Jael

Here's one amazing thing about Jael: you never really get a sense of how old she is or isn't.

I first met Jael at the World Con in Los Angeles in 1996. It was only my second World Con, so everything was exciting and still largely unfamiliar. I had art to hang, panels and meetings and Chesley ceremonies to attend, a hundred names to learn and a million things to do. Most of it is a blur to this day.

But I have a clear image of Jael in my memory. We're in that great vault of the convention center, with art panels on either side. She looks at me, smiling that sweet smile. She's just complimented my artwork. Her words are lost to time, but the feeling isn't: she's warm and encouraging and very comfortable to be with. We talk frequently that weekend, and she is always quick to laugh or to say a kind word. Her artwork proves to be dazzling and bright, but never garish; thoughtful but



never maudlin; full of invention and life. Her energy seems boundless, her enthusiasm bottomless, and her interests without horizon.

I think she must be about 40 ... surely not much more than that.

In the intervening years, I learn more about her little by little, but each revelation comes as a surprise. You did what, *when*? It shakes my impression.

I learn that she was the oldest of six, but from the beginning, a rebellious tomboy. Her spare time was spent collecting frogs and reptiles and bugs and all manner of furry things. She beat up her little brother for years. With her siblings she rode horses, climbed trees, built (and fell out of) many tree houses — breaking eleven bones. Buck Rogers captivated her. She lived in complete disdain of all things Girly.

At age five, she created her own little books, assembling them with string, as there were no staplers in her home as yet. (*No staplers, Jael? Are you sure? And this was when?*)

During World War II, her mother, Myriel Ashton — a composer of some note — together with Erla Young and Alene Dalton created a children's songbook, "My Picture Book of Songs." Ashton and Dalton wrote the songs from scratch, and Young produced the artwork. It was an early and powerful influence on Jael. Only one Chicago publisher was willing to take a chance on it, and only if the women sold 5000 advance copies ... so Jael and her mom went on the road to sell it. Jael became a budding young Shirley Temple, singing and playing and *dancing* in venues across her home state of Utah. The book released in 1947, and was popular across the United States for more than twenty years.

Her mother eventually found herself on television, with a show of her own called *Matinee with Myriel*. Jael regularly made appearances on live television, singing and dancing (*Now I understand your comfort with crowds, your easy acceptance of the limelight. But LIVE television? Before tape?*).

When Jael was seven, she and her mother chanced to meet an elderly gentleman named Louis Welch, a scholar and inventor, who took an instant liking to Jael. He became a much loved mentor of her creative spirit, sending her letters filled with stories and wisdom, and gifts ranging from colored pencils to gramophone recordings. It was Louis who introduced Jael to the art of Tenniel in an early edition of Alice in Wonderland. Her

love of fantasy was given nourishment which feeds her artwork to this day.

For a time, she worked as an apprentice in an ad agency, but at the tender age of nineteen, Jael married and moved to a farm in Alpine, Utah. She soon had three children — Catherine, Daniel, and Justin — and over time was foster mother to nine Navajo children. Though she loved all her children dearly (and she speaks of them with great pride), her duties as a mother and housewife pretty much sidelined her creative spirit. Her art was viewed as little more than a hobby.

The landscapes spoke to her, though, and inspired her passion for her *Perceptualistics*. These engaging abstractual paintings were stories she told herself, filled with subtle emotion and hidden meanings, private explorations of her own inner landscape. Within them, Jael found escape. Together with portraits of her children, they sustained her muse.

And her muse would not be denied. One year she arranged to paint portraits at the State Fair, quite without her husband's knowledge. He was resistant, even patronizing, but her venture was surprisingly successful. Her skills grew, and she started to enter competitions. Her art was frequently controversial — Utah was not ready for nudes or any sort of thinking that broke the bounds of familiar decency. But Jael was determined to produce the artwork that flowed from within. For two decades, spanning a bankruptcy, a divorce, and a move to Las Vegas, she painted portraits and commissions while caring for her maturing family, and escaped into her private perceptions.

