





GREAT BRITAIN 1957 91 MINUTES NR SATURDAY 5:20 PM

American industrialist Tom Friend (Forrest Tucker) and British botanist Dr. John Rollason(Peter Cushing) are hot on the trail of the legendary Yeti—for different reasons. Could a fossilized tooth in a Tibetan cylinder held by the High Lama hold the key? With an impressive Buddhist temple set built at Bray soundstages and second unit photography done in the French Pyrenees, this sensitive and atmospheric film based on Nigel Kneale's treatment THE CREATURE is the best on the subject.

THE ADVENTURES OF SUPERMAN: PANIC IN THE SKY (50TH ANN, TRIBLITE)

USA 1953 26 MINUTES NR SATURDAY 10 AM

Considered by fans of this 50's TV staple to be one of their all-time favorite episodes, this one has everything--including the world on the verge of destruction by a rampaging asteroid, and an amnesiac Man of Steel(and naked to boot) on the verge of revealing his secret identity to all. And we'll throw in stock footage of Mt. Palomar at no extra charge.

ALLEGRO NON TROPPO

ITALY 1979 75 MINUTES PG FRIDAY 2 PM

Filmmaker Bruno Bozetto's response to FANTASIA is a marvelous little ensemble of set pieces more intensely personal than the Disney counterpart. Six musical selections from Debussy, Dvorak, Ravel, Vivaldi, Stravinsky, and the especially heart-rending "Valse Triste" from Sibelius are bracketed around an artist nervously drawing away in an orchestra pit full of loony musicians and a Roberto Benigni-esque conductor.

ARMY OF DARKNESS USA 1993 87 MINUTES R SATURDAY 7 PM

"Trapped in time. Surrounded by evil. Low on gas." The further adventures of Ash(Bruce Campbell) in the EVIL DEAD series takes him and his '73 Olds to medieval times, his right hand a chainsaw, to battle the deadites and unlock the secrets of the Necronomicon, bound in human skin. Campbell is the acerbic and over-the-top horror/comedy actor that Jim Carrey could be with the right amount of coaching. Director Sam Raimi's penchant for Three Stooges' shtick makes a hysterical appearance in the graveyard scene.

AT MIDNIGHT I'LL TAKE YOUR SOUL
(A' MEIA-NOITE LEVAREI SUIA ALMA)
BRAZIL 1963 81 MINUTES NR FRIDAY 12 MIDNIGHT

Coffin Joe is a cult figure in South America, having achieved the same status that Freddy Krueger enjoys here. He's appeared in five films so far, and AMITYS marks his first appearance. American viewers may find the plot more like a bizarre soap opera

("Dark Shadows", anyone?)—a top-hatted, long-fingernailed undertaker terrorizes a small town and wants to father a son by his best friend's girl. The director, Jose Mojica Marins, plays the title character, and he needs a bit more suave and a little less Dwight Frye.

THE BEAST FROM 20,000 FATHOMS (50th anniversary tribute) USA 1953 80 minutes NR Saturday 12:30 pm

When Ray Bradbury wrote "The Foghorn" for THE SATURDAY EVENING POST, he didn't realize that his boyhood chum Ray Harryhausen would bring his mournful sea serpent to the screen. Instigating a wave of GIANT DEAD THINGS BROUGHT BACK TO LIFE THROUGH ATOMIC TESTING, BEAST inspired Ishiro Honda to create GODZILLA(GOJIRA) a year later. The fragment remaining from Bradbury's tale illustrates graphically the Rhedosaurus encountering a lonely little lighthouse on the rocky coast of Maine at night.

