

In Appreciation of ALAN M. CLARK

The first time I saw Alan Clark's artwork was at Worldcon in New Orleans in 1988 (NoLaCon II). I saw his art hanging in the Art Show and thought it was wonderful. Most of his paintings were huge and of space art that was fantastic. But, as is usually the case, my budget just couldn't be stretched far enough to take one of the big paintings home. However, over in a lower corner of a panel was a "limited edition" cibachrome print of a floating space city all in reds. It was number 1 of 2 and that is truly a limited edition! The minimum bid was only \$25 so I bid on it. It was my lucky weekend and was able to take it home with me.

After I had placed my bid and we were roaming about the convention to find where everything was (it was our first Worldcon), I met Alan for the first time in the ASFA Suite. At that time he lived in Nashville, Tennessee, and just like the other fans I've met from that part of the country, visiting with him was like visiting with family.



Since then, he and his wife Melody have relocated to Eugene, Oregon, and I've crossed paths with him at various Westercons, World Horror Conventions, and World Fantasy Conventions. He is still the same charming Southern gentleman. It takes a lot to ruffle his feathers and even if he gets upset, he rarely shows it.

Alan not only does great paintings, book covers, and artwork people want to pay him to do, but he also illustrates books. The first book that I saw of Alan's work was "The Pain Doctors of Suture Self." Alan is one of the few artists I've met who creates art in the horror genre that I could live with and that is a talent unto itself! His work in that book also shows a definite sense of humor. I first met John Vornholt in October 1993 at the World Fantasy Convention in Bloomington, Minnesota. At the time Martha Lee and I lived in Ohio, and John and Nancy lived in Tucson, Arizona. In 1994, Martha Lee and I were making arrangements to move to Tucson, and as part of that relocation, John introduced me to Jack Horner (you know, the guy that sat in a corner with a

John has had many careers in his life: stuntman, computer salesman, tech assistant, tech writer, Hollywood scriptwriter and pitchman, writer of Star Trek books (he was the first author of those to hit the NY Times bestseller list), Buffy books, Quantum Leap books, Spiderman books, his own series of Troll King books, and so on and so forth. He brings tremendous experience and talent to his work, and he is a valuable contributor to other writers who turn to him for advice.

Oh, and I can't leave this out: John and I are movie aficionados of really bad horror movies. You see, John is a zombie lover (no, no, nothing necrophilic about it; I mean, we're talking about horror movies, here), and I like a good scary story, and so we regularly go to films that if we took our wives to they would never let us live it down. 
Anyway, I present to you John Vornholt, my good friend and fellow writer and gamer, as well as a kindred appreciator of really bad horror movies.

Off the set, Bill's hobbies include music, dancing, travel, working on his home, and making new friends. He has also written a book on how to get and keep jobs in the field of acting. Bill tends to prefer the fan run conventions over most corporate run ones, and has held a well-attended celebrity birthday cruise during the month of August for the past few years. With experiences on so many great shows and movies, and a wealth of stories to share, Bill is a sought-after guest at conventions around the world. For as long as I've known him, Bill has always been very open and approachable, and genuinely enjoys meeting people. Bill will be joined at this convention by his lovely wife, Toni (also an actress, model, musician, and writer), who will be hosting her own panels at the convention. 

Due to his experience with handling money he was the corporate treasurer of Leprecon Inc and Western SFA Inc. He helped them make decisions in addition to all the volunteering he did pre-con, at-con and post-con. For a long time. If you needed help of any sort, all you needed to do was ask and he was there. He was that kind of guy. All the clubs in the Phoenix metropolitan area were fortunate to have someone like Ray available, interested, willing to help. He was like the Rock of Gibraltar, Old Faithful, quite a guy.

I was blessed with Ray's friendship. We shared some meals together privately over the years and came to know each other. We had similar thoughts and concerns about how things should run. One time during a Space Access Conference we walked to a sushi restaurant. Another time it was American food in a south seas atmosphere. Or it might be a plain Denny's or JB's where we'd exchange mail, treasury stuff or opinions. He was always willing to meet up and do something together when the need struck us. That was cool, because we lived quite a ways apart. We didn't worry about the distance. It was trivial in comparison. Even during my last visit to him at home he was still ol'Ray to the last. It will stay with me forever.