The muse led her to Santa Cruz, California, where her Perceptualistics gained some renown. But Jael was weary of the sidewalk artist scene. The range of her vision had grown, incorporating her love of the fantastic, her fascination with science and the promises of the future, and her abstract expressions of perception. She began to look for better channels for her artwork.

Her career found momentum at a local annual symposium called Contact, an exercise in theoretical world-building. There she met Larry Niven and Jerry Pournelle; they encouraged her to take her art to the New York publishers of science fiction and fantasy.

The rest, as they say, is history.

Over twenty two years later (*twenty two years?!*) Jael is established as a preeminent science fiction and fantasy illustrator. In addition, she has illustrated children's classics, magazine interiors and covers, how-to books for children, created fine art for print sales, and commissioned portraits. Her *Perceptualistics* are gaining popularity in the sci-fi world now as well, and were collected in a book by that title, from Paper Tiger, in 2002, with text by John Grant. She is a popular fixture at conventions.

Which brings me full circle—that is where I met her.

I am amazed by the life's arc of this remarkable woman whose art I love, and whose age I still don't quite grasp. There is never judgment or ego with Jael. She is a genuine sweetheart. She lives now in Florida with her husband Greg, two snakes and three cats, and a number of *Harleys*. She has four children, a "blended" son, Greg, twelve grandchildren and ten — almost eleven — *great grandchildren* (*is that really possible, Jael?*). If I were to do the math, counting forward from her childhood and reckoning by the landmarks of her life, I might come up with an appropriate number for her age. But I'd rather not. The number wouldn't matter. Jael is ageless, her artwork timeless, her ready smile and optimism like a tonic — a splash from the fountain of youth.

Karen Traviss - A Biography

For those of you who are curious about these things, I'm a full-time novelist. I still think of myself as that finest of God's creations, a journalist: so I satisfy my need to illuminate the world (whether the World wants it or not) with relentlessly daily blogging. But I still have a hard-wired urge to chase fire engines and harrass politicians. I planned to keep my hand in as a spin-doctor, too - fluent Weasel spoken here - but I found my evil persuasive Sith powers were best used to enhance my own image, thanks very much.

Like most writers, I've been around a bit. Most of my working life has been spent as a journo in TV and newspapers. At one time or another I've been an advertising copywriter, a media liaison officer for the police, a journalism lecturer, a public relations manager and a defence correspondent. I've served in both the Territorial Army and the Royal Naval Auxiliary Service (now disbanded, alas).

I now live in Wiltshire, home of some very fine beers, but I come from Portsmouth, home of the Royal Navy and birthplace of the world's greatest engineer, Isambard Brunel - oh, and some chaps called Charles Dickens and Peter Sellers. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle used to have a medical practice just around the corner from my old house and created Sherlock Holmes there, and H G Wells worked in a drapery store in the same road. Rudyard Kipling spent some childhood years in Portsmouth and Nevil Shute lived in the city too, so you can see there's something about Pompey that drives you to fiction.

Portsmouth's well worth a visit, but the beer's not so good - except Pompey Royal, if you can still find it, and CSB, in Her Majesty's ships.

Nola Yergen-Jennings

Hello, everyone. My name is Anna, and I'm a costume addict. I blame Nola.

It all started off innocently enough, as these sordid tales often do. When I heard about the LOTR party at DarkCon 2004, my first convention ever, I couldn't resist the chance to recycle that Halloween's Galadriel gown. I wasn't halfway through the door before I was struck (almost literally) by a vision: a mourning-clad Arwen straight from the screen, looking more manic than melancholy as she raced by with armloads of party supplies. "Er . . . may I help?" I inquired, or at least I tried; I don't think I completed the word "help" before I'd been elf-accosted and press-ganged into service.

When things calmed, we exchanged introductions and compliments. My outfit was strictly amateur hour compared with her silk velvet extravaganza, but she still noticed every fiddly little detail, including the way I'd glued and sewed the countless appliqués and beads by hand. "You're insane," she observed approvingly.