BRAZIL

GREAT BRITAIN 1985 142 MINUTES R SUNDAY 5:30 PM

"Conscience is the inner voice which warns us that someone may be looking"—H.L. Mencken— Terry Gilliam's metaphysical take on Orwell's 1984, with comic relief and exuberant reverie by its protagonist, Sam Lowry(Jonathan Pryce). His efforts to resolve a nightmarish bureaucratic error in this retrofitted universe make him an enemy of the state. Co-writer Charles McKeown, when asked what the movie was about, replied, "It's a film for teaching you how to cross the road, and all about minding where you're going." With a sparkling cast that includes Robert DeNiro as the Watergate-type burglar Harry Tuttle, Katherine Helmond, Ian Holm, Michael Palin, Ian Richardson, and the incomparable Kim Greist.

CAST A DEADLY SPELL USA 1991 96 MINUTES R SATURDAY 2 PM

It's Los Angeles, 1948, and everyone in the city practices magic, "because it makes things easier". Except for Harry Lovecraft, the world-weary gumshoe who eschews the gift for personal reasons. He's out to recover a stolen copy of the Necronomicon(maybe he should team with Ash) for a rich client. A delicious *frisson* of comedy/horror/film noir, the in-jokes abound as cast members Fred Ward, David Warner, Julianne Moore, and Charles Hallahan milk the Cthulhu Mythos of every tentacled, dripping, and sticky situation.

COUNT DRACULA (BBC PRODUCTION) GREAT BRITAIN 1977 151 MINUTES NR SATURDAY 8:30 PM

When public television broadcast this event in early 1978, and then shelved it, American audiences were not sure if they had seen the definitive version of Stoker's novel or not. But the years have been kind to this lavish production, and it's superior in many ways to Coppola's "definitive version". Highly erotic, there is more sympathy and less blood than you might imagine. Louis Jourdan's count is sanguine, but not vicious. What terrified audiences was his little journey headfirst down the castle wall. Frank Finlay as van Helsing and Judi Bowker as Mina would fit right in to a "Masterpiece Theatre" segment.

DESTROY ALL MONSTERS (KAIJU SOSHINGEKI) JAPAN 1968 89 MINUTES PG SATURDAY 3:45 PM

Here's your monster buffet—ALL members of the Kaiju Eiga(giant monster) pantheon are represented, even some cameos by some very obscure big creatures like Wenda and Baragon. They live on Monster Island in peaceful coexistence until evil aliens gain control of them and release them from captivity, sending them out to destroy the capitals of the world. Although it's a far cry from director Honda's original GOJIRA, this film has a high nostalgic quotient, and, did we say?——LOTS of monsters.

DONNIE DARKO

USA 2001 113 MINUTES R SATURDAY 11:10 PM

Harvey's evil side is a skull-faced rabbit named Frank who exhorts Donnie to do violent things. Since Donnie is from a dysfunctional suburban family, this is normal adolescent development. Frank is also very specific about predicting the end of the world--namely in 28 days, 6 hours, 42 minutes, and 12 seconds. Perhaps Donnie is just disturbed by the results of the 1988 presidential election. Perhaps he is obsessed with Grandma Death's treatise on time travel. Perhaps----oh, never mind.

ED WOOD

USA 1994 127 MINUTES R SUNDAY 11:30 AM

Although Tim Burton takes some liberties with the man crucified as "the worst director" of all time, it certainly captures the essence of Ed Wood's(Johnny Depp) life and film career. Its real strength is its casting—Lisa Marie as Vampira, George "The Animal" Steele as Tor Johnson, Jeffrey Jones as Criswell, Bill Murray as Bunny Breckenridge, and Oscar-winning Martin Landau as Bela Lugosi. Although Lugosi's relationship with Boris Karloff was less vitriolic than depicted, Landau is agonizingly focused as the downtrodden actor whose career is resurrected by the hopelessly naive Wood. Burton actually "out-cheaps" Ed Wood—his spray-painted paper plate flying saucers for "Plan 9 From Outer Space" were a step down from the Lindberg plastic flying saucer models Wood really used (contrary to popular opinion, they were NOT hubcaps!!!).

