press, not all the panelists had made final choices or been scheduled. Sometimes, our participants have personal emergencies and must leave; others who thought they could not attend find that they can show up at the last minute. We did our best to be as accurate as possible, but we couldn't see into the future – if you know anyone who can, please ask them to contact us to volunteer for next year's convention!

ECURITY

This is the Weapons and Security Policies and Procedures for the LeperCon31 convention held May $6^{th} - 8^{th}$, 2005. The Convention and Convention Security are not limited by what is contained in this document and will handle any and all incidents during the convention in a manner they deem appropriate for the circumstances.

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to security for appropriate action, which can include but is not limited to the following:

- Verbal cautioning
- > Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches = revocation of membership
- > Confiscation / removal of weapons or props
- Removal from programming / event
- > Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue
- > Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

Weapons Policy

Horseplay with weapons WILL NOT be tolerated!

No real or realistic firearms are allowed at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue. Firearms include but are not limited to the following:

- > Handguns
- Long guns / shotguns
- Tasers / stun guns
- Any prop or device designed or intended to fire a projectile

Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace-bonded. Convention attendees will need to go to the Convention Security Office and have their blade peace-bonded. They will also need to read and sign a copy of the weapons policy.

Any attendee carrying a peace-bonded blade will need to carry or wear the blade in such a manner so that other attendees or anyone else present at the convention venue is not at risk to be struck by or otherwise physically encounter the sheathed weapon. Unsheathed or non-peace-bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any peace-bonded blade carried in an unsafe manner or any non-peace-bonded or unsheathed blade can be confiscated and the attendee could face further action by Security.

General Policies

Use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get in you in trouble in the real world, it will probably get you in trouble at LepreCon. Remember Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity.

DESTINATIONS

Your badge shows that you are a member of convention. Attendees are required to have their badge worn and displayed so that it is easily seen and readable at all times. A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone. The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and your membership is revocable for cause at any time.

If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact the Security Office, a Security Team member, or any LepreCon 31 Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to insure that you have a good time.

Please feel free to contact Security at anytime if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.

Room Party Policies

If you are planning a room party please stop by the Security Office and fill out a party registration form. Room Parties are not required to be registered but you are encouraged to do so. Registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by convention security, and we will act as a buffer between you and hotel security. Non-registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by hotel security and the convention will not act as a buffer nor will we intervene if the hotel chooses to shut down your party. This does not mean that you can register your party and be excessively rowdy and avoid being shut down - the convention reserves the right to shut down parties or events or to withdraw convention recognition and turn the problem over to hotel security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00pm of the day of the party.

The Carefree Resort may have guests who are who are not convention attendees. These guests have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during late-night hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at The Carefree Resort to register your room party.

The individual(s) registering the party are responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol.

You may be wondering "Just what is Velavision?" Velavision is many things, here are just a few of the things that Velavision is and does.

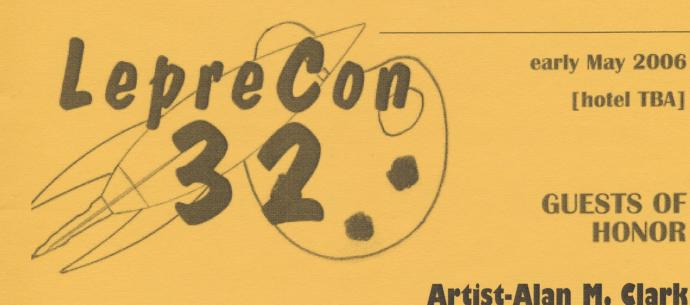