And thus began a beautiful friendship based on mutual insanity, although in that, as in everything, Nola has always completely outclassed me. I'm an awed acolyte in the sacred confines of her closet, struck dumb by the painstakingly researched Elizabethan wedding gown, the Venetian courtesan, the Xena warrior. She can craft a pair of authentic chopines, cast a Klingon forehead, or mold a set of fantasy armor that deftly treads the knife-edge of indecent exposure. Equally proficient at original creations and letter-perfect reproductions, she sweats the details with a near inhuman energy and bloody-minded, grim determination; sometimes I suspect that cloth cooperates with her out of sheer terror. As you might expect, her portfolio is packed with the awards and accolades that prove her mettle.

Yet for all that, she's never succumbed to snobbery. While she can compete with the best of the hard-core historicists on their own anal-retentive turf, she doesn't scorn the just-for-fun philistines like me who think the zipper was a pretty keen invention. While she's willing to offer advice, assistance, and encouraging words, she never insists on one "right way" to do things. She respects thrift-store costumers and the power of clever cheats and transforming alterations – and, frustratingly, even beats us at our own game; I can't begin to count the number of times I've enthused over one of her impressive everyday outfits, only to hear, "Oh, this? Fifty cents at Savers." Even worse, it's showcased on a model-quality body that's just freakish for a woman who's turned forty (her closet must discreetly hide a grotesque, hideous painting in its depths).

It's amazing that our friendship has survived the inevitable envy.

Annoyingly, her fannish talents are not limited to costuming, for she recently chaired DarkCon 2007. While her first experience as chair marked an interesting time – as in the Chinese curse, "May you live in interesting times" – she managed to herd cats and receive rave reviews, all without losing money, sanity, or friends. As I panicked my way through as a first-time guest liaison, she was always ready with help and praise, even while nursing her own stress stomachaches. The sight of her striding through the con wearing a Bluetooth earpiece and a blood-red Victorian Gothic frock seemed emblematic: competence and beauty combined in one arresting package.





Most recently appearing in the award winning short film, "Silhouette," Joel continues to work on independent film projects here in the valley.

Ravyn Crescent

Ravyn Crescent lives on the internet and resides in Gilbert, Arizona. She is a young author both in age and genre, having turned twenty in December 2006. Ravyn writes Fantasy novels, mostly, but is branching out into other levels of fiction. She is an activist dedicated to ending modern day slavery, called human trafficking, and child abuse. 501st - Dune Sea Garrison

The 501st Stormtrooper Legion, Dune Sea Garrison, Arizona (AZ 501st DSG) is part of the Stormtrooper Legion known as "Vader's Fist." They have been dispatched to the unforgiving wastelands of the Arizona Desert, having proven themselves worthy after numerous tours in the Dune Sea on Tattooine. Once a small squad of sharpshooters, their numbers have grown at a rapid pace so that now Lord Darth Vader himself oversees the unit's preparations for another glorious chapter in the history of the Empire. Their presence shall be known to all within the state of Arizona as they continue to do the Emperor's Will and enforce His rule.

The Dune Sea Garrison is a small part of an international Star Wars costuming group known as "The 501st Stormtrooper Legion", whose three thousand plus members in 21 countries have one simple mission: to bring smiles to the faces of children, of all ages. They bring smiles in two primary ways: making guest appearances (to collect toys) and visiting children (to deliver the toys). The Dune Sea Garrison does their work in the Valley of the Sun, Tucson, Flagstaff and other Arizona localities. They have been involved in events with the Muscular Dystrophy Association Telethon and the Muscular Dystrophy Lock-Up, St. Mary's Food Bank, the Multiple Sclerosis Associations of Tucson and Phoenix, the Diamond Ball, the Phoenix Symphony Hall, Marine Corps Toys for Tots, the Challenger Learning Center, Riley Children's Hospital and other Valley businesses and charities.