FAHRENHEIT 451

GREAT BRITAIN 1966 113 MINUTES NR SATURDAY 10:30 AM

The bookburnings in Germany established a moral barometer for Ray Bradbury's tale of social responsibility. Truffaut's society not only depicts firemen who start fires instead of putting them out—it also has no use for human relationships that do not serve the greater good. Oskar Werner and Julie Christie(in dual roles) discover why such relationships are toxic, as the love of reading can be damaging to a citizenry of castes. Truffaut cleverly has his characters speak the opening credits, to de-emphasize the printed word, and Werner's Montag can be seen in bed reading comic strips with no cartoon balloons. Bradbury claims to like this version a lot—so why authorize a remake scheduled for release in 2005?

FAUST

GERMANY 1926 116 MINUTES NR FRIDAY 3:20 PM

Goethe's immortal tale(pun intended) based on a medieval legend of a man who

sells his soul for everlasting life has been interpreted many times in many guises—in plays, operas, and musical pieces. F.W. Murnau(NOSFERATU, SUNRISE) creates a whole universe in-house through the full cooperation of UFA studios—no location shooting was employed, and the results are simply amazing. By controlling light and shadow(like THE CABINET OF DR. CALIGARI) and creating a miniature town full of twisted rooftops over which Mephistopheles(played by Academy Award winner Emil Jannings) can soar, Murnau's vision is a real stunner. Elaborate smoke effects and the use of acrobats to simulate pathetic, doomed souls is visually similar to FANTASIA's "Night on Bald Mountain" sequence, and Disney's animators, many of whom worked for UFA studios, were no doubt inspired by Murnau's silent masterpiece.

THE FEARLESS VAMPIRE KILLERS
(OR, "PARDON ME, BUIT YOUR TEETH ARE IN MY NECK")
USA 1967 111 MINUTES R SUNDAY 3:30 PM

Polanski's prelude To ROSEMARY'S BABY is a fearless send-up of the horror genre. The director plays the stupid assistant Alfred to Professor Abronsius(Jack MacGowran), known to his colleagues as "The Nut". Traveling to Transylvania to rid the world of nocturnal bloodsuckers, they encounter a Freudian van Helsing, a Jewish vampire who scoffs at the crucifix, and the notorious Count von Krolock(Ferdy Mayne). The soon-to-be doomed Sharon Tate patters diaphanously through the lavish decor, and the climactic vampire ball is enchanting. Poking fun at not only the English Gothic tradition but the entire Hammer horror oeuvre, our version is 13 minutes(how appropriate) longer than the original U.S. release, titled DANCE OF THE VAMPIRES in the U.K.

THE GHOST BREAKERS (BOB HOPE 100TH BIRTHDAY TRIBLITE)
USA 1940 85 MINLITES NR SUNDAY 8:30 AM

When Bob Hope and Paulette Goddard made THE CAT AND THE CANARY, they were paying homage to a silent film classic, THE CAT CREEPS. Reunited in this film, the "old dark house" theme is transplanted to a small island off Cuba, where Mary Carter(Goddard) has inherited her family's ancestral home. Larry Lawrence (Hope) joins her to flee the mob in New York after a wrongly accused hit, and along with black stereotype Alex, they encounter voodoo, spooks, and a particularly menacing zombie (Noble Johnson, from THE MUMMY and KING KONG). Although considered a "B" picture, the sets in this film are quite extraordinary. This is Hope's only other fantasy/horror picture, unless you count the appearance of the giant cephalopod in ROAD TO BALI.

MAD LOVE USA 1935 85 MINUTES NR FRIDAY 5:30 PM

With as much twisted sensibility as its temporal counterpart, THE BLACK CAT, director Karl Freund(THE MUMMY) brings a disturbing coda to this adaptation of THE HANDS OF ORLAC. Brilliant but neurotic surgeon Dr. Gogol(Peter Lorre) is obsessed with the wife of concert pianist Stephen Orlac. When Orlac loses his hands in a train accident, Madame Orlac pleads with Gogol for her husband's life, who wants to bargain for her love. When she refuses, Gogol grafts the hands of a murderer onto Orlac's wrists. Gogol, like his Russian namesake, is a purveyor of dead souls, and his chilling utterance, "Each man kills the thing it loves" is a hallmark of American Gothic cinema.

