

BOB EGGLETON, ARTIST GUEST OF HONOR

Bob Eggleton, 37, began his career as a science fiction artist in 1984 with covers for Baen Books. He has since illustrated countless (well, not literally countless, but lots and lots) books and has done work for such magazines as ASTRONOMY and SKY & TELESCOPE. He works primarily with acrylics, air brush and scratchboard. His covers include work for authors such as Gregory Benford, Greg Bear, Hal Clement, Arthur C. Clarke, and Isaac Asimov.

He has been nominated for the Best Professional Artist Hugo in every year but one since 1988, and he received the Award in 1994, 1996 and 1997. He also also was nominated twice in the now-defunct Best Original Artwork category (1992 and 1996) and has been the recipient of numerous Chesley Awards (sponsored by the Association of Science Fiction and Fantasy Artists). His other interests include Godzilla movies and craters.

Bob's work is popular with publishers because of his dramatic and colorful compositions, and because he has the uncommon ability to meet a deadline. His technique is easily identifiable as his own, striving for an interesting angle and dazzling colors. He combines these elements to create a scene which is glowingly dreamlike, yet starkly realistic. He paints furiously with trance-like concentration, and seems to be able to paint anything imaginable, even by his own fertile mind. "Space art to me is pure feeling, "he says, "something anyone can understand. For much of science fiction art, you must read the story to appreciate the art".



HAL CLEMENT, AUTHOR GUEST OF HONOR

Hal Clement (Harry Clement Stubbs) was born in Somerville, Massachusetts on May 30, 1922, to Harry Clarence Stubbs and Marjorie (White) Stubbs. He grew up in Greater Boston, attending schools in Arlington and Cambridge, finishing Rindge Tech in 1939.

He received his B.S. in astronomy from Harvard in 1943, an M. Ed. from Boston University in 1946 (G.I. Bill) and an M.S. in chemistry from Simmons College in 1963 (Sputnik panic). Upon finishing Harvard, he entered the Army Air Corps Reserve, received pilot wings and lieutenant's commision at Steward Field, New York, in March 1944, and flew 35 combat missions as copilot and pilot in Liberator (B-24) bombers with the 8th Air Firce. Recalled to active duty in 1951, he spent eight months as a squadron executive officer at Bolling Air Force Base and sixteen months as a technical instructor at the Armed Forces Special Weapons School in Sandia Base, New Mexico. He retired from service as a full colonel in 1976.

His interest in both science and science fiction started in 1930 when he saw a Buck Rogers comic strip featuring a space ship en route to Mars. His father, an accountant unable to answer young Harry's scientific questions, took him to the local (Arlington) public library; he returned with an astronomy book under one arm and Jules Verne's Trip to the Moon under the other. His first story, "Proof", appeared in the June 1942 issue of Astounding Science Fiction (now Analog) Magazine, and his first novel, Needle, serialized there in 1949. His best known story, Mission of Gravity, appeared in 1953 and has been in print

most of the time since. Other well known novels are Iceworld, Close to Critical, Star Light, and Still River (DelRey, June 1987; paberback February 1989). Fossil was published in November, 1993 by Daw Books.

Mr. Stubbs married Mary Elizabeth Myers in 1952. They have two sons, George Clement and Richard Myers, and a daughter, Christine (Mrs. David O. Hensel). A grandson, Jackson Clement Stubbs, is now 9 years old (Warning: Hal carries pictures).

Hal Clement is now a 23 gallon Red Cross blood donor, and hopes to reach 25. He taught high school science for forty years, two in a public school and 38 at Milton Academy in Milton Massachusetts, from which he retired in 1987. He has served the New England Association of Chemistry Teachers as a Division Chairman, in various positions for its regular Summer Conferences, and finally as President. He is an honorary member of NEACT and of Aula Laudis, an honor organization of high school teachers. Since 1972, he has also painted astronomical and science-fiction art as George Richard. It is assumed by fans that Star Trek honored Hal by naming the U.S.S. Clement in his honor.