Maryeileen Flanagan

Maryeileen Flanagan worked as high school English and science teacher where she also served as Creative Writing Club Sponsor. She rode in a historically-costumed mounted parade group ("Once Upon a Time"), helped with pre-con programming (for World Fantasy Convention in Tucson, among others), worked as the Dance Costumer for the ASU Department of Dance and generally made herself available and annoying in any capacity that was of even a passing interest.

Joseph Formichella

Joseph Formichella began his filmmaking career with a spring-wound Kodak 8mm camera and a group of school friends who spent every weekend shooting chase movies, science fiction epics and odd tales involving a monster so ugly he wore a bag over his head. Joseph also teaches screenwriting at Scottsdale Community College. In 2000, he co-founded Anomalous Entertainment and co-produced an award-winning documentary entitled *Finding the Future*. In 2001, Joseph and Robert Tuxbury formed Industrial Discord to make movies and music videos.

Joseph's other passion is photography, particularly using alternative lighting sources. His latest project is a series of nudes in body paint, shot in black light. Some of his art is on display in the art show.

Nancy Louise Freeman

A familiar voice on the Arizona acoustic circuit, Nancy Louise Freeman has been referred to as "the best songwriter in Phoenix" and "the desert's answer to the Beat Generation". Her musical career began with banging on a little electric organ in the dining room, which progressed to more organized activities on the piano, clarinet, and bassoon. (She later took up guitar because it's hard to whip out a bassoon at a party.) Nan's songs have been recorded by such diverse talents as Joe Bethancourt, Gary Ehrlich and the Harmony Heifers. Her latest CD, the filk opera *Stardust County*, is scheduled for release this summer.

Gilead

Gilead, LepreCon's 2006 Artist Guest of Honor, has been a full-time freelance artist for 14 years. Most of his work is not sci-fi or fantasy, but he had a bunch of gaming illustrations published in the mid '90s, and often sell stuff at conventions. Gilead's work includes murals, signs, theatrical props and store displays. He does oil paintings, acrylics, pen and ink and watercolor on a variety of subjects. Gilead does a painting a day and posts them to his blog.

Dr. Susan Gleason

Dr. Susan "Arizona" Gleason received her doctorate in Anthropology/Archaeology from the University of California, Riverside, in 2001. She has focused her research on various aspects of primitive technology, including flintknapping (the art of making stone tools) and ethnobotany (how people interact with plants). As an artist, she has worked the products of this research into a unique line of arrowhead jewelry that she has shown in art shows across the West coast for the past five years. This artwork and a line of educational materials provide the basis for her business, Phoenix Obsidian Designs. Recently, in recognition of these accomplishments, Dr. Gleason was the Science Guest of Honor at Radcon in Pasco, Washington. In 2007, Dr. Arizona will be chair of Loscon 34: The Dig with a theme of archaeology in science fiction.

Mark Greenawalt

Mark Greenawalt's bodypainting art has been on display at numerous sci-fi conventions including LepreCon, CopperCon, San Diego ComicCon and also at the Mr. Olympia Convention and the Playboy Mansion. 

Marty Massoglia



Registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by convention security, and we will act as a buffer between you and hotel security. Non registered parties that generate complaints will be handled primarily by hotel security and the convention will not act as a buffer nor will we intervene if the hotel chooses to shut down your party. This does not mean that you can register your party and be excessively rowdy and avoid being shut down - the convention reserves the right to shut down parties or events or to withdraw convention recognition and turn the problem over to hotel security should the situation warrant. Please register your party by 5:00pm of the day of the party.

The Hotel may have guests who are who are not convention attendees. These guests have a reasonable expectation of not being disturbed by loud parties during late night hours. While we have tried to keep room parties away from non-attendee rooms and will make every effort to mediate noise disputes involving registered parties, there will be limits on how much noise you can make.

You must be both a convention member and a registered guest at the Hotel to register your room party.

The individual(s) registering the party are responsible for the conduct of all persons at the party. They are also responsible for ensuring that Arizona laws are obeyed, including laws regarding consumption and dispensing of alcohol.