Last July (2005) we lost Ray to the Great Art Show in the sky. His wife, Pinkie, is attending this year as Ray's representative for this honor that we bestow upon him. His son, David, and daughter-in-law, Sylvana, are now running our Art Show. The Ray Gish Memorial Art Show at LepreCon. We will have program items for us to fondly remember Ray and the stories that surround our experiences with him and his family. And his shows. 

SECURITY

This is the Weapons and Security Policies and Procedures for the LeperCon32 convention held May 5th - 7th, 2006. The Convention and Convention Security are not limited by what is contained in this document and will handle any and all incidents during the convention in a manner they deem appropriate for the circumstances.

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to security for appropriate action, which can include but is not limited to the following:

- Verbal cautioning
- Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches = revocation of membership
- Confiscation / removal of weapons or props
- Removal from programming / event
- Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue
- Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

WEADONS POUCY

Horseplay with weapons WILL NOT be tolerated!

No real or realistic firearms are allowed at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue. Firearms include but are not limited to the following:

- Handguns
- Long guns / shotguns
- Tasers / stun guns
- Any prop or device designed or intended to fire a projectile

Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace-bonded. Convention attendees will need to go to the Convention Security Office and have their blade peace-bonded. They will also need to read and sign a copy of the weapons policy.

Any attendee carrying a peace-bonded blade will need to carry or wear the blade in such a manner so that other attendees or anyone else present at the convention venue is not at risk to be struck by or otherwise physically encounter the sheathed weapon. Unsheathed or non-peace-bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any peace-bonded blade carried in an unsafe manner or any non-peace-bonded or unsheathed blade can be confiscated and the attendee could face further action by Security.



GENERAL POUCIES

Use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get in you in trouble in the real world, it will probably get you in trouble at LepreCon. Remember Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity.

Your badge shows that you are a member of convention. Attendees are required to have their badge worn and displayed so that it is easily seen and readable at all times. A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone. The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and your membership is revocable for cause at any time.

If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact the Security Office, a Security Team member, or any LepreCon 31 Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to insure that you have a good time.

Please feel free to contact Security at anytime if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.

ROOM PARTY POUCIES

If you are planning a room party please stop by the Security Office and fill out a party registration form. Room Parties are not required to be registered but you are encouraged to do so. Registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by convention security, and we will act as a buffer between you and hotel security. Non registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by hotel security and the convention will not act as a buffer nor will we intervene if the hotel chooses to shut down your party. This does not mean that you can register your party and be excessively rowdy and avoid being shut down - the convention reserves the right to shut down parties or events or to withdraw convention recognition and turn the problem over to hotel security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00pm of the day of the party.

The Embassy Suites may have guests who are who are not convention attendees. These guests have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during late night hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at the Embassy Suites to register your room party.

The individual(s) registering the party are responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol.







PANEL FAQ

Q. What do the 3-letter codes that identify the panels mean?

A. We used them to keep track of all the different types of programming that fans have come to expect. Meanings are thus:

Panels with code "ART" fall in the realm of "Artistry"

This category deals with aspects of art, from the creative process through techniques to the practical aspects of marketing your work. Included are the arts of costuming, cartooning, fine arts, theater, movies and anime.

Panels with code "SCR" fall in the realm of "Screenwriting"

This category deals with aspects of screen writing and scripting, from the creative process through grammatical construction, to the practical aspects of getting your work published.

Panels with code "FLM" fall in the realm of "Film Making"

Film making, from amateur to independent to the big screen, requires many different technical and artistic skills. This category covers all of those.

Panels with code "SCI" fall in the realm of "Science"

Good science fiction relies on authors' creative use of believable science and this track is meant to present updates and glimpses of the cutting edges of scientific disciplines and technology.

Panels with code "GAM" fall in the realm of "Gaming"

Gamers don't often leave the gaming tables for panels, but there are one or two times that a good panel or presentation will lure them out to the program rooms. This is the track for those few good gaming topics — which often coincide with other fannish interests! (Look for "transcending categories"...)

