

# May All Your Dreams Come True

First Fandom is slipping away quietly on the tide; blink and someone else has been stolen from the shoreline of dreams. Dreamers Asimov, Heinlein, Herbert, Sturgeon, Tiptree and Zelazny are gone, their works becoming treasure buried in sand.

Present waves of younger writers batter the publishing rocks, pounding mad sonatas out on their keyboards. They litter the shoreline of our dreams with the drift of their nightmares. The violence screaming from the headlines or shuddering on the six o'clock news echoes from trade pages. Are we creating or reflecting?

Science fiction has been a guidepost to the future, a map of untouched times. Dreams from the Golden Age, Star Trek, and Star Wars have jumped the gap between dreams and material reality. The old golden dreams took us to the Moon, invented CAT scans, and laser tools. Where are the new dreams taking us? Mad Max and Road Warrior popularized roach cuts, junk culture and despair. How much of our future are we creating as we sculpt imagination from blank grey matter?

If fiction is only a reflection on the water, the ugliness and violence on the printed page is no surprise. And of only transitory importance. But what if we create more than a passing nightmare? What if those reflections take on flesh and substance? What if printed nightmares become part of our culture, the bed we sleep in?

Life has a penchant for imitating art. Perhaps we should be more careful.



#### Melanie Rawn, Fantasy Guest of Honor



You know your publisher loves you when Michael Whelan does your covers. Repeatedly. The publishing field is drenched in the blood of sword and sorcery novels, but when a writer's work sells like Melanie Rawn's does, publishers are eager to dress up a novel with the best covers the industry can offer. I wonder if Melanie got dibs on the original for the cover of "Skybowl".

Publishing (and writing) is an intensely competitive field and staying in print is tough. Writers come and go like Tucson's summer monsoons. Yet, series after series, Melanie's work prevails like granite in a sandstorm. A simple test of a storyteller's staying power can be made in used book stores. Once-popular stuff shows up on the second-hand shelves in multiple battered copies. Try finding used copies of Melanie's books there. Uh huh. Right. Looks to me like her readers won't part with her writing.

Melanie Rawn is California born and educated; her career began with teaching and editing prior to her escape into fantasy writing. Melanie Rawn herself escaped from southern California and resettled among the pines of Flagstaff, a good career move and fortunate for us.

#### John Vornholt, Science Fiction Guest of Honor By Nancy Reich Vornholt

Living with a writer for twenty years means, well, living with a writer. A scary thought for an uncreative, practical, get-a-job-with-benefits type of person like myself. The sign on his office door, "Don't disturb unless there's a fire," drives me absolutely mad. But I've learned to be patient and to accept that I will never live the mundane life I was born into.

John was writing original radio drama for the now- defunct Sears Radio Theater when I met him in 1978. He'd come out to LA to shake up Hollywood and had all the determination of a 27-year-old ready to break into showbiz. John already had quite a range of experience. He'd done the NY writer bit, selling off his furniture piece by piece until he ran out of money and had to return to Ohio. He'd lived in Europe for 4 years, playing actor and stuntman, and owned a bar in a touristy western town - in the Canary Islands.

During our years in LA, John did every type of writing imaginable, from microwave oven manuals to sold-out theater productions, Hollywood Reporter articles, and TV pilots. He's been there, done that. The sale of his first Star Trek novel was really a fluke. His agent told him in passing that he was sending story ideas (from other writers) to the Star Trek editors and why didn't John give it a shot? His outline for Masks was the only idea bought in that batch and Masks became the first of the "Next Generation" books to make the New York Times best seller list. Masks was the first of 15 books John would write in the Star Trek universe.

With John I've experienced the ups and downs of both the Hollywood and New York publishing worlds. They are worlds fraught with egos and politics. When other less-determined writers would be discouraged, John plunged forward. John has talent and tenacity and has the confidence to follow his heart. I truly believe the Muses live within him. He can write a 300-plus page book with barely an outline, yet he intimately knows each character.

John is a writer for life and believe me, at times that was hard for me to accept. Our kids only know life with a writer. When dad's on a deadline, it's normal to only see him during bathroom breaks and quick meals. Yet, our kids have a unique glimpse of the creative edge of society and I'm eternally grateful that John has opened up this world to them.

Thanks, John. It's been quite a ride.



## Ed Bryant, The Eternal ToastMaster An Editorial



When a writer returns to TusCon year after year like a yo-yo on a rubber string, the challenge of providing fresh biographical blood is irresistible. I'll rip a page from Simon Hawke, who penned last year's tribute to Ed. This is a blend of fact and fiction, words pureed in the processor and spilled on the printed page. Eat up, it's good for you.

Getting fresh dirt on Ed isn't easy.

He's aloof, tracks covered. He's like a freshly stuccoed wall, just waiting for the graffiti spraycan. I thought I knew Ed pretty well, though maybe not as well as other folks I won't name in print. In fact, any TusCon regular knows Ed almost as well as I do. Enough to walk up, say Hi, ask him where he left his shorts. You know, the usual conversational stuff. Have I started something here? Despite what I thought I knew, I now know the guy doesn't answer his mail, even when you send him self-addressed stamped envelopes. Hell, he probably steams off the stamps and uses 'em to pay his light bill.