Policies

Security

This is the Weapons and Security Policies and Procedures for the LeperCon 33 convention held May 11th - 13th, 2007. The Convention and Convention Security are not limited by what is contained in this document and will handle any and all incidents during the convention in a manner they deem appropriate for the circumstances.

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to security for appropriate action, which can include but is not limited to the following:

- Verbal cautioning
- Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches = revocation of membership
- Confiscation / removal of weapons or props
- Removal from programming / event
- Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue
- Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

Weapons Policy

Horseplay with weapons WILL NOT be tolerated!

No real or realistic firearms are allowed at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue. Firearms include but are not limited to the following:

- Handguns
- Long guns / shotguns
- Tasers / stun guns
- Any prop or device designed or intended to fire a projectile of homomorphism of the homomorphism of homomorphism of

Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace-bonded. Convention attendees will need to go to the Convention Security Office and have their blade peace-bonded. They will also need to read and sign a copy of the weapons policy.

Any attendee carrying a peace-bonded blade will need to carry or wear the blade in such a manner so that other attendees or anyone else present at the convention venue is not at risk to be struck by or otherwise physically encounter the sheathed weapon. Unsheathed or non-peace-bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any peace-bonded blade carried in an unsafe manner or any non-peace-bonded or unsheathed blade can be confiscated and the attendee could face further action by Security.

BULAWS OF LEPRECON, INC.

Approved November 13, 2005

1. PRIMARY PURPOSE

Leprecon Inc. is organized primarily to operate an annual science fiction convention in the Phoenix metropolitan area. It may also hold other social functions during the year in connection with and in support of the primary purpose.

2 MEMBERSHIP

2.1. Active and Passive members

2.1.1. Becoming a member

Membership in the organization is conveyed to a person by petition at a quarterly meeting, by obtaining a convention membership or by Board of Directors decree. Membership is open to all persons with an interest in science fiction, fantasy, and/or related topics. The Corporation may refuse to accept memberships for cause.

2.1.2. Term of membership

Membership is considered active until at least one (1) quarterly meeting is not attended. Membership is considered passive until returning to active by attending a quarterly meeting before the next convention. Membership is considered either active or passive unless terminated as indicated below. Proxy letters may be substituted for attendance if necessary.

2.1.3. Termination of membership

Membership may be revoked for disorderly, anti-social, or illegal behavior or other specified cause during or in connection with a convention or other corporate sponsored event. Membership is terminated automatically if the member fails to obtain an attending membership in the annual convention. Membership is terminated involuntarily if a two-thirds (2/3) majority of all active members vote to terminate. Membership is terminated voluntarily if the member sends a signed resignation letter to the Secretary or other designated Board of Directors member. Membership is terminated automatically if the member enters the Art Show with art for sale or enters the Dealers Room with intent to sell merchandise.

2.1.4. Rights of membership

Membership entitles the holder to attend quarterly meetings and vote at such meetings, attend the convention for which a convention membership was obtained, or any other function sponsored by the organization.

2.1.5. Classes of membership

Current classes of membership include Active and Passive. The Corporation may declare other classes of membership as needed.

2.16. Petition for membership

A person may petition for membership at a quarterly meeting by circulating a petition asking to become a member. Active members may sign the petition to indicate that the petitioning person is acceptable as a member. If the petitioning person obtains signatures from at least two-thirds (2/3) of the active members present and submits the petition to the Secretary or designated board member, then the person becomes an active member seven (7) days after the end of that quarterly meeting. 2.17. Convention membership

A person may obtain an attending convention membership by purchasing one through the Treasurer or authorized agent, or by holding a convention position (past or present) that is authorized to receive a complimentary membership.

2.2. Member rights

- 2.2.1. Active members are eligible to vote for the Board of Directors, to hold positions on the board, to vote for changes in these Bylaws or for any other reason designated by the Board.
- 2.2.2. There must be at least fifteen (15) active members. Should the number fall below this, the Board of Directors shall appoint new active members as necessary.