Panels with code "SOC" fall in the realm of "Socio-Political Topics"

Socio-Political topics lend fodder for fandom's endless speculations of "What If..". Speculative fiction at its best starts with observable fact and moves toward a believable possibility. These topics help provide facts from credible sources and a forum for "think tank" style discussions.

Panels with code "FAM" fall in the realm of "Family Oriented / Kid Friendly Programming"

Kids are fen too, and this track is set to bring them into the fold by sharing with them all that first attracted us to speculative fiction and fantasy. Most items will be "hands-on" and should fit other categories as well as this one. This track of programming is NOT intended to be a daycare or babysitting service - but just to provide some activities that will appeal to those attendees between 6 and 12 years of age. Family members of all ages are encouraged to participate with the kids! Panels with code "FAN" fall in the realm of "General Fandom"

This category includes fluffy topics that fall within the realm of general "fannish" interest but don't really fit any of the other categories.

Panels with code "DEM" fall in the realm of "Art Demonstrations"

This category deals with demonstrating techniques and practical aspects of creating your work.

Q. I see DEM006 and DEM010 in the descriptions – what happened to DEM007 through DEM009?

A. The process of programming begins by making a list of LOTS of ideas, more than we can possibly use during the course of one convention. Each is given an ID code so that we can keep track of it. By the time the convention is scheduled, only those ideas that keep to our theme AND are chosen by the participants actually get on the schedule (you can't have a panel discussion without panelists!) So, the "missing" codes are left out, and the ideas are saved for other conventions. Oh! Now you know!

Q. A couple of the panelists listed in the Program Book weren't on the panel. (Else a panelist took part who was not listed.) Why?

A. At the time the Program Book went to press, not all the panelists had made final choices or been scheduled. Sometimes, our participants have personal emergencies and must leave, others who thought they could not attend find that they can show up at the last minute. We did our best to be as accurate as possible, but we couldn't see into the future – if you know anyone who can, please ask them to contact us to volunteer for next year's convention!







BULAWS OF LEPAECON, INC.

Approved November 13, 2005

1. PRIMARY PURPOSE

Leprecon Inc. is organized primarily to operate an annual science fiction convention in the Phoenix metropolitan area. It may also hold other social functions during the year in connection with and in support of the primary purpose.

2. MEMBERSHIP

2.1. Active and Passive members

2.1.1. Becoming a member

Membership in the organization is conveyed to a person by petition at a quarterly meeting, by obtaining a convention membership or by Board of Directors decree. Membership is open to all persons with an interest in science fiction, fantasy, and/or related topics. The Corporation may refuse to accept memberships for cause.

2.1.2. Term of membership

Membership is considered active until at least one (1) quarterly meeting is not attended. Membership is considered passive until returning to active by attending a quarterly meeting before the next convention. Membership is considered either active or passive unless terminated as indicated below. Proxy letters may be substituted for attendance if necessary.

2.1.3. Termination of membership

Membership may be revoked for disorderly, anti-social, or illegal behavior or other specified cause during or in connection with a convention or other corporate sponsored event. Membership is terminated automatically if the member fails to obtain an attending membership in the annual convention. Membership is terminated involuntarily if a two-thirds (2/3) majority of all active members vote to terminate. Membership is terminated voluntarily if the member sends a signed resignation letter to the Secretary or other designated Board of Directors member. Membership is terminated automatically if the member enters the Art Show with art for sale or enters the Dealers Room with intent to sell merchandise.

2.1.4. Rights of membership

Membership entitles the holder to attend quarterly meetings and vote at such meetings, attend the convention for which a convention membership was obtained, or any other function sponsored by the organization.

2.1.5. Classes of membership

Current classes of membership include Active and Passive. The Corporation may declare other classes of membership as needed.

2.16. Petition for membership

A person may petition for membership at a quarterly meeting by circulating a petition asking to become a member. Active members may sign the petition to indicate that the petitioning person is acceptable as a member. If the petitioning person obtains signatures from at least two-thirds (2/3) of the active members present and submits the petition to the Secretary or designated board member, then the person becomes an active member seven (7) days after the end of that quarterly meeting. 2.17. Convention membership

A person may obtain an attending convention membership by purchasing one through the Treasurer or authorized agent, or by holding a convention position (past or present) that is authorized to receive a complimentary membership.