Did I mention he writes? Ed's a short story man. He works best in tight spaces, his prose budgeted for maximum punch. I tripped over Ed's literary toes in the eighties, first on "Particle Theory" and "Cinnabar", then back-tracking to "Among the Dead," published when you could buy fresh pulp fiction for \$1.25. Fast forward to 1990 to "Phoenix Without Ashes" (with darlin' Harlan) or "Flirting with Death", his 1995 collection. He won't tell me what he's currently up to. Must be top secret, big bucks. Uh huh. Ed teaches writing in Denver and any other cow town college desperate for real talent in their classrooms. He's been known to steer a workshop and apply constructive criticism - the kind that doesn't result in suicide by young writers. And if you really want a case of the creeps, attend one of his midnight readings. I guarantee you won't sleep.

# Alan Gutierrez

The year was back then; the place was WesterCon-something in Phoenix. Don't ask me what number. It makes me feel old. I was cruising the art show. I stopped dead in front of this generous canvas of a space probe descending into roiling thunderheads on Jupiter. The colors! I drooled. I checked out the signature. Just who is this Gutierrez guy anyway?

Alan was a Civil Engineering dropout who got hooked on Science Fiction art while attending Orange Coast College in California. He graduated from the Art Center College of Design in '82 with a BFA. A career followed. His Jet Propulsion Lab Jupiter Probe painting was the drool material mentioned above. His early covers graced L-5 journals and Tor books. Then he slipped into the black hole of illustrators, New York City.

Years pass. Alan's stuff popped up on book covers, sometimes featuring real live Arizona fans as models. Dozens of covers later, his reputation made, Alan escaped New York City, homed in on Arizona, and built a life in the red rocks of Sedona. He married Rhonda Duran in '89 and they have two little girls, Rachel (7) and Monica (6 months).

It's 1997. He's done 250 book covers, not including playing cards, toy and game box covers, interiors and commissions. Recently he finished the last cover in the Deep Space Nine series, "Trapped in Time", for Pocket Books. He is currently painting a series called "Silent Death" - Junk", and the November issue of Popular Mechanics features his illustration for the Cassini Probe.

I was lucky enough to snag an early guache sketch before he became a name in the illustration biz; later I bought a small badge in acrylics. His guache sketches are a steal. His acrylic originals...well...they're collector's items. Your walls will be well-dressed if you can get your hands on one.

Look for a dark haired guy, not too tall, with snapping dark eyes and an easy grin. Ask him about color mixing and color theory and color blindness. He's more than amazing.

#### David Foster (Gannd), Fan Guest of Honor



Okay. We admit he has a pool. And a jacuzzi. Isn't that reason enough?

I mean, just because the guy has round-tripped on the silicon trail between Tucson and Phoenix for the past ten years doesn't mean we can't give him his due. Or his comeuppance. Huge Aircrash called his name last year and he returned to Tucson, living way-the-hell-southeast in a development

that would look more at home near dear old Miskatonic U, Cape Cod pitched roofs and all. The house came with unique interior decor. Ask him about gunnite on toilet seats.

Dave has his good points. Sharp good points. He agents for Jaeger Knives, those shiny fine-honed blades frequently displayed in art shows. His sideline biz is "Druid's Keep"; he's a master leathersmith, crafting belts, girdles and sheathes for those shiny knives, detailing all with tooling and dyes. 

#### RESTAURANTS

The Executive Inn restaurant is open daily for breakfast. Check with the restaurant or front desk for hours, which may vary.

#### ART SHOW AND AUCTION

WE MOVED IT! TusCon's Art Show has finally outgrown the two rooms it has occupied across from the ConSuite since, um, almost the beginning of time. We're trying on the Westwood Room for size this year. If it fits, look out for next year, TusCon 25!

The TusCon 24 Art Show will OPEN on Friday in midafternoon and close later that indefinite day. Saturday hours are 10 AM until the Show Director passes out. Sunday's hours are short for final bids - 10 AM to 12 noon - and to allow time for auction setup. Closing times may vary slightly on the whim of the Art Show Director.

The AUCTION will occur at 1 PM Sunday. TusCon requires 2 bids to send a piece to auction. However, a single-bid piece MAY go to auction at the Director's discretion.

There are two ways to buy art through the TusCon Art Show - the Bid (auction) way and the Flat Sale way. Pieces with a FLAT SALE price only (no minimum bid indicated) may be purchased for that FLAT SALE price only. Such pieces do NOT go to auction. Pieces with a BID option indicated but NO flat sale can only receive bids - no flat sales are allowed. Pieces with BOTH FLAT SALE and MINIMUM BID prices indicated may be purchased for the FLAT SALE price ONLY if there are no marked bids. Similarly, a BID may be made on a piece with both options if NO flat sale has been marked on the bid sheet.

Please keep track of your bids and flat sale purchases. Assume that any piece you bid on will show up at the auction. Be prepared to pay for your purchases with cash, traveler's checks or personal checks. Identification such as a driver's license or bank card will be required for personal checks. Sorry, but TusCon doesn't do credit sales.

Please think before you bid. You will be held responsible for any bids or flat sale purchases you make. Purchased art work may not be removed from the show prior to closing on Sunday. If you MUST leave prior to closing, please make arrangements with the Art Show Director. And, should your courage or cash flow falter or fail



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




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