2.2.3. Obligations of members

- 2.2.3.1. Active members must be legally competent in the State of Arizona.
- 2.2.3.2. Active and passive members must maintain their current mailing address, email address and telephone number with the Secretary.
- 2.2.3.3. Active members must respond to a ballot.
- 2.2.3.4. Active members must attend each of the regular quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors or send a written proxy letter.
- 2.2.3.5. Active and passive members must be an attending member of the annual convention.

3. DIRECTORS

- 3.1. Composition of the Board of Directors
- 3.1.1. There shall be five (5) voting Directors.
- 3.1.2. Three (3) Directors shall be selected by election for three (3) year terms, electing one Director after each Annual Meeting, and taking office at the end of that meeting.
- 3.1.3. Each person who completes a term as President shall become a Director for a two (2) year term commencing at the end of the Annual Meeting following the completion of the previous convention.
- 3.1.4. The President (current convention chair) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.

- 3.1.5. The Vice-President (next convention chair after current) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.
- 3.1.6. The Assistant Vice-President (following convention chair after next) shall be a non-voting member of the Board.
- 3.2. Election of Directors
- 3.2.1. Directors shall be elected by ballot of the active members. Such elections may take place at any scheduled quarterly meeting. Nominations for such elections may be called for at such scheduled meetings. Typically, elections occur at the Annual Meeting usually held in August.
- 3.2.2. In meetings where nominations and elections are to take place, all active members must be notified one (1) week in advance.
- 3.2.3. Active members not able to attend meetings where elections are held may vote by notifying the Secretary, the President or the Chairman of the Board in writing of their vote.
- 3.2.4. If there is a vacancy on the Board, the Board of Directors may appoint a Director to fill the vacancy until a replacement can be elected for the remainder of the regular term of the Director being replaced. This election shall be within three (3) months of the vacancy.
- 3.3. Termination of Office

The Secretary shall conduct a recall election when requested by petition of the active members. This election shall be conducted by mail ballot and shall begin within one (1) month of the request. A vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the active members is required for removal. In the event that the recall election involves the Secretary position, then the Chairman of the Board shall assume the Secretary's duties for the recall election. Termination of office is not a termination of active membership. A separate vote would be required to terminate an active membership.

3.4. Rights of Directors

The Board of Directors manages the operation of the corporation by appointing and removing the Operating Officers and monitoring their performance in office. The Directors shall have exclusive control of any matter which might reasonably be expected to affect more than a single convention.

3.5. Obligations of the Board of Directors

The Directors shall exercise reasonable care in the management of the corporation and shall consider the opinions and concerns of the active and passive members in any decision. Each Director must be legally competent in the State of Arizona, must attend three (3) of the four (4) regular quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors and must meet any other requirements set by the Board for its own operations. Proxy letters may substitute for attendance if necessary.

3.6. Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board

The Board of Directors shall elect one of the Directors as a Chairman and one of the Directors as a Vice-Chairman. The Chairman runs the quarterly meetings. The Vice-Chairman runs the meetings in the absence of the Chairman.

4. MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- 4.1. Regular meetings of the Board
- 4.1.1. Quarterly meetings shall be held on the second Saturday of August, November, February and May, these being the second month of each quarter. Active and passive members and members of the Board are responsible for finding out the time and place of the meetings. No notifications are required. Quarterly meetings may be held within 10 days of the above dates if necessary to accommodate the attendance of a majority of the Directors.
- 4.1.2. Other scheduled meetings may be held at the discretion of the President or the Chairman of the Board as needed. For scheduled meetings other than regular quarterly meetings, all active members, all Directors, and all operating officers shall be provided with the time and place with a minimum of one (1) week notice. This notice shall be distributed as widely as practical before the meeting.
- 4.1.3. All regular Board meetings shall be open to all interested people.
- 4.1.4. A quorum is required to make a meeting official. This applies to quarterly, annual, unscheduled or special meetings. A quorum is defined as at least three (3) voting Directors in attendance or by written proxy.
- 4.2. Unscheduled Board meetings

Unscheduled Board of Directors meetings are those that do not meet the notification requirements for regular meetings. They may be called as desired by the Chairman, as long as a majority of the Directors are present. These meetings may be held informally over the telephone, online or in person so long as a majority of the Directors are contacted and a majority opinion is reached on the question(s) under consideration. Any action taken by an unscheduled meeting must be ratified at the next regular meeting to be valid.