THE MAN WHO FELL TO EARTH
GREAT BRITAIN 1976 138 MINUTES R FRIDAY 9 PM

Some novels are best approached sideways when adapted for film. It seems viewers were awfully confused by Nicolas Roeg's interpretation of Walter Tevis' creation—the lonely alien Newton who leaves his dying planet and family to search for water. In the process he's manipulated by corporate greed out to make a buck off him, and he discovers what it means to be emotionally connected to earthlings. Tevis' novel, much of it autobiographical, was shifted from Kentucky to New Mexico—the arid southwest being a perfect juxtaposition for flashbacks of Newton's drought-stricken planet. Much of the confusion came from studio cuts. Some came from Roeg's insistence on playing with our temporal sensibilities. In this restored version, let's cut out the confusion.

ONCE UPON A TIME

LISA 1944 88 MINUTES NR SATURDAY 8:30 AM

Theatre impresario Jerry Flynn (Cary Grant) is deeply in debt after producing three flops when he stumbles across two boys, Pinky and Fatso, who have a dancing caterpillar named Curley that lives in a shoebox. He only responds to the tune "Yes Sir, That's My Baby", preferably played on Pinky's harmonica. Flynn smells big B.O.(box office, not body odor), and when radio personality Gabriel Heater(who also appeared in THE DAY THE EARTH STOOD STILL) broadcasts the story on his weekly show, even Walt Disney's representatives come calling. With a fine supporting cast of Janet Blair, William Demarest, and James Gleason, this sentimental tale will appeal to those who like HERE COMES MR. JORDAN and THE WIZARD OF OZ , and who favor imagination over elaborate special effects.

THE REFLECTING SKIN
GREAT BRITAIN/CANADA 1990 95 MINUTES R SUNDAY 1:45 PM

A slice of American Gothic presented by Philip Ridley (writer of THE KRAYS) and starring Viggo Mortensen (THE LORD OF THE RINGS) as Seth's older brother Cameron. Young Seth is confronted daily in his small town by dark and disturbing events. Dolphin Blue, the widow down the road, may be a vampire, and Death drives a black car through the streets. He's also dealing with an abusive mother and a father charged with molestation in this Grant Wood/Salvador Dali mix. With a minimal plot but highly charged imagery, THE REFLECTING SKIN is in a category that defies description.

YOUNG COUPLES ONLY/DRIVE-IN INTERMISSION
USA 1955 35 MINUTES NR FRIDAY 11:25 PM

This episode of the TV anthology series STUDIO 57(formerly HEINZ 57 PLAYHOUSE) aired Sept. 3, 1955 and has all the earmarks of THE TWILIGHT ZONE. Not surprising, since it was based on a story by Richard Matheson. Peter Lorre plays a creepy building superintendent who has one tenant(Barbara Hale of "Perry Mason") convinced he's not what he appears. What IS he building in the basement anyway? Followed by ten minutes of classic drive-in intermission spots featuring yummy snack bar products to take you into our next feature.

Biography of Yvonne Navarro

After pining for nearly twenty years, Yvonne Navarro finally made her long-desired move to the grand state of Arizona in September of 2002. Born back in the early days when black and white photographs were considered normal instead of artsy, as a child she always thought she'd grow up to be an artist and, being a child, was convinced this entailed spending the rest of her days doing line drawings of long, leggy models like the ones that were drawn in the daily newspapers. Life, however, did not cooperate: a foul-up in grammar school resulted in a transfer to a local high

school instead of the technical, arts-heavy one she'd planned to attend. She did play around with illustrating a bit in the early 1990s and some of her work (mostly graphite and charcoal) appeared in small press horror magazines.