2.2. Member rights

- 2.2.1. Active members are eligible to vote for the Board of Directors, to hold positions on the board, to vote for changes in these Bylaws or for any other reason designated by the Board.
- 2.2.2. There must be at least fifteen (15) active members. Should the number fall below this, the Board of Directors shall appoint new active members as necessary.

2.2.3. Obligations of members

- 2.2.3.1. Active members must be legally competent in the State of Arizona.
- 2.2.3.2. Active and passive members must maintain their current mailing address, email address and telephone number with the Secretary.
- 2.2.3.3. Active members must respond to a ballot.
- 2.2.3.4. Active members must attend each of the regular quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors or send a written proxy letter.
- 2.2.3.5. Active and passive members must be an attending member of the annual convention.

3. DIRECTORS

- 3.1. Composition of the Board of Directors
- 3.1.1. There shall be five (5) voting Directors.
- 3.1.2. Three (3) Directors shall be selected by election for three (3) year terms, electing one Director after each Annual Meeting, and taking office at the end of that meeting.
- 3.1.3. Each person who completes a term as President shall become a Director for a two (2) year term commencing at the end of the Annual Meeting following the completion of the previous convention.
- 3.1.4. The President (current convention chair) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.

- 3.1.5. The Vice-President (next convention chair after current) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.
- 3.1.6. The Assistant Vice-President (following convention chair after next) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.
- 3.2. Election of Directors
- 3.2.1. Directors shall be elected by ballot of the active members. Such elections may take place at any scheduled quarterly meeting. Nominations for such elections may be called for at such scheduled meetings. Typically, elections occur at the Annual Meeting usually held in August.
- 3.2.2. In meetings where nominations and elections are to take place, all active members must be notified one (1) week in advance.
- 3.2.3. Active members not able to attend meetings where elections are held may vote by notifying the Secretary, the President or the Chairman of the Board in writing of their vote.
- 3.2.4. If there is a vacancy on the Board, the Board of Directors may appoint a Director to fill the vacancy until a replacement can be elected for the remainder of the regular term of the Director being replaced. This election shall be within three (3) months of the vacancy.

3.3. Termination of Office

The Secretary shall conduct a recall election when requested by petition of the active members. This election shall be conducted by mail ballot and shall begin within one (1) month of the request. A vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the active members is required for removal. In the event that the recall election involves the Secretary position, then the Chairman of the Board shall assume the Secretary's duties for the recall election. Termination of office is not a termination of active membership. A separate vote would be required to terminate an active membership.

3.4. Rights of Directors

The Board of Directors manages the operation of the corporation by appointing and removing the Operating Officers and monitoring their performance in office. The Directors shall have exclusive control of any matter which might reasonably be expected to affect more than a single convention.

3.5. Obligations of the Board of Directors

The Directors shall exercise reasonable care in the management of the corporation and shall consider the opinions and concerns of the active and passive members in any decision. Each Director must be legally competent in the State of Arizona, must attend three (3) of the four (4) regular quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors and must meet any other requirements set by the Board for its own operations. Proxy letters may substitute for attendance if necessary.

3.6. Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board

The Board of Directors shall elect one of the Directors as a Chairman and one of the Directors as a Vice-Chairman. The Chairman runs the quarterly meetings. The Vice-Chairman runs the meetings in the absence of the Chairman.

4. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- 4.1. Regular meetings of the Board
- 4.1.1. Quarterly meetings shall be held on the second Saturday of August, November, February and May, these being the second month of each quarter. Active and passive members and members of the Board are responsible for finding out the time and place of the meetings. No notifications are required. Quarterly meetings may be held within 10 days of the above dates if necessary to accommodate the attendance of a majority of the Directors.
- 4.1.2. Other scheduled meetings may be held at the discretion of the President or the Chairman of the Board as needed. For scheduled meetings other than regular quarterly meetings, all active members, all Directors, and all operating officers shall be provided with the time and place with a minimum of one (1) week notice. This notice shall be distributed as widely as practical before the meeting.
- 4.1.3. All regular Board meetings shall be open to all interested people.
- 4.1.4. A quorum is required to make a meeting official. This applies to quarterly, annual, unscheduled or special meetings. A quorum is defined as at least three (3) voting Directors in attendance or by written proxy.