4.3. Annual meeting

Leprecon Inc. shall hold an Annual Meeting each year shortly after the convention. This meeting shall serve as a general report to the convention members on the previous convention and act to set the direction for the next convention. The Annual Meeting shall be one of the regular quarterly meetings. The time and place of the Annual Meeting shall be published in the convention program book.

5. CORPORATE OPERATING OFFICERS

5.1. President

The President is the Chief Operating Officer (COO) of the current convention. S/he supervises the activities of his/her appointed staff. S/he is responsible for the smooth operation of the convention and shall perform whatever duties are necessary to ensure that occurs.

The President shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting.

The President shall also perform any other duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors. The President may not simultaneously hold any other Corporate office.

5.2. Treasurer

The Treasurer is the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) of the corporation. S/he maintains the financial records and accounts of the corporation. S/he is responsible for the proper handling of all corporation assets and shall perform whatever duties are necessary to ensure that occurs. The Treasurer shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall also perform any duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors.

5.3. Secretary

The Secretary is responsible for keeping the non-financial records of the corporation. S/he is responsible for maintaining copies of all necessary corporate records and making copies available as necessary. S/he shall perform all duties necessary to ensure proper performance of this function. The Secretary shall function under the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors and shall make regular reports informally to the Directors and formally and in detail at each quarterly meeting, including the Annual Meeting. The Secretary shall also perform any other duties assigned by state or federal law or by the Board of Directors.

5.4. Vice-President

The Vice-President is the COO of the convention following the current convention (next convention). Duties are the same as for President.

5.5. Assistant Vice-President

The Assistant Vice-President is the COO of the convention following the next convention (convention after next). Duties are the same as for President.

6. AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

- 6.1. Amendments may be proposed
- 6.1.1. By petition.
- 6.1.2. By resolution of the Board of Directors.
- 6.2. Amendments may be enacted by
- 6.2.1. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the active members.
- 6.2.2. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Board of Directors.
- 6.3. Procedures
- 6.3.1. Amendments must be enacted at a regular meeting. The meeting notice shall announce a vote on a pending bylaws change.

7. DISSOLVING THE CORPORATION

The Corporation shall be dissolved by vote of three-quarters (3/4) of the active members. This vote must be held by mail and must be conducted within one (1) month of a petition requesting it.

8. INTERPRETATION OF THE BYLAWS

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to make binding interpretations of these Bylaws in any case where the Bylaws are ambiguous.

9. PROCEDURES

- 9.1. Petition to the Board of Directors
- 9.1.1. The Secretary shall provide a list of the present active members to anyone requesting it. A processing fee may be charged.
- 9.1.2. Petitions must contain:
- 9.1.2.1. The request being made.
- 9.1.2.2. The dated signatures of the required number of active members. All signatures must be dated within one (1) month of the time the petition is submitted. Unless otherwise specified, signatures of a majority of the active members are required.
- 9.1.2.3. Petitions are submitted to the Secretary who shall promptly take action as required.
- 9.2. Mail Ballot
- 9.2.1. The Secretary shall prepare the ballot specifying the issue to be voted on and instructions for voting.
- 9.2.2. Anyone interested may include a one-page statement to be mailed with the ballot. Sufficient copies must be provided to the Secretary.
- 9.2.3. The ballot shall be mailed to all active members.
- 9.2.4. The Secretary shall allow three (3) weeks for responses to be received. The Secretary shall then tabulate the votes and announce the results.
- 9.2.5. Any active member who does not respond within the required period shall become a passive member.