She moved around the country a couple of times, and by the time she returned to Chicago in 1981 she'd worked as a waitress, a nurse's aide, a bookkeeper and gift shop cashier, an accounting clerk, and a secretary in everything from office furniture stores to a hotel to a journalism society. She returned to her old iob in a Chi-



cago law firm and settled down in the Windy City, and in 1982 she decided to try writing on the advice of a family member. While she sold her first story in 1984 to The Horror Show Magazine, and even got paid a whopping \$1.50 for it, it wasn't until 1988 that she'd see another of her stories published. As time would tell, this was the second of many. Since then she's written nearly a hundred stories of various lengths (an early few of which will never see the light of day).

Her first novel, AfterAge, was published in 1993 and was a finalist for the Bram Stoker Award for Superior Achievement in a First Novel. In 1995 her second solo novel, deadrush, was published, and it also was a finalist for the Bram Stoker Award, this time in the category of Superior Achievement in a novel. Final Impact, her third solo novel, was published in 1997, and won both the Chicago Women In Publishing's Award for Excellence in Adult Fiction and the "Unreal Worlds" Award for Best Horror Paperback of 1997 from the Rocky Mountain News, Since then she has published several more solo novels, Red Shadows (a follow-up to Final Impact), DeadTimes, and That's Not My Name, her first suspense novel. That's Not My Name, Buffy the Vampire Slaver: Paleo, and Buffy the Vampire Slaver: The Willow Files, Vol. 2 all won at the Illinois State level of the IWPA 2001 Mate E. Palmer Communications contest (two first place and one second place, respectively), plus she swept all three awards of the Short Story category with "Ascension," "Divine Justice," and "Santa Alma." She's also written a number of media tie-in novels, including movie novelizations and a number of Buffy the Vampire Slayer novels.

In 1999 Yvonne gathered up her courage and went to writing full time. She was hammering right along until some changes in the publishing world as well as a marriage and move across country (viva la Arizona!) made her reassess the financial wisdom of full time writerdom. She recently started a new career as an Operations Officer for a military contractor at historic Fort Huachuca in southern Arizona. In the meantime, she's racked up thirteen published novels and one non-fiction book to her publication credits, and still has those never-ending plans for more. In January of 2004, The Overlook Connection Press will publish her latest solo novel, Mirror Me, as a hardback limited edition, and she's currently working on a Buffy-related project, the Wicked Willow Trilogy. She finished the first of that trilogy, The Darkening, the day before Labor Day, 2003.

Yvonne married author and career-Army man Weston Ochse in Mt. Moriah Cemetery, Deadwood, South Dakota, in June of 2002. They have a new(ish) house in Arizona which she is industriously filling with chili peppers and books, and which is just begging for a dog or two to ruin its new carpet (::ulp::). The Eagles' "Desperado" becomes a ballad about a really old car. A quick nametag

Couple years later: Having been convinced that yes, it's okay to come to Phoenix in July, the Bohnhoffs come out for a visit. A trip to a karaoke bar is arranged. Now, just as we fans have our own culture and traditions, so does the karaoke world. The regulars all know each other, the DJ knows the regulars, and Friday nights are somewhat predictable. Until Maya's turn. She selects an Eagles tune, then very carefully positions herself so she can't see the lyrics on the monitor. Again,

"Desperado" becomes a ballad about a really old car. Karaoke regulars are stunned. Lobotomized. Who is this strange woman? Must we learn new lyrics? Is this some horrible joke? The karaoke DJ – suddenly no longer bored with the whole proceeding - is hurting himself trying not to laugh. We pay our bill and leave.

Couple years after that: I hear the karaoke story. It's grown in the telling: Jeff and Maya are said to have taken over a karaoke bar out East somewhere and filked it far past closing. I just smiled when I heard that...

It's not often one is present at the birth of a legend. It's even less often that the legend is about a good and talented friend. Ladies and gentlemen, I give you the Bohnhoffs.