4.2. Unscheduled Board meetings

Unscheduled Board of Directors meetings are those that do not meet the notification requirements for regular meetings. They may be called as desired by the Chairman, as long as a majority of the Directors are present. These meetings may be held informally over the telephone, online or in person so long as a majority of the Directors are contacted and a majority opinion is reached on the question(s) under consideration. Any action taken by an unscheduled meeting must be ratified at the next regular meeting to be valid.

4.3. Annual meeting

Leprecon Inc. shall hold an Annual Meeting each year shortly after the convention. This meeting shall serve as a general report to the convention members on the previous convention and act to set the direction for the next convention. The Annual Meeting shall be one of the regular quarterly meetings. The time and place of the Annual Meeting shall be published in the convention program book.

5. CORPORATE OPERATING OFFICERS

5.1. President

The President is the Chief Operating Officer (COO) of the current convention. S/he supervises the activities of his/her appointed staff. S/he is responsible for the smooth operation of the convention and shall perform whatever duties are necessary to ensure that occurs.

The President shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting.

The President shall also perform any other duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors. The President may not simultaneously hold any other Corporate office.

5.2. Treasurer

The Treasurer is the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) of the corporation. S/he maintains the financial records and accounts of the corporation. S/he is responsible for the proper handling of all corporation assets and shall perform whatever duties are necessary to ensure that occurs. The Treasurer shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall also perform any duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors.

5.3. Secretary

The Secretary is responsible for keeping the non-financial records of the corporation. S/he is responsible for maintaining copies of all necessary corporate records and making copies available as necessary. S/he shall perform all duties necessary to ensure proper performance of this function. The Secretary shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The Secretary shall also perform any other duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors.

5.4. Vice-President

The Vice-President is the COO of the convention following the current convention (next convention). Duties are the same as for President.

5.5. Assistant Vice-President

The Assistant Vice-President is the COO of the convention following the next convention (convention after next). Duties are the same as for President.

6. AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

- 6.1. Amendments may be proposed
- 6.1.1. By petition.
- 6.1.2. By resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 6.2. Amendments may be enacted by
- 6.2.1. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the active members.
- 6.2.2. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board of Directors.
- 6.3. Procedures
- 6.3.1. Amendments must be enacted at a regular meeting. The meeting notice shall announce a vote on a pending bylaws change.

7. DISSOLVING THE CORPORATION

The Corporation shall be dissolved by vote of three-quarters (3/4) of the active members. This vote must be held by mail and must be conducted within one (1) month of a petition requesting it.

8. INTERPRETATION OF THE BYLAWS

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to make binding interpretations of these Bylaws in any case where the Bylaws are ambiguous.

9. PROCEDURES

- 9.1. Petition to the Board of Directors
- 9.1.1. The Secretary shall provide a list of the present active members to anyone requesting it. A processing fee may be charged.
- 9.1.2. Petitions must contain:
- 9.1.2.1. The request being made.
- 9.1.2.2. The dated signatures of the required number of active members. All signatures must be dated within one (1) month of the time the petition is submitted. Unless otherwise specified, signatures of a majority of the active members are required.
- 9.1.2.3. Petitions are submitted to the Secretary who shall promptly take action as required.
- 9.2. Mail Ballot
- 9.2.1. The Secretary shall prepare the ballot specifying the issue to be voted on and instructions for voting.
- 9.2.2. Anyone interested may include a one-page statement to be mailed with the ballot. Sufficient copies must be provided to the Secretary.
- 9.2.3. The ballot shall be mailed to all active members.
- 9.2.4. The Secretary shall allow three (3) weeks for responses to be received. The Secretary shall then tabulate the votes and announce the results.
- 9.2.5. Any active member who does not respond within the required period shall become a passive member.


