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
DeFOREST KELLEY

But for recreation, George prefers the more old fashioned forms of transport, the feet — logging in the summer, ice skating in the winter — and the whole human body — swimming whenever there is a body of water around. JACQUELINE LICHTENBERG



Jacqueline Lichtenberg has been a professional sf writer since she sold the first story in her Sime Series to IF MAGAZINE in 1968. She later became interested in STAR TREK fandom, starting the Kraith Series of STAR TREK stories which now has fifty contributors and has earned her a Nomination for the Best Fan Writer Hugo of 1974. (She was runner-up.) The Kraith Series activity led to her founding of STAR TREK WELCOMMITTEE and to the Bantam paperback, STAR TREK LIVES! by Jacqueline Lichtenberg, Sondra Marshak and Joan Winston, and which is past its 6th printing. While writing STL!, Jacqueline also wrote an sf novel set in her Sime Series but using the Tailored Effect theory proposed in STL! as the basis of ST's appeal. This novel, HOUSE OF ZEOR, has done exceptionally well in hardcover (Dbdy, 1974) and is now in paperback from POCKET BOOKS. This year has also seen publication of TK-Graphics' MORE VULCAN REFLECTIONS containing Jacqueline's very first ST article, "Mr. Spock on Logic" from Spockanalia #4. TK-Graphics has bought Jacqueline's article on Marion Zimmer Bradley's Darkover Series for their collection, FEMINIST STUDIES IN SF AND FANTASY edited by Jessica Amanda Salmonson. And Jacqueline's regular sf review and commentary column is running in MEDIA SPOTLIGHT, a new professional magazine devoted to STAR TREK's impact on the media. In fiction, a number of her new short works are appearing, including RECOMPENSE (Galileo Magazine #2) and another Sime story, CHANNEL'S EXEMPTION (Galileo #4). Her newest major Sime novel, UNTO ZEOR, FOREVER should be out from Dbdy June 1978. Jacqueline's Sime Series, like STAR TREK itself and like her Kraith Series, has spawned a small but intense fandom of its own which publishes a fanzine, Ambrov Zeor, containing Sime stories, articles, and news of Jacqueline's ever growing bibliography.





Metropolis (1926) - the granddaddy of all futuristic sci-fi spectacles. Set in the year 2000, the son of the Master of Metropolis rebels against the city's forced society.

Forbidden Planet (1956) - a group of astronauts landing on the planet Altair IV find a scientist, his daughter, and Robby the Robot. Good special effects by Disney Studios give a spectacular visual jolt to this movie.

Seven Faces of Dr. Loa (1964) - Riding into a troubled town in Texas at the turn of the century, the mysterious Dr. Loa, on a yellow mule, sets up a circus show, using magic to teach the town a lesson.

Batman (1943) - The evil Dr. Daka uses a machine that reduces its victims to a state of Zombieism. The Dynamic Duo set out to stop him.

Buck Rogers (1939) - American pilot Buck Rogers joins Dr. Huer in the Hidden City to give Killer Kane and the Zugs from Saturn a run for their money Based on the comic strip hero.

Flash Gordon (1936) - With the planet Mongo headed for a collision course with Earth, Flash and company blast-off to try to thwart the evil guidance of the Mongo ruler, Ming the Merciless.

Day the Earth Stood Still - A man from outer space lands on Earth and warns the planet that atomic weapons experiments must cease before the logical tragedy occurs.

Dark Star - the scoutship Dark Star is on a mission in deep space during the 21st century to seek out and destroy "unusable" planets.

Tales from the Crypt - On a tour through a sub-terranian burial ground, five unrelated sightseers find themselves locked in a crypt.

The Devil's Rain - This film explores devil worship and Satanism. Starring William Shatner.

Night of the Lepus - Giant 150 pound rabbits terrorize an Arizona town. With DeForest Kelley.

The Mechanical Monsters - Made in 1940, this is one of the first Superman cartoons.

Of Things to Come (1936) - Script by H. G. Wells shows the future of Earth to 2036 through two families. Fantastic special effects.
